Section 96.5-1 - Voluntary Quit Section 96.3-7 – Overpayment

STATEMENT OF THE CASE:

Quillin's Iowa (employer) appealed a representative's April 30, 2004 decision (reference 01) that concluded Richard Steele (claimant) voluntarily quit due to a change in the contract for hire. After hearing notices were mailed to the parties' last-known addresses of record, a telephone hearing was held on May 26, 2004. The claimant participated personally. The employer participated by Don Nagel, Store Manager.

FINDINGS OF FACT:

The administrative law judge, having heard the testimony and considered all of the evidence in the record, finds that: The claimant was hired on June 1, 2000, and at the end of his employment was working as a full-time cook. The claimant worked Wednesday through Sunday, 6:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. On or about March 4, 2004, the employer told the claimant that he wanted the claimant to start working one Friday night per month. The claimant worked another job on Friday nights and could not work for the employer on Friday nights. On March 4, 2004, the claimant told the employer he was quitting because he could not work Friday nights.

REASONING AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:

The issue is whether the claimant voluntarily quit without good cause attributable to the employer. For the following reasons the administrative law judge concludes he did not.

871 IAC 24.26(1) provides:

Voluntary quit with good cause attributable to the employer and separations not considered to be voluntary quits. The following are reasons for a claimant leaving employment with good cause attributable to the employer:

(1) A change in the contract of hire. An employer's willful breach of contract of hire shall not be a disqualifiable issue. This would include any change that would jeopardize the worker's safety, health or morals. The change of contract of hire must be substantial in nature and could involve changes in working hours, shifts, remuneration, location of employment, drastic modification in type of work, etc. Minor changes in a worker's routine on the job would not constitute a change of contract of hire.

An employee must give prior notice to the employer before quitting due to a change in the contract of hire. <u>Cobb v. Employment Appeal Board</u>, 506 N.W.2d 445 (Iowa 1993). The claimant quit work because the employer changed his hours worked. Due to the claimant's failure to give the employer notice, there cannot be a finding that he left work due to a change in his contract for hire and, therefore, the claimant is not eligible to receive unemployment insurance benefits.

Iowa Code Section 96.3-7 provides:

7. Recovery of overpayment of benefits. If an individual receives benefits for which the individual is subsequently determined to be ineligible, even though the individual acts in good faith and is not otherwise at fault, the benefits shall be recovered. The department in its discretion may recover the overpayment of benefits either by having a sum equal to the overpayment deducted from any future benefits payable to the individual or by having the individual pay to the department a sum equal to the overpayment.

If the department determines that an overpayment has been made, the charge for the overpayment against the employer's account shall be removed and the account shall be credited with an amount equal to the overpayment from the unemployment compensation trust fund and this credit shall include both contributory and reimbursable employers, notwithstanding section 96.8, subsection 5.

The claimant has received benefits in the amount of \$1,475.00 since filing his claim herein. Pursuant to this decision, those benefits now constitute an overpayment which must be repaid.

DECISION:

The representative's April 30, 2004 decision (reference 01) is reversed. The claimant voluntarily left work without good cause attributable to the employer. Benefits are withheld until he has worked in and has been paid wages for insured work equal to ten times his weekly benefit amount provided he is otherwise eligible. The claimant is overpaid benefits in the amount of \$1,475.00.
