STATEMENT OF THE CASE:

The employer filed an appeal from the April 24, 2023, (reference 01) unemployment insurance decision that allowed benefits based upon the determination that claimant was discharged without a showing of disqualifying misconduct. The parties were properly notified of the hearing. A telephone hearing was held on May 19, 2023. The claimant, Jeremy D. Young, participated personally. The employer, Hy-Vee Inc., participated through hearing representative Barbara Buss, who did not testify, with testifying witnesses Lee Kenyon, Ryan Beary, and Tanner Chester. Employer's Exhibits 1 through 8 were admitted. The administrative law judge took official notice of the administrative record.

ISSUES:

Was the claimant discharged for disqualifying job-related misconduct? Has the claimant been overpaid unemployment insurance benefits, and if so, can the repayment of those benefits to the agency be waived? Can charges to the employer's account be waived?

FINDINGS OF FACT:

Having reviewed all of the evidence in the record, the administrative law judge finds: Claimant was employed full time as a dock runner from September 15, 2014, until this employment ended on April 7, 2023, when he was discharged.

On March 24, 2023, during claimant's shift, he got a call from his girlfriend indicating that the car was not running. Initially, claimant got off the phone with his girlfriend and went back to work. However, then he learned or realized that she was in another town and needed a ride. He left work around midnight or 12:30 a.m. to go get her. His shift did not end until 4:00 a.m. This absence resulted in claimant receiving his ninth attendance point. The employer's attendance policy allows for nine attendance points before discharge. Because claimant had earned his ninth attendance point, he was discharged by phone on April 7, 2023.

Claimant had received two previous disciplinary warnings due to attendance. On December 11, 2022, claimant was issued a disciplinary warning for absences on November 25 and 26, 2022. On November 25, 2022, claimant called out sick prior to his shift start time. On November 26, 2022, claimant left early due to family issues. The December 11, 2022, disciplinary warning contained an explicit warning that the next attendance point accrued would result in discharge. Claimant received a disciplinary warning on November 4, 2022, for absences that occurred on September 29, October 13, 23, and 29, and November 3, 2022. On September 29, 2922, claimant called in sick prior to the start of his shift. On October 13, 2022, there is no notation regarding the reason for the absence, but claimant called out prior to the start of the shift. On October 23, 2022, claimant left his shift early due to illness. On October 29, 2022, claimant left his shift early due to illness. The administrative record indicates that claimant filed a claim for unemployment insurance benefits with an effective date of April 9, 2023. Since that time, he has filed for and received unemployment insurance benefits in the gross amount of \$1,482.00. The employer did not participate in the fact-finding interview.

REASONING AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:

For the reasons that follow, the administrative law judge concludes the claimant was discharged from employment for no disqualifying reason.

lowa Code section 96.5(2)(a) and (d)(9) provide:

An individual shall be *disqualified for benefits:*

2. Discharge for misconduct. If the department finds that the individual has been discharged for misconduct in connection with the individual's employment:

a. The disqualification shall continue until the individual has worked in and has been paid wages for insured work equal to ten times the individual's weekly benefit amount, provided the individual is otherwise eligible.

...

d. For the purposes of this subsection, "*misconduct*" means a deliberate act or omission by an employee that constitutes a material breach of the duties and obligations arising out of the employee's contract of employment. Misconduct is limited to conduct evincing such willful or wanton disregard of an employer's interest as is found in deliberate violation or disregard of standards of behavior which the employer has the right to expect of employees, or in carelessness or negligence of such degree of recurrence as to manifest equal culpability, wrongful intent or even design, or to show an intentional and substantial disregard of the employer's interests or of the employee's duties and obligations to the employer. Misconduct by an individual includes but is not limited to all of the following:

(9) Excessive unexcused tardiness or absenteeism.

The employer has the burden of proof in establishing disqualifying job misconduct. *Cosper v. lowa Dep't of Job Serv.*, 321 N.W.2d 6 (lowa 1982).

Iowa Admin. Code r. 871—24.32(7) provides:

(7) *Excessive unexcused absenteeism*. Excessive unexcused absenteeism is an intentional disregard of the duty owed by the claimant to the employer and shall be considered misconduct except for illness or other reasonable grounds for which the employee was absent and that were properly reported to the employer.

The employer has the burden to prove the claimant was discharged for work-connected misconduct as defined by the unemployment insurance law. *Cosper*, 321 N.W.2d 6. The issue is not whether the employer made a correct decision in separating claimant, but whether the claimant is entitled to unemployment insurance benefits. *Infante v. Iowa Dep't of Job Serv.*, 364 N.W.2d 262 (Iowa Ct. App. 1984). What constitutes misconduct justifying termination of an employee and what misconduct warrants denial of unemployment insurance benefits are two separate decisions. *Pierce v. Iowa Dep't of Job Serv.*, 425 N.W.2d 679 (Iowa Ct. App. 1988).

The employer must prove two elements to establish misconduct based on absenteeism. First, the absences must be excessive. *Sallis v. Emp't Appeal Bd.*, 437 N.W.2d 895 (Iowa 1989). The determination of whether unexcused absenteeism is excessive necessarily requires consideration of past acts and warnings. *Higgins v. Iowa Dep't of Job Serv.*, 350 N.W.2d 187, 192 (Iowa 1984). Second, the absences must be unexcused. *Cosper*, 321 N.W.2d at 10. The requirement of "unexcused" can be satisfied in two ways. An absence can be unexcused either because it was not for "reasonable grounds," or because it was not "properly reported," holding excused absences are those "with appropriate notice." *Higgins*, 350 N.W.2d at 191; *Cosper*, 321 N.W.2d at 10.

Absences due to properly reported illness cannot constitute work-connected misconduct since they are not volitional, even if the employer was fully within its rights to assess points or impose discipline up to or including discharge for the absence under its attendance policy. Iowa Admin. Code r. 871—24.32(7); *Cosper*, 321 N.W.2d at 9; *Gaborit v. Emp't Appeal Bd.*, 734 N.W.2d 554 (Iowa Ct. App. 2007). Medical documentation is not essential to a determination that an absence due to illness should be treated as excused. *See Gaborit*, 734 N.W.2d at 555–58. An employer's no-fault absenteeism policy or point system is not dispositive of the issue of qualification for unemployment insurance benefits. Absences related to issues of personal responsibility such as transportation, lack of childcare, and oversleeping are not considered excused. *Higgins*, 350 N.W.2d at 191. When a claimant does not provide an excuse for an absence, the absence is deemed unexcused. *Id.*; *see also Spragg v. Becker-Underwood, Inc.*, 672 N.W.2d 333, 2003 WL 22339237 (Iowa App. 2003).

The employer has not established that claimant's absences were both excessive and unexcused. While the last absence was for a reason typically considered unexcused, the majority of the absences for which claimant had received points were due to illness and were properly reported. They are, therefore, excused. The absences that are not excused are not so numerous as to be excessive. Accordingly, the employer has not established that claimant was discharged for disqualifying misconduct. Benefits are allowed.

Because the separation is not disqualifying, the issues of overpayment, repayment, and participation are moot.

DECISION:

The April 24, 2023, (reference 01) unemployment insurance decision is AFFIRMED. The claimant was discharged from employment for no disqualifying reason. Benefits are allowed, provided the claimant is otherwise eligible. The issues of overpayment, repayment, and participation are moot.

4) The grounds upon which such appeal is based.

An Employment Appeal Board decision is final agency action. If a party disagrees with the Employment Appeal Board decision, they may then file a petition for judicial review in district court.

2. If no one files an appeal of the judge's decision with the Employment Appeal Board within fifteen (15) days, the decision becomes final agency action, and you have the option to file a petition for judicial review in District Court within thirty (30) days after the decision becomes final.
