STATEMENT OF THE CASE:

The claimant filed an appeal from the July 31, 2023 (reference 02) unemployment insurance decision that denied benefits based upon claimant's discharge from employment. The parties were properly notified of the hearing. A telephone hearing was held on August 18, 2023 at 11:00 a.m. The claimant, Michael Gustafson, participated personally. The employer, Valero Services Inc, participated through witnesses Robert Abbott, Nancy Melrose, Kirk Jarvis, hearing representative, Jackie Boudreaux, and observer, Maria Mason. No exhibits were offered or admitted.

ISSUES:

Was the claimant discharged for disqualifying job-related misconduct?

Did claimant voluntarily guit the employment with good cause attributable to employer?

FINDINGS OF FACT:

Having reviewed all of the evidence in the record, the administrative law judge finds: Claimant was employed full-time beginning September 11, 2019 as the manager of Health and Safety, HSE. The claimant's immediate supervisor was Plant Manager, Kirk Jarvis. The claimant last physically worked in this position on April 27, 2023. The claimant was discharged on April 27, 2023 for failing to follow instructions and a failure to complete the job duties successfully. This employer is an Ethanol Plant.

The final incident occurred on April 25, 2023. The Plant Manager was informed by another employee that the plant had exceeded its permitted parameter. It was the claimant's job duty to inform the Plant Manager of this information as soon as he became aware of the non-compliance. Even though he was aware of the non-compliant levels, the claimant did not make the report to the Plant Manager on April 25, 2023. Because of the final incident, claimant's failure to complete his notification duty, he was discharged from employment.

The claimant had been coached on completion of his duties on several occasions previously. The claimant's pay had been reduced due to his failure to complete his job duties. The claimant was warned that he may be discharged from employment if the issues continued.

In January 2023, the plant was out of compliance in iron content by a large amount. The claimant did not notify his supervisor, per his duty, until February 13, 2023. The report from the State had already been issued by the time the claimant provided notification to his supervisor about the non-compliance. When confronted by the employer, the claimant stated that he felt the decimal place was wrong. He then stated that he knew it was wrong, but he was going to obtain another sample. The claimant's job duties require him to notify his supervisor as soon as he was aware of the non-compliance, even if he had questions about the sample taken. He did not do that.

REASONING AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:

For the reasons that follow, the administrative law judge concludes the claimant was discharged for job-related misconduct. Benefits are denied.

Iowa Code § 96.5(2)a provides:

An individual shall be disqualified for benefits:

- 2. Discharge for misconduct. If the department finds that the individual has been discharged for misconduct in connection with the individual's employment:
- a. The individual shall be disqualified for benefits until the individual has worked in and has been paid wages for insured work equal to ten times the individual's weekly benefit amount, provided the individual is otherwise eligible.

Iowa Admin. Code r. 871-24.32(1)a provides:

Discharge for misconduct.

- (1) Definition.
- a. "Misconduct" is defined as a deliberate act or omission by a worker which constitutes a material breach of the duties and obligations arising out of such worker's contract of employment. Misconduct as the term is used in the disqualification provision as being limited to conduct evincing such willful or wanton disregard of an employer's interest as is found in deliberate violation or disregard of standards of behavior which the employer has the right to expect of employees, or in carelessness or negligence of such degree of recurrence as to manifest equal culpability, wrongful intent or evil design, or to show an intentional and substantial disregard of the employer's interests or of the employee's duties and obligations to the employer. On the other hand mere inefficiency, unsatisfactory conduct, failure in good performance as the result of inability or incapacity, inadvertencies or ordinary negligence in isolated instances, or good faith errors in judgment or discretion are not to be deemed misconduct within the meaning of the statute.

This definition has been accepted by the Iowa Supreme Court as accurately reflecting the intent of the legislature. *Huntoon v. Iowa Dep't of Job Serv.*, 275 N.W.2d 445, 448 (Iowa 1979).

Iowa Admin. Code r. 871-24.32(4) provides:

(4) Report required. The claimant's statement and employer's statement must give detailed facts as to the specific reason for the claimant's discharge. Allegations of

misconduct or dishonesty without additional evidence shall not be sufficient to result in disqualification. If the employer is unwilling to furnish available evidence to corroborate the allegation, misconduct cannot be established. In cases where a suspension or disciplinary layoff exists, the claimant is considered as discharged, and the issue of misconduct shall be resolved.

Iowa Admin. Code r.871-24.32(8) provides:

(8) Past acts of misconduct. While past acts and warnings can be used to determine the magnitude of a current act of misconduct, a discharge for misconduct cannot be based on such past act or acts. The termination of employment must be based on a current act.

It is the duty of the administrative law judge as the trier of fact in this case, to determine the credibility of witnesses, weigh the evidence and decide the facts in issue. *Arndt v. City of LeClaire*, 728 N.W.2d 389, 394-395 (lowa 2007). The administrative law judge may believe all, part or none of any witness's testimony. *State v. Holtz*, 548 N.W.2d 162, 163 (lowa App. 1996). In assessing the credibility of witnesses, the administrative law judge should consider the evidence using his or her own observations, common sense and experience. *Id.* In determining the facts, and deciding what testimony to believe, the fact finder may consider the following factors: whether the testimony is reasonable and consistent with other believable evidence; whether a witness has made inconsistent statements; the witness's appearance, conduct, age, intelligence, memory and knowledge of the facts; and the witness's interest in the trial, their motive, candor, bias and prejudice. *Id.* After assessing the credibility of the witnesses who testified during the hearing, considering the applicable factors listed above, and using her own common sense and experience, the Administrative Law Judge finds that the employer's testimony is credible.

The employer has the burden of proof in establishing disqualifying job misconduct. Cosper v. lowa Dep't of Job Serv., 321 N.W.2d 6 (lowa 1982). The issue is not whether the employer made a correct decision in separating claimant, but whether the claimant is entitled to unemployment insurance benefits. Infante v. Iowa Dep't of Job Serv., 364 N.W.2d 262 (Iowa Ct. App. 1984). Misconduct serious enough to warrant discharge is not necessarily serious enough to warrant a denial of job insurance benefits. Such misconduct must be "substantial." Newman v. Iowa Dep't of Job Serv., 351 N.W.2d 806 (Iowa Ct. App. 1984). The focus of the administrative code definition of misconduct is on deliberate, intentional or culpable acts by the employee. Id. When based on carelessness, the carelessness must actually indicate a "wrongful intent" to be disqualifying in nature. Id. Negligence does not constitute misconduct unless recurrent in nature; a single act is not disqualifying unless indicative of a deliberate disregard of the employer's interests. Henry v. lowa Dep't of Job Serv., 391 N.W.2d 731 (lowa Ct. App. 1986). Further, poor work performance is not misconduct in the absence of evidence of intent. Miller v. Emp't Appeal Bd., 423 N.W.2d 211 (lowa Ct. App. 1988). The law limits disqualifying misconduct to substantial and willful wrongdoing or repeated carelessness or negligence that equals willful misconduct in culpability. Lee v. Employment Appeal Bd., 616 N.W.2d 661 (lowa 2000). A lapse of 11 days from final act until discharge when claimant was notified on fourth day that his conduct was grounds for dismissal did not make final act a "past act". Greene v. Emp't Appeal Bd., 426 N.W.2d 659 (Iowa Ct. App. 1988).

This was not an incident of carelessness or poor work performance. Claimant intentionally failed to notify his supervisor of the plant's non-compliance with required parameter. In January, the claimant waited weeks before notifying his supervisor of the non-compliance. The claimant was aware of that his job duty included informing his employer of non-compliance as soon as he

became aware. He had previously been coached on the issue and received a dock in his pay because of the issue. His continued failure to notify his supervisor when he became aware of the plant being out of its parameters were intentional acts and the acts were a substantial violation of the employer's policies and procedures.

The employer has a right to expect that an employee will not jeopardize the liability of the employer by intentionally violating policies that are in place. There is substantial evidence in the record to support the conclusion that claimant deliberately violated these rightful expectations in this case. Accordingly, the employer has met its burden of proof in establishing that the claimant's conduct consisted of deliberate acts that constituted an intentional and substantial disregard of the employer's interests. These actions rise to the level of willful misconduct. As such, benefits are denied.

DECISION:

The July 31, 2023 (reference 02) unemployment insurance decision is affirmed. Claimant was discharged from employment for job-related misconduct. Benefits are withheld in regards to this employer until such time as claimant is deemed eligible.

APPEAL RIGHTS. If you disagree with the decision, you or any interested party may:

1. Appeal to the Employment Appeal Board within fifteen (15) days of the date under the judge's signature by submitting a written appeal via mail, fax, or online to:

The appeal period will be extended to the next business day if the last day to appeal falls on a weekend or a legal holiday.

AN APPEAL TO THE BOARD SHALL STATE CLEARLY:

- 1) The name, address, and social security number of the claimant.
- 2) A reference to the decision from which the appeal is taken.
- 3) That an appeal from such decision is being made and such appeal is signed.
- 4) The grounds upon which such appeal is based.

An Employment Appeal Board decision is final agency action. If a party disagrees with the Employment Appeal Board decision, they may then file a petition for judicial review in district court.

2. If no one files an appeal of the judge's decision with the Employment Appeal Board within fifteen (15) days, the decision becomes final agency action, and you have the option to file a petition for judicial review in District Court within thirty (30) days after the decision becomes final. Additional information on how to file a petition can be found at Iowa Code §17A.19, which is online at https://www.legis.iowa.gov/docs/code/17A.19.pdf or by contacting the District Court Clerk of Court https://www.iowacourts.gov/iowa-courts/court-directory/.

Note to Claimant: It is important that you file your weekly claim as directed, while this appeal is pending, to protect your continuing right to benefits.
