Section 96.5-1-j – Quit/Temporary

STATEMENT OF THE CASE:

The claimant, Marilyn Kipp, filed an appeal from a decision dated July 20, 2004, reference 02. The decision disqualified her from receiving unemployment benefits. After due notice was issued a hearing was held by telephone conference call on August 26, 2004. The claimant participated on her own behalf. The employer, Adecco, participated by Office Supervisor Allison Rushford and was represented by UC Express in the person of Chris Scheibe.

FINDINGS OF FACT:

Having heard the testimony of the witnesses and having examined all of the evidence in the record, the administrative law judge finds: Marilyn Kipp was employed by Adecco beginning

May 21, 2003. Her assignment at Square D ended on June 30, 2004. The same day she was notified of the end of the assignment she contacted Adecco and requested another assignment.

There has been a subsequent separation from the employment with Adecco on July 15, 2004. This separation has not been adjudicated.

REASONING AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:

The issue is whether the claimant is disqualified. The judge concludes she is not.

Iowa Code Section 96.5-1-j provides:

An individual shall be disqualified for benefits:

1. Voluntary quitting. If the individual has left work voluntarily without good cause attributable to the individual's employer, if so found by the department, But the individual shall not be disqualified if the department finds that:

j. The individual is a temporary employee of a temporary employment firm who notifies the temporary employment firm of completion of an employment assignment and who seeks reassignment. Failure of the individual to notify the temporary employment firm of completion of an employment assignment within three working days of the completion of each employment assignment under a contract of hire shall be deemed a voluntary quit unless the individual was not advised in writing of the duty to notify the temporary employment firm upon completion of an employment assignment or the individual had good cause for not contacting the temporary employment firm within three working days and notified the firm at the first reasonable opportunity thereafter.

To show that the employee was advised in writing of the notification requirement of this paragraph, the temporary employment firm shall advise the temporary employee by requiring the temporary employee, at the time of employment with the temporary employment firm, to read and sign a document that provides a clear and concise explanation of the notification requirement and the consequences of a failure to notify. The document shall be separate from any contract of employment and a copy of the signed document shall be provided to the temporary employee.

For the purposes of this paragraph:

(1) "Temporary employee" means an individual who is employed by a temporary employment firm to provide services to clients to supplement their work force during absences, seasonal workloads, temporary skill or labor market shortages, and for special assignments and projects.

(2) "Temporary employment firm" means a person engaged in the business of employing temporary employees.

The claimant did contact the employer within three days of the end of her assignment at Square D. She has complied with the requirements of the above Code section and disqualification may not be imposed.

The issue of the separation from employment on July 15, 2004 should be remanded for determination.

DECISION:

The representative's decision of July 20, 2004, reference 02, is reversed. Marilyn Kipp is qualified for benefits, provided she is otherwise eligible.

The issue of the claimant's separation on July 15, 2004, is remanded to the Claims Section for determination.
