STATEMENT OF THE CASE:

On November 5, 2020, the claimant filed a timely appeal from the Iowa Workforce Development decision dated November 5, 2020 that determined claimant was not eligible for federal Pandemic Unemployment Assistance (PUA) benefits. A telephone hearing was held on December 17, 2020. The claimant was properly notified of the hearing and participated personally.

ISSUE:

Is the claimant eligible for Pandemic Unemployment Assistance?

FINDINGS OF FACT:

Having reviewed all of the evidence in the record, the administrative law judge finds: Claimant worked at Data Dimensions from 2012 until April 2019. Claimant was terminated and filed a claim for unemployment insurance benefits with an effective date of June 23, 2019. Claimant exhausted regular unemployment insurance benefits during the week ending December 21, 2019.

In March 2020, the United States declared a public health emergency due to the COVID 19 pandemic.

Claimant received Pandemic Emergency Unemployment Compensation (PEUC) for the 13 weeks ending June 27, 2020.

Claimant received state Extended Benefits for the 13 weeks ending September 26, 2020.

Claimant is not monetarily eligible for regular unemployment insurance benefits in the claim year beginning June 28, 2020.

Claimant has been unable to find work due to the economy.

Claimant has a 15 year old son whose public school is offering in person classes two days per week. Claimant's son is taking all of his classes virtually to avoid illness. As a result, claimant is looking for second shift work.

REASONING AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:

The Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act, Public Law 116-136, Sec. 2102 provides for unemployment benefit assistance to any covered individual for any weeks beginning on or after January 27, 2020 and ending on or before December 31, 2020, during which the individual is unemployed, partially unemployed, or unable to work due to COVID-19.

The issue to be determined here is whether claimant is a "covered individual" who is eligible to receive benefits within the meaning of applicable law.

Section 2102 of the CARES Act describes a covered individual as follows:

- (3) COVERED INDIVIDUAL.—The term "covered individual"—
 - (A) means an individual who—
 - (i) is not eligible for regular compensation or extended benefits under State or Federal law or pandemic emergency unemployment compensation under section 2107, including an individual who has exhausted all rights to regular unemployment or extended benefits under State or Federal law or pandemic emergency unemployment compensation under section 2107; and
 - (ii) provides self-certification that the individual—
 - (I) is otherwise able to work and available for work within the meaning of applicable State law, except the individual is unemployed, partially unemployed, or unable or unavailable to work because—
 - (aa) the individual has been diagnosed with COVID-19 or is experiencing symptoms of COVID-19 and seeking a medical diagnosis;
 - (bb) a member of the individual's household has been diagnosed with COVID-19;
 - (cc) the individual is providing care for a family member or a member of the individual's household who has been diagnosed with COVID-19;
 - (dd) a child or other person in the household for which the individual has primary caregiving responsibility is unable to attend school or another facility that is closed as a direct result of the COVID–19 public health emergency and such school or facility care is required for the individual to work;

- (ee) the individual is unable to reach the place of employment because of a quarantine imposed as a direct result of the COVID-19 public health emergency;
- (ff) the individual is unable to reach the place of employment because the individual has been advised by a health care provider to self-quarantine due to concerns related to COVID-19:
- (gg) the individual was scheduled to commence employment and does not have a job or is unable to reach the job as a direct result of the COVID-19 public health emergency;
- (hh) the individual has become the breadwinner or major support for a household because the head of the household has died as a direct result of COVID-19:
- (ii) the individual has to quit his or her job as a direct result of COVID-19:
- (jj) the individual's place of employment is closed as a direct result of the COVID-19 public health emergency; or
- (kk) the individual meets any additional criteria established by the Secretary for unemployment assistance under this section; or
- (II) is self-employed, is seeking part-time employment, does not have sufficient work history, or otherwise would not qualify for regular unemployment or extended benefits under State or Federal law or pandemic emergency unemployment compensation under section 2107 and meets the requirements of subclause (I); and

(B) does not include—

- (i) an individual who has the ability to telework with pay; or
- (ii) an individual who is receiving paid sick leave or other paid leave benefits, regardless of whether the individual meets a qualification described in items (aa) through (kk) of subparagraph (A)(i)(I).

In this case, claimant is still unemployed because she has had difficulty finding a new job due to the economic circumstances. While claimant's son is learning remotely, he is 15 years old and of the age where he is old enough to stay home alone. Furthermore, claimant is still able to work second shift, even with her son at home. The primary reason claimant is unemployed is due to economic circumstances. Claimant has not established she is eligible for PUA benefits.

DECISION:

The Iowa Workforce Development decision dated November 5, 2020 that determined claimant was not eligible for federal Pandemic Unemployment Assistance (PUA) benefits is affirmed.
