STATEMENT OF THE CASE:

The claimant filed an appeal from the November 28, 2017, (reference 02), unemployment insurance decision that denied claimant's request for retroactive benefits. After due notice was issued, a telephone conference hearing was scheduled to be held on December 27, 2017. Claimant participated.

ISSUE:

Should the claimant's request for retroactive benefits be granted for the two-week period ending November 25, 2017?

FINDINGS OF FACT:

Having reviewed all of the evidence in the record, the administrative law judge finds: Claimant filed an original claim effective October 29, 2017. She did not file continued claims by online web application for the two-week period ending November 25, 2017. Claimant did not file h34 continued weekly claim for the one week ending November 18, 2017, because she was dealing with a lot of issues in her personal like. The deadline to file a claim for that week was Friday, November 24, 2017, at 5:30 p.m. On November 26, 2017, claimant attempted to file a weekly continued claim for the one week ending November 25, 2017. Because claimant did not file her weekly continued claim for one week, her claim closed and she was unable to file the claim for the one week ending November 25, 2017. When claimant recognized the issue, she contacted the lowa Workforce Development (IWD) and was assisted in reopening the claim.

Claimant testified she is currently on Department Approved Training, working on an on-call basis, and making weekly job searches for work that is more permanent. Claimant was not sure, at the time of her hearing, what wages, if any she earned for the weeks in question. Claimant was aware she was required to file a continued claim for each week she was seeking benefits, but was not aware her claim would close if she missed only one weekly filing.

REASONING AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:

For the reasons that follow, the administrative law judge concludes the claimant's request for retroactive benefits is granted in part and denied in part.

Iowa Code section 96.6(1) provides:

96.6 Filing — determination — appeal.

1. *Filing.* Claims for benefits shall be made in accordance with such regulations as the department may prescribe.

In order to be eligible for weekly benefits, the claimant must file an online web application continued claim or show good cause for the failure to do so to support a request for retroactive benefits. Iowa Admin. Code r. 871-24.2(1)g.

The December 2017, version of the *Unemployment Insurance Benefits Handbook*, provides in pertinent part at pages 13 and 14:

Claim Effective Date

The effective date of all UI claims, regardless of filing method, will be the Sunday of the week in which the application was filed. The effective date of a claim will not be changed for applications that were not filed in a timely manner.

and

Reactivating a Claim

An individual can start and stop claiming weekly benefits as many times as necessary during the benefit year. This is called a break in reporting status. Any break in reporting requires the individual to file another initial claim application during the week they want to start collecting benefits again. Any employment during the break must be reported.

The December 2017, version of the *Unemployment Insurance Benefits Handbook*, provides in pertinent part at pages 19 and 20:

Filing Weekly Claims

How to File

After you file your initial claim, file weekly claims online at iowaworkforcedevelopment.gov for every week you are unemployed or your hours are reduced. You must file a weekly claim for any week that you want payment even if your eligibility is being decided or you have an appeal pending.

To request UI benefit payments during weeks of unemployment, individuals must certify they:

- Are currently unemployed or working reduced hours
- Are able to work and available for work
- Have not refused any job offers or referrals to a job
- Are actively looking for work (unless waived)
- Are reporting any pay or pension payment

When to File

The current week is the week that just ended on Saturday. Weekly claims must be filed 8 am Sunday through 5:30 pm Friday for the prior week only. This means individuals have six days to file the previous week's claim. See the chart above for the days available to file. Weekly claims can be filed online using a mobile device or computer at https://uiclaims.iwd.iowa.gov/weeklyclaims/.

Delay in filing your weekly claim could result in denial of benefits.

IMPORTANT: You will receive confirmation that the claim has been processed successfully. If you don't receive confirmation, the process must be repeated until the claim has been successfully submitted.

In this case, claimant was aware she needed to file a weekly claim each week she was seeking benefits. Claimant failed to file a weekly continued claim during the week ending November 18, 2017, because of situations involving her personal life. This is not a good cause reason for failing to file a weekly claim. However, claimant attempted to timely file her weekly claim the next week. Claimant was unable to because the claim closed after one week of failing to file a continued weekly claim.

Although the Unemployment Insurance Handbook addresses reactivating a claim, it does not clearly state that a claim will close after only one week of failing to file a continued weekly claim. Even if it did, it would have been technically impossible for claimant to reopen the claim in order to file a continued weekly claim for the week ending November 25, 2017. The claim did not close until the deadline to make a weekly claim filing—November 24, 2017, at 5:30 p.m. However, claimant only had until November 24, 2017, at 4:30 p.m. to reopen the claim. In other

words, there was no closed claim for claimant to reopen. There is nothing claimant could have done to prevent the second missed weekly claim filing.

Claimant has shown a good cause reason for failing to file her weekly continued claim for the one week ending November 25, 2017. Therefore, claimant's request for retroactive benefits for the one week ending November 25, 2017, is allowed. Claimant indicated she may have earned wages during the week in question, but was not sure what those wages were. The issue must therefore be remanded to the benefits bureau for investigation as to the deductibility of the claimant's wages for the week ending November 25, 2017.

DECISION:

The November 28, 2017, (reference 02) unemployment insurance decision is modified in favor of appellant. The claimant's request for retroactive benefits is granted for the one week ending November 25, 2017, and denied for the one week ending November 18, 2017.

REMAND:

The issue of the deductibility of claimant's wages from her benefits for the week of November 19, 2017 is remanded to the benefits bureau for initial investigation and determination.
