STATEMENT OF THE CASE:

The employer, Swift Pork Company, filed an appeal from the September 2, 2022, (reference 01) unemployment insurance decision that granted benefits based upon the conclusion he was discharged due to a non-disqualifying act. The parties were properly notified of the hearing. A telephone hearing was held on October 7, 2022. The claimant did not participate. The employer participated through Human Resources Administrative Assistant Christina Cervantez. Official notice was taken of the agency records.

ISSUES:

Was the claimant discharged for disqualifying job-related misconduct?

Whether the claimant was overpaid benefits.

Whether he is excused from repaying these benefits due to the employer's non-participation at factfinding.

FINDINGS OF FACT:

Having reviewed all of the evidence in the record, the administrative law judge finds:

The claimant worked full-time as a third shift maintenance mechanic from June 21, 2021, until he was separated from employment on August 17, 2022, when he was terminated.

The employer has an employee handbook. The employee handbook forbids employees from sleeping on the job. The claimant acknowledged receipt of the handbook on June 21, 2021.

On August 3, 2022, the claimant was found slouching at a machine with his arms in front of him in the office. The claimant's eyes were closed. The office is air conditioned. The claimant had worked a long shift in high heat areas earlier that day and fell asleep inadvertently.

On August 17, 2022, the claimant was terminated for the one incident occurring on August 3, 2022. The claimant was suspended effective immediately pending the results of the investigation.

The claimant had not been disciplined for sleeping on the job in the past.

The following section of the findings of fact describe the findings necessary to resolve the participation issue:

The claimant filed for and received \$624.00 in regular unemployment insurance benefits for the week ending August 20, 2022.

lowa Workforce Development Department sent a notice of factfinding to the parties on August 23, 2022 informing them of an investigative interview on August 30, 2022 at 1:20 p.m. The employer participated though the following statement on its State Information Data Exchange System ("SIDES"), "The claimant was discharged for sleeping on the job in the Rendo room. Sleeping on the job is strictly prohibited." It gave the final incident date and separation date. The claimant testified personally. He acknowledged sleeping, but he said it was due to heat exhaustion and a remarkably long shift.

REASONING AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:

For the reasons that follow, the administrative law judge concludes the employer has failed to meet its burden of production to show the claimant engaged in work-related misconduct. Since the employer has failed to meet its burden, the overpayment issue is moot.

Iowa Code section 96.5(2)a provides:

An individual shall be disqualified for benefits:

- 2. Discharge for misconduct. If the department finds that the individual has been discharged for misconduct in connection with the individual's employment:
- a. The individual shall be disqualified for benefits until the individual has worked in and has been paid wages for insured work equal to ten times the individual's weekly benefit amount, provided the individual is otherwise eligible.

Iowa Admin. Code r. 871-24.32(1)a provides:

Discharge for misconduct.

- (1) Definition.
- a. "Misconduct" is defined as a deliberate act or omission by a worker which constitutes a material breach of the duties and obligations arising out of such worker's contract of employment. Misconduct as the term is used in the disqualification provision as being limited to conduct evincing such willful or wanton disregard of an employer's interest as is found in deliberate violation or disregard of standards of behavior which the employer has the right to expect of employees, or in carelessness or negligence of such degree of recurrence as to manifest equal culpability, wrongful intent or evil design, or to show an intentional and substantial disregard of the employer's interests or of the employee's duties and obligations to the employer. On the other hand mere inefficiency,

unsatisfactory conduct, failure in good performance as the result of inability or incapacity, inadvertencies or ordinary negligence in isolated instances, or good faith errors in judgment or discretion are not to be deemed misconduct within the meaning of the statute.

This definition has been accepted by the lowa Supreme Court as accurately reflecting the intent of the legislature. *Huntoon v. Iowa Dep't of Job Serv.*, 275 N.W.2d 445, 448 (Iowa 1979).

Iowa Code section 96.5(2)b, c and d provide:

An individual shall be disqualified for benefits, regardless of the source of the individual's wage credits:

- 2. Discharge for misconduct. If the department finds that the individual has been discharged for misconduct in connection with the individual's employment:
- b. Provided further, if gross misconduct is established, the department shall cancel the individual's wage credits earned, prior to the date of discharge, from all employers.
- c. Gross misconduct is deemed to have occurred after a claimant loses employment as a result of an act constituting an indictable offense in connection with the claimant's employment, provided the claimant is duly convicted thereof or has signed a statement admitting the commission of such an act. Determinations regarding a benefit claim may be redetermined within five years from the effective date of the claim. Any benefits paid to a claimant prior to a determination that the claimant has lost employment as a result of such act shall not be considered to have been accepted by the claimant in good faith.
- d. For the purposes of this subsection, "misconduct" means a deliberate act or omission by an employee that constitutes a material breach of the duties and obligations arising out of the employee's contract of employment. Misconduct is limited to conduct evincing such willful or wanton disregard of an employer's interest as is found in deliberate violation or disregard of standards of behavior which the employer has the right to expect of employees, or in carelessness or negligence of such degree of recurrence as to manifest equal culpability, wrongful intent or even design, or to show an intentional and substantial disregard of the employer's interests or of the employee's duties and obligations to the employer. Misconduct by an individual includes but is not limited to all of the following:
- (1) Material falsification of the individual's employment application.
- (2) Knowing violation of a reasonable and uniformly enforced rule of an employer.
- (3) Intentional damage of an employer's property.
- (4) Consumption of alcohol, illegal or nonprescribed prescription drugs, or an impairing substance in a manner not directed by the manufacturer, or a combination of such substances, on the employer's premises in violation of the employer's employment policies.
- (5) Reporting to work under the influence of alcohol, illegal or nonprescribed prescription drugs, or an impairing substance in an off-label manner, or a combination of such substances, on the employer's premises in violation of the employer's employment

policies, unless the individual if compelled to work by the employer outside of scheduled or on-call working hours.

- (6) Conduct that substantially and unjustifiably endangers the personal safety of coworkers or the general public.
- (7) Incarceration for an act for which one could reasonably expect to be incarcerated that result in missing work.
- (8) Incarceration as a result of a misdemeanor or felony conviction by a court of competent jurisdiction.
- (9) Excessive unexcused tardiness or absenteeism.
- (10) Falsification of any work-related report, task, or job that could expose the employer or coworkers to legal liability or sanction for violation of health or safety laws.
- (11) Failure to maintain any licenses, registration, or certification that is reasonably required by the employer or by law, or that is a functional requirement to perform the individual's regular job duties, unless the failure is not within the control of the individual.
- (12) Conduct that is libelous or slanderous toward an employer or an employee of the employer if such conduct is not protected under state or federal law.
- (13) Theft of an employer or coworker's funds or property.
- (14) Intentional misrepresentation of time worked or work carried out that results in the individual receiving unearned wages or unearned benefits.

The employer has the burden of proof in establishing disqualifying job misconduct. *Cosper v. lowa Dep't of Job Serv.*, 321 N.W.2d 6 (lowa 1982). The issue is not whether the employer made a correct decision in separating claimant, but whether the claimant is entitled to unemployment insurance benefits. *Infante v. lowa Dep't of Job Serv.*, 364 N.W.2d 262 (lowa Ct. App. 1984). The lowa Court of Appeals found substantial evidence of misconduct in testimony that the claimant worked slower than he was capable of working and would temporarily and briefly improve following oral reprimands. *Sellers v. Emp't Appeal Bd.*, 531 N.W.2d 645 (lowa Ct. App. 1995). Generally, continued refusal to follow reasonable instructions constitutes misconduct. *Gilliam v. Atlantic Bottling Co.*, 453 N.W.2d 230 (lowa Ct. App. 1990). Misconduct must be "substantial" to warrant a denial of job insurance benefits. *Newman v. lowa Dep't of Job Serv.*, 351 N.W.2d 806 (lowa Ct. App. 1984). Poor work performance is not misconduct in the absence of evidence of intent. *Miller v. Emp't Appeal Bd.*, 423 N.W.2d 211 (lowa Ct. App. 1988).

The administrative law judge finds the employer has not met its burden to show the claimant was discharged due to work-related misconduct. The administrative law judge acknowledges the employer can demonstrate that the claimant was asleep at work, and it had a policy prohibiting such conduct. What is missing is a demonstration of the claimant's behavior being a manifestation of willful violation of this rule. The claimant had not been disciplined for sleeping at work before. Furthermore, the manner the claimant was found sleeping is not one that demonstrates intentional violation. The claimant was slouched over at a workstation. While the administrative law judge is not saying an employee has to be laying down or be enlisting

sleeping aids such as pillows, the absence of these characteristics make it more difficult for the employer to meet its burden.

The claimant's posture is more aligned with the claimant's description that he simply unintentionally dozed off after working in a high temperature environment for an extended period. Simply dozing off after a hard day is not advisable, but it is not willful work-related misconduct. Benefits are granted, provided the claimant is otherwise eligible.

DECISION:

The September 2, 2022, (reference 01) unemployment insurance decision is AFFIRMED. The employer has not met its burden to show the claimant's sleeping on the job was due to intentional work-related misconduct. Benefits are granted, provided he is otherwise eligible.

1. Appeal to the Employment Appeal Board within fifteen (15) days of the date under the judge's signature by submitting a written appeal via mail, fax, or online to:

The appeal period will be extended to the next business day if the last day to appeal falls on a weekend or a legal holiday.

AN APPEAL TO THE BOARD SHALL STATE CLEARLY:

- 1) The name, address, and social security number of the claimant.
- 2) A reference to the decision from which the appeal is taken.
- 3) That an appeal from such decision is being made and such appeal is signed.
- 4) The grounds upon which such appeal is based.

An Employment Appeal Board decision is final agency action. If a party disagrees with the Employment Appeal Board decision, they may then file a petition for judicial review in district court.

2. If no one files an appeal of the judge's decision with the Employment Appeal Board within fifteen (15) days, the decision becomes final agency action, and you have the option to file a petition for judicial review in District Court within thirty (30) days after the decision becomes final. Additional information on how to file a petition can be found at lowa Code §17A.19, which is online at https://www.legis.jowa.gov/docs/code/17A.19.pdf or by contacting the District Court Clerk of Court https://www.iowacourts.gov/iowa-courts/court-directory/.
