Section 96.5-2-a – Discharge/Misconduct

STATEMENT OF THE CASE:

The employer filed a timely appeal from the April 25, 2005, reference 01, decision that allowed benefits. After due notice was issued, a hearing was held by telephone conference call before Administrative Law Judge Julie Elder on June 13, 2005. The claimant participated in the hearing. Jerry Hans, Operations Manager, participated in the hearing on behalf of the employer.

FINDINGS OF FACT:

Having reviewed all of the evidence in the record, the administrative law judge finds: The claimant was employed as a full-time Vice-President for J. Pettiecord Inc. from 1985 to February 2, 2005. The claimant and her husband owned two companies, J. Pettiecord, Inc. and JAR Leasing Corp. They filed for divorce in 2003. The claimant continued to work until March 2004 when she went on a vacation and returned one time in January 2005. She had been paid throughout this time period. When she came in January 2005, Jerry Hans, Operations Manager, asked her what she was doing there and she stated it was time to come back to work. Jeff Pettiecord, her soon to be ex-husband, asked why she was there and said he was going to call his attorney about the situation. He also told her not to come back because she was causing dissension in the workplace and the claimant did not return to work after that time. The parties were divorced March 10, 2005, and the claimant received JAR Leasing. At that time the claimant was eliminated from the payroll. JAR Leasing Corp. is not a revenue producing company as the parties made their income through J. Pettiecord, Inc.

REASONING AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:

For the reasons that follow, the administrative law judge concludes the claimant was discharged from employment for no disqualifying reason.

Iowa Code section 96.5-2-a provides:

An individual shall be disqualified for benefits:

2. Discharge for misconduct. If the department finds that the individual has been discharged for misconduct in connection with the individual's employment:

a. The individual shall be disqualified for benefits until the individual has worked in and has been paid wages for insured work equal to ten times the individual's weekly benefit amount, provided the individual is otherwise eligible.

871 IAC 24.32(1)a provides:

Discharge for misconduct.

(1) Definition.

a. "Misconduct" is defined as a deliberate act or omission by a worker which constitutes a material breach of the duties and obligations arising out of such worker's contract of employment. Misconduct as the term is used in the disqualification provision as being limited to conduct evincing such willful or wanton disregard of an employer's interest as is found in deliberate violation or disregard of standards of behavior which the employer has the right to expect of employees, or in carelessness or negligence of such degree of recurrence as to manifest equal culpability, wrongful intent or evil design, or to show an intentional and substantial disregard of the employer's interests or of the employee's duties and obligations to the employer. On the other hand mere inefficiency, unsatisfactory conduct, failure in good performance as the result of inability or incapacity, inadvertencies or ordinary negligence in isolated instances, or good faith errors in judgment or discretion are not to be deemed misconduct within the meaning of the statute. This definition has been accepted by the Iowa Supreme Court as accurately reflecting the intent of the legislature. <u>Huntoon v. Iowa Department of Job Service</u>, 275 N.W.2d 445, 448 (Iowa 1979).

The employer has the burden of proving disqualifying job misconduct. <u>Cosper v. lowa</u> <u>Department of Job Service</u>, 321 N.W.2d 6 (lowa 1982). The propriety of a discharge is not at issue in an unemployment insurance case. An employer may be justified in discharging an employee, but the employee's conduct may not amount to misconduct precluding the payment of unemployment compensation. The law limits disqualifying misconduct to willful wrongdoing or repeated carelessness or negligence that equals willful misconduct in culpability. <u>Newman v.</u> <u>lowa Department of Job Service</u>, 351 N.W.2d 806 (lowa App. 1984). The separation in this case was the result of a divorce between the owners. Consequently, the administrative law judge cannot conclude that the claimant's actions were misconduct as defined by lowa law. Therefore, benefits must be allowed.

DECISION:

The April 25, 2005, reference 01, decision is affirmed. The claimant was discharged from employment for no disqualifying reason. Benefits are allowed, provided the claimant is otherwise eligible.
