Iowa Code § 96.3(7) - Recovery of Benefit Overpayment

STATEMENT OF THE CASE:

Shaquita Terrell (claimant/appellant) filed a timely appeal from the Iowa Workforce Development decision dated February 9, 2021 (reference 10) that determined claimant had been overpaid benefits in the amount of \$2,700.00 between May 31 and August 22, 2020.

A telephone hearing was held on April 16, 2021. The parties were properly notified of the hearing. Claimant participated personally. Official notice was taken of the administrative record.

ISSUE:

Was the claimant overpaid regular, state unemployment insurance benefits?

FINDINGS OF FACT:

Having reviewed all of the evidence in the record, the administrative law judge finds:

The unemployment insurance system shows claimant received weekly benefits in the amount of \$225.00 for a total of 15 weeks, from the benefit week ending May 16, 2020 and continuing through the benefit week ending August 22, 2020. The total amount of benefits paid to date is \$3,375.00. This included benefits paid in the amount of \$2,700.00 for the 12 weeks between May 31 and August 22, 2020.

Claimant was subsequently determined to be disqualified from benefits during that twelve-week period in a decision dated January 29, 2021. That disqualification decision has now been affirmed. *See* 21A-UI-04975-AD-T.

REASONING AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:

For the reasons set forth below, the decision dated February 9, 2021 (reference 10) that determined claimant had been overpaid benefits in the amount of \$2,700.00 between May 31 and August 22, 2020 is AFFIRMED.

Iowa Code section 96.3(7) provides, in pertinent part:

7. Recovery of overpayment of benefits.

a. If an individual receives benefits for which the individual is subsequently determined to be ineligible, even though the individual acts in good faith and is not otherwise at fault, the benefits shall be recovered. The department in its discretion may recover the overpayment of benefits either by having a sum equal to the overpayment deducted from any future benefits payable to the individual or by having the individual pay to the department a sum equal to the overpayment.

b. (1) (a) If the department determines that an overpayment has been made, the charge for the overpayment against the employer's account shall be removed and the account shall be credited with an amount equal to the overpayment from the unemployment compensation trust fund and this credit shall include both contributory and reimbursable employers, notwithstanding section 96.8, subsection 5.

Claimant received benefits in the amount of \$2,700.00 for the twelve weeks between May 31, and August 22, 2020. Claimant was subsequently determined to be disqualified from benefits during that period in a decision dated January 29, 2021. That disqualification decision has now been affirmed. *See* 21A-UI-04975-AD-T. Because claimant received benefits in the amount of \$2,700.00 for which she was later disqualified, she has been overpaid benefits in that amount.

DECISION:

The decision dated February 9, 2021 (reference 10) that determined claimant had been overpaid benefits in the amount of \$2,700.00 between May 31 and August 22, 2020 is AFFIRMED.
