STATEMENT OF THE CASE:

The claimant filed an appeal from the February 2, 2023 (reference 01), unemployment insurance decision that denied benefits based upon her voluntary quit. The parties were properly notified about the hearing. A telephone hearing was held on February 23, 2023. Claimant, Shirley Ritchie, participated and testified. Employer, Walmart Inc, participated through Neal Anderson. No exhibits were offered or admitted.

ISSUE:

Was the separation a layoff, discharge for misconduct or voluntary quit without good cause attributable to the employer?

FINDINGS OF FACT:

Having reviewed all of the evidence in the record, the administrative law judge finds: Claimant was employed full-time beginning March 29, 2022 as a part-time asset protection services team associate. The claimant's immediate supervisor at the time of her separation was Shelly Detches. December 26, 2022 was the last day the claimant physically worked for the employer. The claimant resigned from her position on December 26, 2022.

On December 26, 2022 the claimant was called into Shelly Detch's office. The meeting was intended to go over all job duties and responsibilities as a "leveling conversation". The claimant was informed of a change of command and was told that she should report to Shelly going forward. The claimant expressed acknowledgement of that change of command. She also expressed her concern about the heaters not working in the store and that employees were getting sick and cold. During the conversation, the claimant said she hated her job and hated it there. Mr. Anderson responded by saying it may not be the right job for her. The claimant responded that he was correct, it was not the right job for her. She swore at Mr. Anderson, walked out of the meeting, and left the store. The claimant did not return to work after the meeting.

The claimant provided testimony about various issues and concerns she had with Wal-Mart during the course of her employment. For example, the claimant was concerned that she would have a hard time on occasions getting someone to cover for her so she could go on break. At

times the claimant was frustrated when other employees such as cleaning crew would ask her for directions rather than asking his/her own supervisor. The claimant did not report any of her concerns to human resources or any other appropriate body.

Continuing work was available for the claimant had the claimant remained at work.

REASONING AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:

For the reasons that follow, the administrative law judge concludes claimant's separation from the employment was without good cause attributable to the employer.

Iowa Code section 96.5(1) provides:

An individual shall be disqualified for benefits:

1. Voluntary quitting. If the individual has left work voluntarily without good cause attributable to the individual's employer, if so found by the department.

Iowa Admin. Code r. 871-24.25 provides:

Voluntary quit without good cause. In general, a voluntary quit means discontinuing the employment because the employee no longer desires to remain in the relationship of an employee with the employer from whom the employee has separated. The employer has the burden of proving that the claimant is disqualified for benefits pursuant to lowa Code section 96.5. However, the claimant has the initial burden to produce evidence that the claimant is not disqualified for benefits in cases involving lowa Code section 96.5, subsection (1), paragraphs "a" through "i," and subsection 10. The following reasons for a voluntary quit shall be presumed to be without good cause attributable to the employer:

work environment (Iowa Admin. Code r. 871-24.25(21))

(21) The claimant left because of dissatisfaction with the work environment.

personality conflict w/ supervisor (Iowa Admin. Code r. 871-24.25(22))

(22) The claimant left because of a personality conflict with the supervisor.

Employer accepted resignation (Iowa Admin. Code r. 871-24.25(37))

(37) The claimant will be considered to have left employment voluntarily when such claimant gave the employer notice of an intention to resign and the employer accepted such resignation. This rule shall also apply to the claimant who was employed by an educational institution who has declined or refused to accept a new contract or reasonable assurance of work for a successive academic term or year and the offer of work was within the purview of the individual's training and experience.

Claimant has the burden of proving that the voluntary leaving was for good cause attributable to the employer. Iowa Code § 96.6(2). "Good cause" for leaving employment must be that which

is reasonable to the average person, not the overly sensitive individual or the claimant in particular. *Uniweld Products v. Indus. Relations Comm'n*, 277 So.2d 827 (Fla. Dist. Ct. App. 1973). A voluntary leaving of employment requires an intention to terminate the employment relationship accompanied by an overt act of carrying out that intention. *Local Lodge #1426 v. Wilson Trailer*, 289 N.W.2d 608, 612 (Iowa 1980).

While claimant's leaving may have been based upon good personal reasons, it was not for a good-cause reason attributable to the employer according to lowa law. During the testimony, the claimant expressed various concerns about what occurred at Wal Mart. However, none of the concerns were reported to appropriate supervising bodies or human resources. A reasonable person would report these concerns and attempt to alleviate the issues prior to resigning from the position. Benefits are denied.

DECISION:

The February 2, 2023, (reference 01) unemployment insurance decision is affirmed. The claimant voluntarily left her employment without good cause attributable to the employer. Benefits are withheld until such time as she has worked in and been paid wages for insured work equal to ten times her weekly benefit amount, provided she is otherwise eligible.

- 2) A reference to the decision from which the appeal is taken.
- 3) That an appeal from such decision is being made and such appeal is signed.
- 4) The grounds upon which such appeal is based.

An Employment Appeal Board decision is final agency action. If a party disagrees with the Employment Appeal Board decision, they may then file a petition for judicial review in district court.

2. If no one files an appeal of the judge's decision with the Employment Appeal Board within fifteen (15) days, the decision becomes final agency action, and you have the option to file a petition for judicial review in District Court within thirty (30) days after the decision becomes final. Note to Claimant: It is important that you file your weekly claim as directed, while this appeal is pending, to protect your continuing right to benefits.
