STATEMENT OF THE CASE:

On May 22, 2022, Kelly Pitts (claimant) filed a late appeal from the February 24, 2021 (reference 01) decision that denied benefits effective March 29 2020, based on the deputy's conclusion the claimant was an on-call worker, was still employed under the same hours and wages as in the original contract of hire, and was not available for work within the meaning of the law. After due notice was issued, a hearing was held on July 12, 2022. Claimant participated and presented additional testimony through Mike Pitts. Joyce Lundsgaard represented the employer. There were four appeal numbers set for a consolidated hearing: 22A-UI-12899-JT-T, 22A-UI-12900-JT-T, 22A-UI-12901-JT-T, and 22A-UI-12902-JT-T. Exhibits A and B, the claimant's emailed appeals, were received into evidence. The administrative law judge took official notice of the following Agency administrative records: the reference 01 through 04 decisions, the reference 02 fact-finding record (KFFV and supplemental documents), DBRO, the record of benefits paid (DBIN and KPYX), the weekly claims (KCCO), and the quarterly wage reports (WAGE-A).

ISSUE:

Whether the appeal was timely. Whether there is good cause to treat the appeal as timely.

FINDINGS OF FACT:

Having reviewed all of the evidence in the record, the administrative law judge finds:

On February 24, 2021, lowa Workforce Development mailed two decisions to the claimant's Cherokee last-known address of record. The reference 01 decision denied benefits effective March 29 2020, based on the deputy's conclusion the claimant was an on-call worker, was still employed under the same hours and wages as in the original contract of hire, and was not available for work within the meaning of the law. The reference 02 decision denied benefits effective May 31, 2020, based on the between academic terms disqualification set forth at Iowa Code section 96.4(5). The reference 01 and 02 decisions each stated the decision would become final unless an appeal was postmarked by March 6, 2021 or was received by the Appeals Section by that date. The reference 01 and 02 decisions each stated that if the deadline for appeal fell on a Saturday, Sunday or legal holiday, the deadline would be extended

to the next working day. March 6, 2021 was a Saturday and the next working day was Monday, March 8, 2021. The reference 01 and 02 decisions each included clear and concise instructions for filing an appeal. The claimant received the reference 01 and 02 decisions in a timely manner, prior to the deadline for appeal. The claimant read far enough into the decisions to discern the decisions denied benefits. The claimant did not read far enough into the decisions to read the appeal deadline. The claimant did not take steps to file an appeal from either decision by the March 8, 2021 extended appeal deadline.

On May 6, 2022, IWD mailed two overpayment decisions to the claimant. The reference 03 decision held the claimant was overpaid benefits due to the reference 01 decision that denied benefits effective March 29, 2020. The reference 04 held the claimant was overpaid benefits due to the reference 02 decision that denied benefits effective May 31, 2020. The overpayment decisions included a May 21, 2022 Saturday deadline for appeal extended to Monday, May 23, 2022.

On May 22, 2022, the claimant emailed two appeals to the Appeals Bureau. One appeal pertained to the reference 03 overpayment decision and the second pertained to the reference 04 overpayment decision. The Appeals Bureau received the appeals on May 22, 2022 and treated them as also late appeals from the reference 01 and 02 decisions.

REASONING AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:

lowa Code section 96.6(2) provides:

2. Initial determination. A representative designated by the director shall promptly notify all interested parties to the claim of its filing, and the parties have ten days from the date of mailing the notice of the filing of the claim by ordinary mail to the last known address to protest payment of benefits to the claimant. The representative shall promptly examine the claim and any protest, take the initiative to ascertain relevant information concerning the claim, and, on the basis of the facts found by the representative, shall determine whether or not the claim is valid, the week with respect to which benefits shall commence, the weekly benefit amount payable and its maximum duration, and whether any disqualification shall be imposed. The claimant has the burden of proving that the claimant meets the basic eligibility conditions of section 96.4. The employer has the burden of proving that the claimant is disgualified for benefits pursuant to section 96.5, except as provided by this subsection. The claimant has the initial burden to produce evidence showing that the claimant is not disqualified for benefits in cases involving section 96.5, subsections 10 and 11, and has the burden of proving that a voluntary guit pursuant to section 96.5, subsection 1, was for good cause attributable to the employer and that the claimant is not disgualified for benefits in cases involving section 96.5, subsection 1, paragraphs "a" through "h". Unless the claimant or other interested party, after notification or within ten calendar days after notification was mailed to the claimant's last known address, files an appeal from the decision, the decision is final and benefits shall be paid or denied in accordance with the decision. If an administrative law judge affirms a decision of the representative, or the appeal board affirms a decision of the administrative law judge allowing benefits, the benefits shall be paid regardless of any appeal which is thereafter taken, but if the decision is finally reversed, no employer's account shall be charged with benefits so paid and this relief from charges shall apply to both contributory and reimbursable employers, notwithstanding section 96.8, subsection 5.

The ten-day deadline for appeal begins to run on the date Workforce Development mails the decision to the parties. The "decision date" found in the upper right-hand portion of the Agency representative's decision, unless otherwise corrected immediately below that entry, is presumptive evidence of the date of mailing. *Gaskins v. Unempl. Comp. Bd. of Rev.*, 429 A.2d 138 (Pa. Comm. 1981); *Johnson v. Board of Adjustment*, 239 N.W.2d 873, 92 A.L.R.3d 304 (lowa 1976).

An appeal submitted by mail is deemed filed on the date it is mailed as shown by the postmark or in the absence of a postmark the postage meter mark of the envelope in which it was received, or if not postmarked or postage meter marked or if the mark is illegible, on the date entered on the document as the date of completion. See Iowa Administrative Code rule 871-24.35(1)(a). See also *Messina v. IDJS*, 341 N.W.2d 52 (Iowa 1983). An appeal submitted by any other means is deemed filed on the date it is received by the Unemployment Insurance Division of Iowa Workforce Development. See Iowa Administrative Code rule 871-24.35(1)(b).

The evidence in the record establishes that more than ten calendar days elapsed between the mailing date and the date this appeal was filed. The lowa Supreme Court has declared that there is a mandatory duty to file appeals from representatives' decisions within the time allotted by statute, and that the administrative law judge has no authority to change the decision of a representative if a timely appeal is not filed. Franklin v. IDJS, 277 N.W.2d 877, 881 (lowa 1979). Compliance with appeal notice provisions is jurisdictional unless the facts of a case show that the notice was invalid. Beardslee v. IDJS, 276 N.W.2d 373, 377 (lowa 1979); see also In re Appeal of Elliott, 319 N.W.2d 244, 247 (lowa 1982). One question in this case thus becomes whether the appellant was deprived of a reasonable opportunity to assert an appeal in timelv fashion. Hendren v. IESC, 217 N.W.2d 255 (lowa 1974); а Smith v. IESC, 212 N.W.2d 471, 472 (lowa 1973).

No submission shall be considered timely if the delay in filing was unreasonable, as determined by the division after considering the circumstances in the case. See lowa Administrative Code rule 871-24.35(2)(c).

The evidence in the record establishes an untimely appeal from the February 24, 2021 (reference 01) decision. The evidence establishes that the claimant received the reference 01 decision in a timely manner, had a reasonable opportunity to file an appeal by the March 8, 2021 extended appeal deadline, but unreasonably delayed filing the appeal to May 22, 2022. The late filing of the appeal was not attributable to the lowa Workforce Development error or misinformation or delay or other action of the United States Postal Service. There is not good cause to treat the late appeal as a timely appeal. See lowa Administrative Code rule 871-24.35(2). Because the appeal was untimely, administrative law judge lacks jurisdiction to disturb the reference 01 decision. See *Beardslee v. IDJS*, 276 N.W.2d 373 (lowa 1979) and *Franklin v. IDJS*, 277 N.W.2d 877 (lowa 1979).

DECISION:

The claimant's appeal from the February 24, 2021 (reference 01) decision was untimely. The decision that denied benefits effective March 29, 2020, based on the determination that the claimant did not meet the availability requirements, remains in effect.

1. Appeal to the Employment Appeal Board within fifteen (15) days of the date under the judge's signature by submitting a written appeal via mail, fax, or online to:

AN APPEAL TO THE BOARD SHALL STATE CLEARLY:

- 1) The name, address, and social security number of the claimant.
- 2) A reference to the decision from which the appeal is taken.
- 3) That an appeal from such decision is being made and such appeal is signed.
- 4) The grounds upon which such appeal is based.

An Employment Appeal Board decision is final agency action. If a party disagrees with the Employment Appeal Board decision, they may then file a petition for judicial review in district court.

2. If no one files an appeal of the judge's decision with the Employment Appeal Board within fifteen (15) days, the decision becomes final agency action, and you have the option to file a petition for judicial review in District Court within thirty (30) days after the decision becomes final. Additional information on how to file a petition can be found at low a Code §17A.19, which is online at https://www.legis.iowa.gov/docs/code/17A.19.pdf.

Note to Parties: YOU MAY REPRESENT yourself in the appeal or obtain a law yer or other interested party to do so provided there is no expense to Workforce Development. If you wish to be represented by a law yer, you may obtain the services of either a private attorney or one whose services are paid for with public funds.

Note to Claimant: It is important that you file your weekly claim as directed, while this appeal is pending, to protect your continuing right to benefits.
