Section 96.6-2 - Timeliness of Protest Section 96.5 – Regualification for Benefits

STATEMENT OF THE CASE:

The employer/appellant filed a timely appeal from the April 9, 2018, reference 02, decision that concluded it failed to file a timely protest regarding the claimant's separation of employment on January 23, 2018, and no disqualification of unemployment insurance benefits was imposed. The claimant participated in the hearing. Andrea Birt, Co-Owner, participated in the hearing on behalf of the employer. After due notice was issued, a hearing was scheduled on May 4, 2018, before Administrative Law Judge Julie Elder. Department's Exhibit D-1 was admitted to the record.

ISSUE:

The issue is whether the employer's protest is timely and whether the claimant has requalified for benefits.

FINDINGS OF FACT:

Having reviewed all of the evidence in the record, the administrative law judge finds: The claimant's notice of claim was mailed to the employer's address of record on March 21, 2018. The employer did file a protest on April 3, 2018. The employer was out of town from March 24 through April 1, 2018, and filed the claim when she returned to her office. The claimant has requalified for benefits since her separation from this employer.

REASONING AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:

Iowa Code § 96.6-2 provides in pertinent part:

2. Initial determination. A representative designated by the director shall promptly notify all interested parties to the claim of its filing, and the parties have ten days from the date of mailing the notice of the filing of the claim by ordinary mail to the last known address to protest payment of benefits to the claimant.

The administrative law judge concludes that the employer filed its protest within the time period prescribed by the lowa Employment Security Law because it did reply to the notice of claim when it received it. This is sufficient evidence of intent to protest any potential charges to its account. The administrative law judge further concludes that the claimant has requalified for benefits since the separation from this employer. Accordingly, benefits are allowed and the account of this employer shall not be charged.

DECISION:

The April 9, 2018, reference 02, decision is modified in favor of the appellant. The employer has filed a timely protest, and the claimant has requalified for benefits since the separation. Benefits are allowed, provided the claimant is otherwise eligible. The account of this employer shall not be charged.
