Iowa Code § 96.5(2)a – Discharge for Misconduct

STATEMENT OF THE CASE:

Tyson Fresh Meats, the employer/appellant,¹ filed an appeal from the Iowa Workforce Development (IWD) June 30, 2023 (reference 01) unemployment insurance (UI) decision. The decision allowed Ms. Reyes REGULAR (state) UI benefits because IWD concluded the employer dismissed her from work on June 14, 2023 for a reason that did not disqualify her from receiving UI benefits. On July 12, 2023, the Iowa Department of Inspections, Appeals, and Licensing, UI Appeals Bureau mailed a notice of hearing to the employer and Ms. Reyes for a telephone hearing scheduled for July 27, 2023.

The undersigned administrative law judge held a telephone hearing on July 27, 2023. The employer participated through Azra Covic, human resources (HR) partner. Ms. Reyes did not participate in the hearing. The undersigned took official notice of the administrative record.

ISSUE:

Did the employer discharge Ms. Reyes from employment for disqualifying job-related misconduct?

Did IWD overpay Ms. Reyes UI benefits?

If so, should she repay the benefits?

FINDINGS OF FACT:

Having reviewed the evidence in the record, the administrative law judge finds: Ms. Reyes began working for the employer in September 2022. She worked as a full-time security officer. Her employment ended on June 14, 2023.

On June 7 an employee (Employee A) reported to the employer that Mr. Reyes and another employee were eating a snack infused with drugs aka an edible, talking about eating the snack and offering the snack to Employee A. The employer investigated the matter by interviewing all employees who were in the security office at the time of the alleged incident. Ms. Reyes admitted in an interview with the senior HR manager and Ms. Reyes' supervisor that she had eaten the edible.

The employer's policy prohibits drug use on the employer's property. Ms. Reyes acknowledged receiving a copy of the policy on, or about, her hire date. The employer terminated Ms. Reyes' employment for violating the employer's policy.

IWD paid Ms. Reyes REGULAR (state) UI benefits in the total gross amount of \$2,742.00 between June 11, 2023 and July 22, 2023. The employer did not participate in the fact-finding interview.

REASONING AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:

For the reasons that follow, the undersigned concludes the employer discharged Ms. Reyes from employment for job-related misconduct.

lowa Code section 96.5(2)(a) and (d) provide, in relevant part:

An individual shall be disqualified for benefits:

- 2. Discharge for misconduct. If the department finds that the individual has been discharged for misconduct in connection with the individual's employment:
- a. The individual shall be disqualified for benefits until the individual has worked in and has been paid wages for insured work equal to ten times the individual's weekly benefit amount, provided the individual is otherwise eligible.
- d. For the purposes of this subsection, "misconduct" means a deliberate act or omission by an employee that constitutes a material breach of the duties and obligations arising out of the employee's contract of employment. Misconduct is limited to conduct evincing such willful or wanton disregard of an employer's interest as is found in deliberate violation or disregard of standards of behavior which the employer has the right to expect of employees, or in carelessness or negligence of such degree of recurrence as to manifest equal culpability, wrongful intent or evil design, or to show an intentional and substantial disregard of the employer's interests or of the employee's duties and obligations to the employer. Misconduct by an individual includes but is not limited to all of the following:

...

(4) Consumption of alcohol, illegal or nonprescribed prescription drugs, or an impairing substance in a manner not directed by the manufacturer, or a combination of such substances, on the employer's premises in violation of the employer's employment policies.

Iowa Code section 96.5(2)(14) provides:

Marijuana or controlled substance use in the workplace — disqualified.

- a. For purposes of this subsection, unless the context otherwise requires:
- (1) "Controlled substance" means the same as defined in section 124.101.

- (2) "Marijuana" means the same as defined in section 124E.2.
- b. If the department finds that the individual became separated from employment due to ingesting marijuana in the workplace, working while under the influence of marijuana, or testing positive for any other controlled substance, for which the individual did not have a current prescription or which the individual was otherwise using unlawfully, under a drug testing policy pursuant to section 730.5 or any other procedures provided by federal statutes, federal regulations, or orders issued pursuant to federal law.
- c. A disqualification under this subsection shall continue until the individual has worked in and has been paid wages for insured work equal to ten times the individual's weekly benefit amount, provided the individual is otherwise eligible.

The employer has the burden of proof in establishing disqualifying job misconduct.² The issue is not whether the employer made a correct decision in separating the claimant from employment, but whether the claimant is entitled to unemployment insurance benefits.³ Misconduct must be "substantial" to warrant a denial of job insurance benefits.⁴

The employer is entitled to establish reasonable work rules and expect employees to abide by them. The employer has presented credible evidence that Ms. Reyes used drugs while at work in violation of the employer's policy. This is disqualifying misconduct. Ms. Reyes is denied UI benefits.

The administrative law judge further concludes IWD overpaid Ms. Reyes REGULAR (state) UI benefits in the total gross amount of \$2,742.00, but she is not required to repay these benefits and the employer's account should be charged.

Iowa Code §96.3(7) provides, in pertinent part:

- 7. Recovery of overpayment of benefits.
- a. If an individual receives benefits for which the individual is subsequently determined to be ineligible, even though the individual acts in good faith and is not otherwise at fault, the benefits shall be recovered. The department in its discretion may recover the overpayment of benefits either by having a sum equal to the overpayment deducted from any future benefits payable to the individual or by having the individual pay to the department a sum equal to the overpayment.
- b. (1) (a) If the department determines that an overpayment has been made, the charge for the overpayment against the employer's account shall be removed and the account shall be credited with an amount equal to the overpayment from the unemployment compensation trust fund and this credit shall include both contributory and reimbursable employers, notwithstanding section 96.8, subsection 5. The employer shall not be relieved of charges if benefits are paid because the employer or an agent of the employer failed to respond timely or adequately to the department's request for information relating to the payment of benefits. This prohibition against relief of charges shall apply to both contributory

and reimbursable employers. If the department determines that an employer's failure to respond timely or adequately was due to insufficient notification from the department, the employer's account shall not be charged for the overpayment.

(b) However, provided the benefits were not received as the result of fraud or willful misrepresentation by the individual, benefits shall not be recovered from an individual if the employer did not participate in the initial determination to award benefits pursuant to section 96.6, subsection 2, and an overpayment occurred because of a subsequent reversal on appeal regarding the issue of the individual's separation from employment.

Iowa Admin. Code r. 871-24.10 provides:

Employer and employer representative participation in fact-finding interviews.

- (1) "Participate," as the term is used for employers in the context of the initial determination to award benefits pursuant to Iowa Code section 96.6, subsection 2, means submitting detailed factual information of the quantity and quality that if unrebutted would be sufficient to result in a decision favorable to the employer. The most effective means to participate is to provide live testimony at the interview from a witness with firsthand knowledge of the events leading to the separation. If no live testimony is provided, the employer must provide the name and telephone number of an employee with firsthand information who may be contacted, if necessary, for rebuttal. A party may also participate by providing detailed written statements or documents that provide detailed factual information of the events leading to separation. At a minimum, the information provided by the employer or the employer's representative must identify the dates and particular circumstances of the incident or incidents, including, in the case of discharge, the act or omissions of the claimant or, in the event of a voluntary separation, the stated reason for the quit. The specific rule or policy must be submitted if the claimant was discharged for violating such rule or policy. In the case of discharge for attendance violations, the information must include the circumstances of all incidents the employer or the employer's representative contends meet the definition of unexcused absences as set forth in 871—subrule 24.32(7). On the other hand, written or oral statements or general conclusions without supporting detailed factual information and information submitted after the fact-finding decision has been issued are not considered participation within the meaning of the statute.
- (2) "A continuous pattern of nonparticipation in the initial determination to award benefits," pursuant to lowa Code section 96.6, subsection 2, as the term is used for an entity representing employers, means on 25 or more occasions in a calendar quarter beginning with the first calendar quarter of 2009, the entity files appeals after failing to participate. Appeals filed but withdrawn before the day of the contested case hearing will not be considered in determining if a continuous pattern of nonparticipation exists. The division administrator shall notify the employer's representative in writing after each such appeal.
- (3) If the division administrator finds that an entity representing employers as defined in Iowa Code section 96.6, subsection 2, has engaged in a continuous pattern of nonparticipation, the division administrator shall suspend said

representative for a period of up to six months on the first occasion, up to one year on the second occasion and up to ten years on the third or subsequent occasion. Suspension by the division administrator constitutes final agency action and may be appealed pursuant to lowa Code section 17A.19.

(4) "Fraud or willful misrepresentation by the individual," as the term is used for claimants in the context of the initial determination to award benefits pursuant to lowa Code section 96.6, subsection 2, means providing knowingly false statements or knowingly false denials of material facts for the purpose of obtaining unemployment insurance benefits. Statements or denials may be either oral or written by the claimant. Inadvertent misstatements or mistakes made in good faith are not considered fraud or willful misrepresentation.

This rule is intended to implement lowa Code section 96.3(7)"b" as amended by 2008 lowa Acts, Senate File 2160.

Since Ms. Reyes is not eligible for UI benefits based on how her job ended with the employer per this decision, she is not eligible for the UI benefits IWD already sent her. IWD overpaid Ms. Reyes REGULAR (state) UI benefits in the total gross amount of \$2,742.00 between June 11, 2023 and July 22, 2023. But, since the employer did not participate in the fact-finding interview, Ms. Reyes is not required to repay these UI benefits and the employer's account must be charged.

DECISION:

The June 30, 2023 (reference 01) UI decision is REVERSED. The employer discharged Ms. Reyes from employment for job-related misconduct. Ms. Reyes is not eligible for UI benefits until she has worked in and been paid wages for insured work equal to ten times her weekly UI benefit amount, as long as no other decision denies her UI benefits.

IWD overpaid Ms. Reyes REGULAR (state) UI benefits in the gross amount of \$2,742.00 between June 11, 2023 and July 22, 2023. But, since the employer did not participate in the fact-finding interview, Ms. Reyes is not required to repay these benefits and the employer's account must be charged.

- 1) The name, address, and social security number of the claimant.
- 2) A reference to the decision from which the appeal is taken.
- 3) That an appeal from such decision is being made and such appeal is signed.
- 4) The grounds upon which such appeal is based.

An Employment Appeal Board decision is final agency action. If a party disagrees with the Employment Appeal Board decision, they may then file a petition for judicial review in district court.

<u>2.</u> If no one files an appeal of the judge's decision with the Employment Appeal Board within fifteen (15) days, the decision becomes final agency action, and you have the option to <u>file a petition for judicial review in District Court</u> within thirty (30) days after the decision becomes final. Additional information on how to file a petition can be found at lowa Code §17A.19, which is online at https://www.legis.iowa.gov/docs/code/17A.19.pdf or by contacting the District Court Clerk of Court https://www.iowacourts.gov/iowa-courts/court-directory/.

Note to Parties: YOU MAY REPRESENT yourself in the appeal or obtain a lawyer or other interested party to do so provided there is no expense to Workforce Development. If you wish to be represented by a lawyer, you may obtain the services of either a private attorney or one whose services are paid for with public funds.

Note to Claimant: It is important that you file your weekly claim as directed, while this appeal is pending, to protect your continuing right to benefits.
