STATEMENT OF THE CASE:

The employer/appellant filed an appeal from the February 21, 2023 (reference 01), unemployment insurance, decision that allowed benefits based upon his voluntary quit. The parties were properly notified about the hearing. A telephone hearing was held on March 21, 2023. Claimant, Jeffrey Heick, participated and testified. Employer, Walmart Inc, participated through Ashley Servousek. Employer's Exhibits were offered and admitted without objection.

ISSUE:

Was the separation a layoff, discharge for misconduct or voluntary quit without good cause attributable to the employer?

FINDINGS OF FACT:

Having reviewed all of the evidence in the record, the administrative law judge finds: Claimant was employed full-time at Walmart as a stocker. During his time working at Wal-Mart, the claimant's supervisor, Heather Shepard, attempted to kindle an intimate relationship with the claimant by text messaging him outside of work in the evenings. In her text messages, Ms. Shepard requested the claimant meet her at a hotel room, called him sexy, and shared other personal information. When at work, Ms. Shepard would constantly curse at the claimant using the "f" word. Claimant submitted his resignation on notice on June 1, 2023 after Ms. Shepard had, again, used vulgarities toward him in the workplace. His last day worked was June 7, 2023.

REASONING AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:

For the reasons that follow, the administrative law judge concludes claimant's separation from the employment was with good cause attributable to the employer.

Iowa Code § 96.5(2)a provides:

An individual shall be disqualified for benefits:

2. Discharge for misconduct. If the department finds that the individual has been discharged for misconduct in connection with the individual's employment:

a. The individual shall be disqualified for benefits until the individual has worked in and has been paid wages for insured work equal to ten times the individual's weekly benefit amount, provided the individual is otherwise eligible.

lowa Code §96.5(1) provides:

An individual shall be disqualified for benefits:

1. Voluntary quitting. If the individual has left work voluntarily without good cause attributable to the individual's employer, if so found by the department.

A voluntary leaving of employment requires an intention to terminate the employment relationship accompanied by an overt act of carrying out that intention. *Local Lodge #1426 v. Wilson Trailer*, 289 N.W.2d 608, 612 (Iowa 1980). The claimant has the burden of proving that the voluntary leaving was for good cause attributable to the employer. Iowa Code § 96.6(2) (amended 1998). Generally, when an individual mistakenly believes they are discharged from employment, but was not told so by the employer, and they discontinue reporting for work, the separation is considered a quit without good cause attributable to the employer. *LaGrange v. lowa Dep't of Job Serv.*, (No. 4-209/83-1081, Iowa Ct. App. filed June 26, 1984).

Quits due to intolerable or detrimental working conditions are deemed to be for good cause attributable to the employer. See Iowa Admin. Code r. 871-24.26(4). The test is whether a reasonable person would have quit under the circumstances. See *Aalbers v. Iowa Department of Job Service*, 431 N.W.2d 330 (Iowa 1988) and *O'Brien v Employment Appeal Bd.*, 494 N.W.2d 660 (1993). Aside from quits based on medical reasons, prior notification of the employer before a resignation for intolerable or detrimental working conditions is not required. See *Hy-Vee v. EAB*, 710 N.W.2d (Iowa 2005).

The evidence in the record establishes a voluntary quit with good cause attributable to the employer. The claimant quit in response to ongoing intolerable and detrimental working conditions. These included the claimant's supervisor instant messaging the claimant during evening hours away from work requesting him to go to a hotel room with her and calling him sexy. The intolerable and detrimental working condition also includes multiple incidents of the claimant's supervisor cursing at the claimant and using vulgarities toward the claimant while at work. A reasonable person would have left the employment under the circumstances. The claimant is eligible for benefits, provided he is otherwise eligible. The employer's account may be charged for the benefits.

DECISION:

The February 21, 2023, (reference 01) unemployment insurance decision is affirmed. The claimant voluntarily left his employment with good cause attributable to the employer. Benefits are allowed.

- 3) That an appeal from such decision is being made and such appeal is signed.
- 4) The grounds upon which such appeal is based.

An Employment Appeal Board decision is final agency action. If a party disagrees with the Employment Appeal Board decision, they may then file a petition for judicial review in district court.

2. If no one files an appeal of the judge's decision with the Employment Appeal Board within fifteen (15) days, the decision becomes final agency action, and you have the option to file a petition for judicial review in District Court within thirty (30) days after the decision becomes final. Additional information on how to file a petition can be found at lowa Code §17A.19, which is online at https://www.legis.iowa.gov/docs/code/17A.19.pdf or by contacting the District Court Clerk of Court https://www.iowacourts.gov/iowa-courts/court-directory/.

Note to Parties: YOU MAY REPRESENT yourself in the appeal or obtain a lawyer or other interested party to do so provided there is no expense to Workforce Development. If you wish to be represented by a lawyer, you may obtain the services of either a private attorney or one whose services are paid for with public funds.

Note to Claimant: It is important that you file your weekly claim as directed, while this appeal is pending, to protect your continuing right to benefits.
