STATEMENT OF THE CASE:

Claimant filed an appeal from the July 11, 2022 (reference 01) unemployment insurance decision that denied benefits finding claimant was discharged on June 24, 2022 for excessive unexcused absenteeism. The parties were properly notified of the hearing. A telephone hearing was held on August 22, 2022. Claimant participated. Employer participated through Karen Van Sickle, Human Resources. No exhibits were admitted.

ISSUE:

Whether claimant's separation was a discharge for disqualifying job-related misconduct.

FINDINGS OF FACT:

Having reviewed all of the evidence in the record, the administrative law judge finds:

Claimant was employed as a full-time Operator from May 21, 2021 until his employment with Absolute Concrete Construction ended on June 24, 2022. Claimant worked Monday through Friday from 6:00 a.m. until work was completed. Claimant's direct supervisor was Manny Pena Perez, Foreman. Claimant last performed work for employer on Friday, June 17, 2022.

On Sunday, June 19, 2022, claimant notified Perez that he would be absent the following day, June 20, 2022, because he had to take his child to a doctor's appointment. Claimant was absent Monday, June 20, 2022.

On June 21, 2022, claimant was scheduled to work. It was raining, so claimant would only work half of the day. The job site was far away. Claimant decided it was not worth the travel time and expense to only work a half-day. Claimant notified employer that he would not be attending work that day.

On June 21, 2022, claimant sent a text message to Perez asking where to report for work the next day as was the parties' practice. Claimant did not receive a response and, thus, did not report to work on June 22, 2022.

On June 22, 2022, Perez informed claimant that he did not have to report to work on June 23, 2022 because he did not report to work on June 22, 2022.

On June 24, 2022, claimant was scheduled to work but did not attend and did not notify employer. Claimant did not report to work because employer did not allow him to work on June 23, 2022.

On June 24, 2022, employer discharged claimant for excessive absenteeism. Claimant received no prior warnings regarding his attendance. Claimant did not know his job was in jeopardy.

REASONING AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:

For the reasons that follow, the administrative law judge concludes:

lowa Code section 96.5(2)(a) provides:

An individual shall be disqualified for benefits:

- 2. Discharge for misconduct. If the department finds that the individual has been discharged for misconduct in connection with the individual's employment:
- a. The disqualification shall continue until the individual has worked in and has been paid wages for insured work equal to ten times the individual's weekly benefit amount, provided the individual is otherwise eligible.

Iowa Admin. Code r. 871-24.32(1)(a) provides:

a. "Misconduct" is defined as a deliberate act or omission by a worker which constitutes a material breach of the duties and obligations arising out of such worker's contract of employment. Misconduct as the term is used in the disqualification provision as being limited to conduct evincing such willful or wanton disregard of an employer's interest as is found in deliberate violation or disregard of standards of behavior which the employer has the right to expect of employees, or in carelessness or negligence of such degree of recurrence as to manifest equal culpability, wrongful intent or evil design, or to show an intentional and substantial disregard of the employer's interests or of the employee's duties and obligations to the employer. On the other hand mere inefficiency, unsatisfactory conduct, failure in good performance as the result of inability or incapacity, inadvertencies or ordinary negligence in isolated instances, or good faith errors in judgment or discretion are not to be deemed misconduct within the meaning of the statute.

This definition of misconduct has been accepted by the lowa Supreme Court as accurately reflecting the intent of the legislature. *Reigelsberger v. Emp't Appeal Bd.*, 500 N.W.2d 64, 66 (lowa 1993); *accord Lee v. Emp't Appeal Bd.*, 616 N.W.2d 661, 665 (lowa 2000). Further, the employer has the burden of proof in establishing disqualifying job misconduct. *Cosper v. Iowa Dep't of Job Serv.*, 321 N.W.2d 6 (lowa 1982).

Iowa Admin. Code r. 871-24.32(7) provides:

(7) Excessive unexcused absenteeism. Excessive unexcused absenteeism is an intentional disregard of the duty owed by the claimant to the employer and shall be considered misconduct except for illness or other reasonable grounds for which the employee was absent and that were properly reported to the employer.

Iowa Admin. Code r. 871-24.32(8) provides:

(8) Past acts of misconduct. While past acts and warnings can be used to determine the magnitude of a current act of misconduct, a discharge for misconduct cannot be based on such past act or acts. The termination of employment must be based on a current act.

The issue is not whether the employer made a correct decision in separating claimant, but whether the claimant is entitled to unemployment insurance benefits. *Infante v. Iowa Dep't of Job Serv.*, 364 N.W.2d 262 (lowa Ct. App. 1984). What constitutes misconduct justifying termination of an employee and what misconduct warrants denial of unemployment insurance benefits are two separate decisions. *Pierce v. Iowa Dep't of Job Serv.*, 425 N.W.2d 679 (lowa Ct. App. 1988).

Excessive absences are not considered misconduct unless unexcused. The requirements for a finding of misconduct based on absences are therefore twofold. First, the absences must be excessive. Sallis v. Emp't Appeal Bd., 437 N.W.2d 895 (lowa 1989). The determination of whether unexcused absenteeism is excessive necessarily requires consideration of past acts and warnings. Higgins v. lowa Dep't of Job Serv., 350 N.W.2d 187, 192 (lowa 1984). Second, the absences must be unexcused. Cosper, 321 N.W.2d at 10. The requirement of "unexcused" can be satisfied in two ways. An absence can be unexcused either because it was not for "reasonable grounds," Higgins, 350 N.W.2d at 191, or because it was not "properly reported," holding excused absences are those "with appropriate notice." Cosper, 321 N.W.2d at 10.

Absences due to properly reported illness cannot constitute work-connected misconduct since they are not volitional, even if the employer was fully within its rights to assess points or impose discipline up to or including discharge for the absence under its attendance policy. lowa Admin. Code r. 871-24.32(7); Cosper, 321 N.W.2d at 9; Gaborit v. Emp't Appeal Bd., 734 N.W.2d 554 (lowa Ct. App. 2007). Medical documentation is not essential to a determination that an absence due to illness should be treated as excused. See Gaborit, 734 N.W.2d at 555-558. An employer's no-fault absenteeism policy or point system is not dispositive of the issue of qualification for unemployment insurance benefits. Absences related to issues of personal responsibility such as transportation, lack of childcare, and oversleeping are not considered excused. Higgins, 350 N.W.2d at 191.

Excessive absenteeism has been found when there have been seven unexcused absences in five months; five unexcused absences and three instances of tardiness in eight months; three unexcused absences over an eight-month period; three unexcused absences over seven months; and missing three times after being warned. See Higgins, 350 N.W.2d at 192 (lowa 1984); Infante v. Iowa Dep't of Job Serv., 364 N.W.2d 262 (lowa App. 1984); Armel v. EAB, 2007 WL 3376929*3 (lowa App. Nov. 15, 2007); Hiland v. EAB, No. 12-2300 (lowa App. July 10, 2013); and Clark v. Iowa Dep't of Job Serv., 317 N.W.2d 517 (lowa App. 1982).

It is the duty of the administrative law judge, as the trier of fact, to determine the credibility of witnesses, weigh the evidence and decide the facts in issue. *Arndt v. City of LeClaire*, 728 N.W.2d 389, 394-395 (lowa 2007). The administrative law judge may believe all, part or none of any witness's testimony. *State v. Holtz*, 548 N.W.2d 162, 163 (lowa App. 1996). In assessing the credibility of witnesses, the administrative law judge should consider the evidence using his or her own observations, common sense and experience. *Id.* In determining the facts, and deciding what testimony to believe, the fact finder may consider the following factors: whether the testimony is reasonable and consistent with other evidence you believe; whether a witness

has made inconsistent statements; the witness's appearance, conduct, age, intelligence, memory and knowledge of the facts; and the witness's interest in the trial, their motive, candor, bias and prejudice. *Id*.

The findings of fact show how I have resolved the disputed factual issues in this case. I assessed the credibility of the witnesses who testified during the hearing, considering the applicable factors listed above, and using my own common sense and experience. I find the claimant's testimony about his absences more credible than employer's testimony because claimant provided a first-hand account of when and how he notified employer of his absences and the reasons for his absences.

Claimant's absence on June 20, 2022 was for reasonable grounds (i.e. daughter's doctor's appointment) and was properly reported. Therefore, the absence was excused.

Claimant's absence on June 21, 2022 was properly reported to employer. However, the reason for claimant's absence was his decision not to travel for work for a half-day, which does not constitute good cause. The absence is unexcused.

Claimant's absence on June 22, 2022 is excused because employer did not tell claimant where to report to work. Similarly, claimant's absence on June 23, 2022 is excused because employer told claimant not to report to work.

Claimant's absence on June 24, 2022 was a no-call/no-show. Because claimant did not properly report his absence to employer, the absence is unexcused.

Without a prior warning, claimant's two unexcused absences are not considered excessive. Employer has not met its burden of proving claimant was discharged for disqualifying job-related misconduct. Benefits are allowed provided claimant is otherwise eligible.

DECISION:

The July 11, 2022 (reference 01) unemployment insurance decision is REVERSED. Claimant was discharged for no disqualifying reason. Benefits are allowed provided claimant is otherwise eligible.

- 2) A reference to the decision from which the appeal is taken.
- 3) That an appeal from such decision is being made and such appeal is signed.
- 4) The grounds upon which such appeal is based.

An Employment Appeal Board decision is final agency action. If a party disagrees with the Employment Appeal Board decision, they may then file a petition for judicial review in district court.

2. If no one files an appeal of the judge's decision with the Employment Appeal Board within fifteen (15) days, the decision becomes final agency action, and you have the option to file a petition for judicial review in District Court within thirty (30) days after the decision becomes final. Additional information on how to file a petition can be found at lowa Code §17A.19, which is online at https://www.legis.iowa.gov/docs/code/17A.19.pdf or by contacting the District Court Clerk of Court https://www.iowacourts.gov/iowa-courts/court-directory/.

Note to Parties: YOU MAY REPRESENT yourself in the appeal or obtain a lawyer or other interested party to do so provided there is no expense to Workforce Development. If you wish to be represented by a lawyer, you may obtain the services of either a private attorney or one whose services are paid for with public funds.

Note to Claimant: It is important that you file your weekly claim as directed, while this appeal is pending, to protect your continuing right to benefits.
