Section 96.5-2-a - Discharge

STATEMENT OF THE CASE:

The employer, Advance Services, Inc. (Advance), filed an appeal from a decision dated July 22, 2004, reference 01. The decision allowed benefits to the claimant, Brian Graham. After due notice was issued a hearing was held by telephone conference call on August 24, 2004. The claimant participated on his own behalf. The employer participated by Account Coordinator Brandie Maher.

FINDINGS OF FACT:

Having heard the testimony of the witnesses and having examined all of the evidence in the record, the administrative law judge finds: Brian Graham was employed by Advance from June 9, 2003 until June 30, 2004. His last assignment began March 22, 2004, at Glacier.

Mr. Graham was absent June 21 through 25, 2004, and June 30, 2004. He called in each day to notify the employer and the client company he would be absent due to a prolonged migraine. A doctor's note was provided for the absences of June 23 through 25, 2004, and also for June 30, 2004, but he was notified by Mandy Henderson on that day he was discharged due to absenteeism.

REASONING AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:

The issue is whether the claimant is disqualified. The judge concludes he is not.

Iowa Code Section 96.5-2-a provides:

An individual shall be disqualified for benefits:

- 2. Discharge for misconduct. If the department finds that the individual has been discharged for misconduct in connection with the individual's employment:
- a. The individual shall be disqualified for benefits until the individual has worked in and has been paid wages for insured work equal to ten times the individual's weekly benefit amount, provided the individual is otherwise eligible.

871 IAC 24.32(1)a, (7) provide:

Discharge for misconduct.

- (1) Definition.
- a. "Misconduct" is defined as a deliberate act or omission by a worker which constitutes a material breach of the duties and obligations arising out of such worker's contract of employment. Misconduct as the term is used in the disqualification provision as being limited to conduct evincing such willful or wanton disregard of an employer's interest as is found in deliberate violation or disregard of standards of behavior which the employer has the right to expect of employees, or in carelessness or negligence of such degree of recurrence as to manifest equal culpability, wrongful intent or evil design, or to show an intentional and substantial disregard of the employer's interests or of the employee's duties and obligations to the employer. On the other hand mere inefficiency, unsatisfactory conduct, failure in good performance as the result of inability or incapacity, inadvertencies or ordinary negligence in isolated instances, or good faith errors in judgment or discretion are not to be deemed misconduct within the meaning of the statute.

This definition has been accepted by the Iowa Supreme Court as accurately reflecting the intent of the legislature. <u>Huntoon v. Iowa Department of Job Service</u>, 275 N.W.2d 445, 448 (Iowa 1979).

(7) Excessive unexcused absenteeism. Excessive unexcused absenteeism is an intentional disregard of the duty owed by the claimant to the employer and shall be considered misconduct except for illness or other reasonable grounds for which the employee was absent and that were properly reported to the employer.

The claimant was discharged for missing too much work due to illness. However, a properly reported illness cannot be considered misconduct as it is not volitional. <u>Cosper v. IDJS</u>, 321 N.W.2d 6 (lowa 1982). He did properly report his absences and the employer does not dispute he was absent due to illness. Disqualification may not be imposed.

DECISION:

The representative's decision of July 22, 2004, reference 01, is affirmed. Brian Graham is qualified for benefits provided he is otherwise eligible.
