STATEMENT OF THE CASE:

Alpha Services, Inc., the employer/appellant,¹ appealed the Iowa Workforce Development (IWD) April 15, 2024 (reference 04) unemployment insurance (UI) decision. The decision allowed claimant regular UI benefits, because claimant was discharged with no showing of willful or deliberate misconduct. On April 22, 2024, the Iowa Department of Inspections, Appeals, and Licensing (DIAL), UI Appeals Bureau mailed a notice of hearing to the parties at each of their last known addresses of record for a telephone hearing scheduled for May 6, 2024.

The appellant did not call the toll-free number listed on the hearing notice at the time the hearing was scheduled to begin. Because the employer filed the appeal but did not call in to participate, the undersigned administrative law judge did not hold a hearing. The appellant witness Yolanda Robinson called in for the hearing at 11:21 a.m. but the record had already closed.

ISSUE:

Should the appeal be dismissed because the appellant did not appear and participate in the appeal hearing?

FINDINGS OF FACT:

The DIAL UI Appeals Bureau properly notified the parties of the scheduled hearing for this appeal. The appellant did not call the toll-free number listed on the hearing notice at the time scheduled for this appeal hearing. The appellant did not request a postponement of the hearing before the hearing date. The appellant did not call in before the record was closed 15 minutes after the hearing was scheduled to begin. The undersigned was available at the date and time scheduled for the hearing. The undersigned did not hold a hearing because the appellant did not appear. Yolanda Robinson called in for the hearing at 11:21 a.m. on behalf of the

employer/appellant and explained on the recorded hearing line that the witness was in a meeting at the time of the hearing so she was unable to call in earlier.

The hearing notice lists the hearing date as May 6, 2024, and the hearing time as 11:00 a.m. Iowa time. The hearing notice also advises the parties:

IMPORTANT NOTICE!

YOU MUST CALL the toll-free number...at the time of the hearing. You may call up to 5 minutes before the hearing. You are not the organizer – Do **NOT** press 2.

The administrative law judge **WILL NOT** call you for the hearing, you **MUST** call into the number provided above to participate. Failure to participate in the hearing may result in the dismissal of your appeal. **Failure to participate in the hearing may result in dismissal of your appeal.**

The undersigned left the record open after the hearing start time, to give the appellant a reasonable opportunity to participate. Allowing additional time may prejudice the non-appealing party. Holding the appellant in default for not appearing and participating during the grace period after the hearing start time is reasonable considering the time allocated for each appeal hearing.

The UI decision concluded that the claimant is eligible for benefits because he was discharged with no showing of willful or deliberate misconduct.

REASONING AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:

The Iowa Administrative Procedures Act at Iowa Code § 17A.12(3) provides, in relevant part:

If a party fails to appear or participate in a contested case proceeding after proper service of notice, the presiding officer may, if no adjournment is granted, enter a default decision or proceed with the hearing and make a decision in the absence of the party. ... If a decision is rendered against a party who failed to appear for the hearing and the presiding officer is timely requested by that party to vacate the decision for good cause, the time for initiating a further appeal is stayed pending a determination by the presiding officer to grant or deny the request. If adequate reasons are provided showing good cause for the party's failure to appear, the presiding officer shall vacate the decision and, after proper service of notice, conduct another evidentiary hearing. If adequate reasons are not provided showing good cause for the party's failure to appear, the presiding officer shall deny the motion to vacate.

Iowa Admin. Code r. 26.14(7) provides:

If a party has not responded to a notice of telephone hearing by providing the appeals bureau with the names and telephone numbers of the persons who are participating in the hearing by the scheduled starting time of the hearing or is not available at the telephone number provided, the presiding officer may proceed with the hearing. If the appealing party fails to provide a telephone number or is unavailable for the hearing, the presiding officer may decide the appealing party is in default and dismiss the appeal as provided in Iowa Code section 17A.12(3). The record may be reopened if the absent party makes a request in writing to reopen the hearing under subrule 26.8(3) and shows good cause for reopening the hearing.

- a. If an absent party responds to the hearing notice while the hearing is in progress, the presiding officer shall pause to admit the party, summarize the hearing to that point, administer the oath, and resume the hearing.
- b. If a party responds to the notice of hearing after the record has been closed and any party which has participated is no longer on the telephone line, the presiding officer shall not take the evidence of the late party.
- c. Failure to read or follow the instructions on the notice of hearing shall not constitute good cause for reopening the record.


Due process requires notice and an opportunity to be heard, both of which were provided to the parties. The appellant is responsible for going forward with the case in a prompt and thoughtful manner. The appellant must be present at the start of the hearing to avoid a default judgment.² The hearing notice instructs the parties to call the toll-free number listed on hearing notice at the time the hearing is scheduled to begin.

In this case, the appellant did not call the toll-free number listed on the hearing notice at the time of the hearing. When Ms. Robinson explained the reason she called in after the record had closed for the hearing, there was nothing in her explanation that amounted to an emergency circumstance beyond her control that prevented her from participating in the hearing. Therefore, the administrative law judge finds the appellant is in default. The appeal should be dismissed.

The appeal is dismissed and the IWD UI decision allowing benefits remains in force and effect.

DECISION:

The April 15, 2024 (reference 04) UI decision allowing benefits remains in effect as the appellant is in default and this appeal is DISMISSED.

APPEAL RIGHTS. If you disagree with the decision, you or any interested party may:

1. Appeal to the Employment Appeal Board within fifteen (15) days of the date under the judge's signature by submitting a written appeal via mail, fax, or online to:

The appeal period will be extended to the next business day if the last day to appeal falls on a weekend or a legal holiday.

AN APPEAL TO THE BOARD SHALL STATE CLEARLY:

- 1) The name, address, and social security number of the claimant.
- 2) A reference to the decision from which the appeal is taken.
- 3) That an appeal from such decision is being made and such appeal is signed.
- 4) The grounds upon which such appeal is based.

An Employment Appeal Board decision is final agency action. If a party disagrees with the Employment Appeal Board decision, they may then file a petition for judicial review in district court.

2. If no one files an appeal of the judge's decision with the Employment Appeal Board within fifteen (15) days, the decision becomes final agency action, and you have the option to file a petition for judicial review in District Court within thirty (30) days after the decision becomes final. Additional information on how to file a petition can be found at Iowa Code §17A.19, which is online at <https://www.legis.iowa.gov/docs/code/17A.19.pdf> or by contacting the District Court Clerk of Court <https://www.iowacourts.gov/iowa-courts/court-directory/>.

Note to Parties: YOU MAY REPRESENT yourself in the appeal or obtain a lawyer or other interested party to do so provided there is no expense to Workforce Development. If you wish to be represented by a lawyer, you may obtain the services of either a private attorney or one whose services are paid for with public funds.

Note to Claimant: It is important that you file your weekly claim as directed, while this appeal is pending, to protect your continuing right to benefits.

- 3) Que se interponga recurso de apelación contra tal decisión y se firme dicho recurso.
- 4) Los fundamentos en que se funda dicho recurso.

Una decisión de la Junta de Apelaciones de Empleo es una acción final de la agencia. Si una de las partes no está de acuerdo con la decisión de la Junta de Apelación de Empleo, puede presentar una petición de revisión judicial en el tribunal de distrito.

2. Si nadie presenta una apelación de la decisión del juez ante la Junta de Apelaciones Laborales dentro de los quince (15) días, la decisión se convierte en acción final de la agencia y usted tiene la opción de presentar una petición de revisión judicial en el Tribunal de Distrito dentro de los treinta (30) días después de que la decisión adquiriera firmeza.
