Section 96.5-3-a - Refusal of Work

STATEMENT OF THE CASE:

The employer, Sedona Staffing, filed an appeal from a decision dated January 13, 2004, reference 02. The decision allowed benefits to the claimant, Carla Kurt. After due notice was issued a hearing was held by telephone conference call on February 17, 2004. The claimant participated on her own behalf. The employer participated by Unemployment Benefits Administrator Colleen McGuinty.

FINDINGS OF FACT:

Having heard the testimony of the witnesses and having examined all of the evidence in the record, the administrative law judge finds: Carla Kurt began working for Sedona on April 12, 2002. Her last assignment ended on November 7, 2003. She filed a claim for unemployment benefits with an effective date of November 9, 2003. Her average weekly wage was established as \$312.69.

On December 15, 2003, Senior Account Manager Nikki Kefer contacted the claimant for an assignment for 25 hours per week with Namasco at \$11.00.00 per hour. The claimant declined.

REASONING AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:

The issue is whether the claimant is disqualified. The judge concludes she is not.

Iowa Code Section 96.5-3-a provides:

An individual shall be disqualified for benefits:

3. Failure to accept work. If the department finds that an individual has failed, without good cause, either to apply for available, suitable work when directed by the department or to accept suitable work when offered that individual. The department shall, if possible, furnish the individual with the names of employers which are seeking employees. The individual shall apply to and obtain the signatures of the employers designated by the department on forms provided by the department. However, the employers may refuse to sign the forms. The individual's failure to obtain the signatures of designated employers, which have not refused to sign the forms, shall disqualify the individual for benefits until requalified. To requalify for benefits after disqualification under this subsection, the individual shall work in and be paid wages for insured work equal to ten times the individual's weekly benefit amount, provided the individual is otherwise eligible.

a. In determining whether or not any work is suitable for an individual, the department shall consider the degree of risk involved to the individual's health, safety, and morals, the individual's physical fitness, prior training, length of unemployment, and prospects for securing local work in the individual's customary occupation, the distance of the available work from the individual's residence, and any other factor which the department finds bears a reasonable relation to the purposes of this paragraph. Work is suitable if the work meets all the other criteria of this paragraph and if the gross weekly wages for the work equal or exceed the following percentages of the individual's average weekly wage for insured work paid to the individual during that quarter of the individual's base period in which the individual's wages were highest:

(1) One hundred percent, if the work is offered during the first five weeks of unemployment.

(2) Seventy-five percent, if the work is offered during the sixth through the twelfth week of unemployment.

(3) Seventy percent, if the work is offered during the thirteenth through the eighteenth week of unemployment.

(4) Sixty-five percent, if the work is offered after the eighteenth week of unemployment.

However, the provisions of this paragraph shall not require an individual to accept employment below the federal minimum wage.

The claimant refused the offer of work because the wages were not at least 100 percent of her average weekly wage. Under the provisions of the above Code section, the job was not suitable and the refusal is not disqualifying.

## DECISION:

The representative's decision of January 13, 2004, reference 02, is affirmed. Carla Kurt is qualified for benefits provided she is otherwise eligible.
