# STATEMENT OF THE CASE:

Claimant filed an appeal from a decision of a representative dated June 22, 2022, (reference 03) which held claimant ineligible for unemployment insurance benefits. After due notice, a hearing was scheduled for and held on August 18, 2022. Claimant participated personally. Employer failed to respond to the hearing notice and did not participate.

# ISSUE:

The issue in this matter is whether claimant was discharged for misconduct?

# **FINDINGS OF FACT:**

The administrative law judge, having heard the testimony and considered all of the evidence in the record, finds: Claimant last worked for employer on June 9, 2022.

Employer discharged claimant on June 9, 2022 because claimant used insulting and harassing comments towards management in violation of company policy after receiving a warning about doing so previously.

Claimant worked as a full time returns processor and as a picker for employer. When hired she did receive an employee handbook which included company policies. Included in those company policies were policies on harassment and against the use of vulgar and demeaning language against coworkers, customers and management.

On April 27, 2022, claimant was upset that she was asked to work out of a different position than she normally worked. The position she was to work out of was not properly set up. This would put claimant in a position where she would be behind in reaching her numbers for the day as she would have to take time to set up her area before she started doing her job. She stated that this, "Hurts my fucking numbers", "Pisses me off", and "Is bullshit". This was overheard by coworkers who reported the statements to management. Claimant admitted her statements and was written up in a warning by management.

On June 9, 2022, claimant was nearing the end of her shift when a manager asked her to do a pick. Claimant was upset as she didn't believe she had time to finish it before the end of her shift. Although she did get it done, it extended her shift by an extra minute. As claimant was leaving, she stated, "If she ever fucking does that to me again, I'll walk out the door." This comment was overheard by a coworker who reported it to management.

As claimant had previously been warned, claimant was terminated for again making harassing and insulting comments while on the work floor during her shift.

# **REASONING AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:**

Iowa Code section 96.5(2)a provides:

An individual shall be disqualified for benefits, regardless of the source of the individual's wage credits:

- 2. Discharge for misconduct. If the department finds that the individual has been discharged for misconduct in connection with the individual's employment:
- a. The disqualification shall continue until the individual has worked in and has been paid wages for insured work equal to ten times the individual's weekly benefit amount, provided the individual is otherwise eligible.

Iowa Admin. Code r. 871-24.32(1)a provides:

Discharge for misconduct.

- (1) Definition.
- a. "Misconduct" is defined as a deliberate act or omission by a worker which constitutes a material breach of the duties and obligations arising out of such worker's contract of employment. Misconduct as the term is used in the disqualification provision as being limited to conduct evincing such willful or wanton disregard of an employer's interest as is found in deliberate violation or disregard of standards of behavior which the employer has the right to expect of employees, or in carelessness or negligence of such degree of recurrence as to manifest equal culpability, wrongful intent or evil design, or to show an intentional and substantial disregard of the employer's interests or of the employee's duties and obligations to the employer. On the other hand, mere inefficiency, unsatisfactory conduct, failure in good performance as the result of inability or incapacity, inadvertencies or ordinary negligence in isolated instances, or good faith errors in judgment or discretion are not to be deemed misconduct within the meaning of the statute.

This definition has been accepted by the Iowa Supreme Court as accurately reflecting the intent of the legislature. *Huntoon v. Iowa Dep't of Job Serv.*, 275 N.W.2d 445, 448 (Iowa 1979).

A claimant is not qualified to receive unemployment insurance benefits if an employer has discharged the claimant for reasons constituting work connected misconduct. Iowa Code § 96.5-2-a. Before a claimant can be denied unemployment insurance benefits, the employer has the burden to establish the claimant was discharged for work-connected misconduct. Cosper v. Iowa Department of Job Service, 321 N.W.2d 6 (Iowa 1982), Iowa Code § 96.5-2-a.

The employer bears the burden of proving that a claimant is disqualified from receiving benefits because of substantial misconduct within the meaning of lowa Code section 96.5(2). *Myers*, 462 N.W.2d at 737. The propriety of a discharge is not at issue in an unemployment insurance case. An employer may be justified in discharging an employee, but the employee's conduct may not amount to misconduct precluding the payment of unemployment compensation. Because our unemployment compensation law is designed to protect workers from financial hardships when they become unemployed through no fault of their own, we construe the provisions "liberally to carry out its humane and beneficial purpose." *Bridgestone/Firestone, Inc. v. Emp't Appeal Bd.*, 570 N.W.2d 85, 96 (Iowa 1997). "[C]ode provisions which operate to work a forfeiture of benefits are strongly construed in favor of the claimant." *Diggs v. Emp't Appeal Bd.*, 478 N.W.2d 432, 434 (Iowa Ct. App. 1991).

The gravity of the incident, number of policy violations and prior warnings are factors considered when analyzing misconduct. The lack of a current warning may detract from a finding of an intentional policy violation.

In this matter, the evidence established that claimant was discharged for an act of misconduct when claimant violated employer's policy concerning the use of vulgar and harassing language at work after warning. Claimant was warned concerning this policy.

The last incident, which brought about the discharge, constitutes misconduct because claimant knew that her foul language would not be accepted, and yet she chose to make a threatening and foul statement as she was leaving work after a manager asked her to do a pick of products near the end of her shift. The administrative law judge holds that claimant was discharged for an act of misconduct and, as such, is disqualified for the receipt of unemployment insurance benefits.

# **DECISION:**

The decision of the representative dated June 22, 2022, (reference 03) is affirmed. Unemployment insurance benefits shall be withheld until claimant has worked in and been paid wages for insured work equal to ten times claimant's weekly benefit amount, provided claimant is otherwise eligible.

APPEAL RIGHTS. If you disagree with the decision, you or any interested party may:

1. Appeal to the Employment Appeal Board within fifteen (15) days of the date under the judge's signature by submitting a written appeal via mail, fax, or online to:

The appeal period will be extended to the next business day if the last day to appeal falls on a weekend or a legal holiday. There is no filing fee to file an appeal with the Employment Appeal Board.

#### AN APPEAL TO THE BOARD SHALL STATE CLEARLY:

- 1) The name, address, and social security number of the claimant.
- 2) A reference to the decision from which the appeal is taken.
- 3) That an appeal from such decision is being made and such appeal is signed.
- 4) The grounds upon which such appeal is based.

An Employment Appeal Board decision is final agency action. If a party disagrees with the Employment Appeal Board decision, they may file a petition for judicial review in district court.

2. If you do not file an appeal of the judge's decision with the Employment Appeal Board within fifteen (15) days, the decision becomes final agency action, and you have the option to file a petition for judicial review in District Court within thirty (30) days after the decision becomes final. There may be a filing fee to file the petition in District Court.
