STATEMENT OF THE CASE:

The claimant filed an appeal from a decision of a representative dated November 2, 2012, reference 05, which held that the claimant was overpaid unemployment insurance benefits. After due notice, a telephone conference hearing was scheduled for and held on December 6, 2012. This case was heard in conjunction with 12A-UI-13326-VST.

ISSUE:

Whether the claimant has been overpaid unemployment insurance benefits.

FINDINGS OF FACT:

The administrative law judge, having heard the testimony of the witnessand having considered all of the evidence in the record, makes the following findings of fact:

The claimant established an original claim for benefits with an original claim date of March 20, 2011. The claimant was paid one week of unemployment insurance benefits for the week between March 20, 2011, and March 26, 2011, in the amount of \$209.00. The representative disqualified the claimant from receiving benefits for that one week in a decision dated April 19, 2011. The administrative law judge affirmed the decision of the representative dated April 19, 2011, only because the claimant failed to file a timely appeal, which prohibited the administrative law judge from deciding the case on the merits.

REASONING AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:

Iowa Code section 96.3-7, as amended in 2008, provides:

7. Recovery of overpayment of benefits.

a. If an individual receives benefits for which the individual is subsequently determined to be ineligible, even though the individual acts in good faith and is not otherwise at fault, the benefits shall be recovered. The department in its discretion may recover the overpayment of benefits either by having a sum equal to the overpayment deducted from any future benefits payable to the individual or by having the individual pay to the department a sum equal to the overpayment.

b. (1) If the department determines that an overpayment has been made, the charge for the overpayment against the employer's account shall be removed and the account shall be credited with an amount equal to the overpayment from the unemployment compensation trust fund and this credit shall include both contributory and reimbursable employers, notwithstanding section 96.8, subsection 5. However, provided the benefits were not received as the result of fraud or willful misrepresentation by the individual, benefits shall not be recovered from an individual if the employer did not participate in the initial determination to award benefits pursuant to section 96.6, subsection 2, and an overpayment occurred because of a subsequent reversal on appeal regarding the issue of the individual's separation from employment. The employer shall not be charged with the benefits.

(2) An accounting firm, agent, unemployment insurance accounting firm, or other entity that represents an employer in unemployment claim matters and demonstrates a continuous pattern of failing to participate in the initial determinations to award benefits, as determined and defined by rule by the department, shall be denied permission by the department to represent any employers in unemployment insurance matters. This subparagraph does not apply to attorneys or counselors admitted to practice in the courts of this state pursuant to section 602.10101.

The claimant has been overpaid unemployment insurance benefits. The claimant was disqualified from receiving benefits for the one week between March 20, 2011, and March 26, 2011. Those benefits, even though received in good faith, must now be repaid.

DECISION:

The decision of the representative dated November 2, 2012, reference 05, is affirmed. The claimant has been overpaid unemployment insurance benefits in the amount of \$209.00. Those benefits must now be repaid.
