**STATEMENT OF THE CASE:**

The employer filed an appeal from the January 31, 2019, (reference 07) unemployment insurance decision that allowed benefits. The parties were properly notified about the hearing. A telephone hearing was held on February 15, 2019. Claimant participated and testified. Employer participated through owner Brian Lindberg.

**ISSUE:**

Is claimant able to and available for work effective December 23, 2018?

**FINDINGS OF FACT:**

Having reviewed all of the evidence in the record, the administrative law judge finds: In September 2018 claimant had a heart attack and was unable to work. Claimant stopped claiming unemployment insurance benefits at this time. On December 20, 2018, claimant was released to return to work without restriction by his cardiologist, Dr. Rachel Onsrud, of Iowa Heart in Des Moines. Claimant then reopened his claim for benefits for the week beginning December 23, 2018. Claimant does not currently have any restrictions on his ability to or availability for work and is completing his required work searches.

**REASONING AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:**

For the reasons that follow, the administrative law judge concludes that the claimant is able to work and available for work effective December 23, 2018.

Iowa Code section 96.4(3) provides:

An unemployed individual shall be eligible to receive benefits with respect to any week only if the department finds that:

3. The individual is able to work, is available for work, and is earnestly and actively seeking work. This subsection is waived if the individual is deemed partially unemployed, while employed at the individual's regular job, as defined in section 96.19, subsection 38, paragraph "b", unnumbered paragraph (1), or temporarily unemployed as defined in section 96.19, subsection 38, paragraph "c". The work search requirements of this subsection and the disqualification requirement for failure to apply for, or to accept suitable work of section 96.5, subsection 3 are waived if the individual is not disqualified for benefits under section 96.5, subsection 1, paragraph "h".

Iowa Admin. Code r. 871-24.22(1)a provides:

Benefits eligibility conditions. For an individual to be eligible to receive benefits the department must find that the individual is able to work, available for work, and earnestly and actively seeking work. The individual bears the burden of establishing that the individual is able to work, available for work, and earnestly and actively seeking work.

(1) Able to work. An individual must be physically and mentally able to work in some gainful employment, not necessarily in the individual's customary occupation, but which is engaged in by others as a means of livelihood.

a. Illness, injury or pregnancy. Each case is decided upon an individual basis, recognizing that various work opportunities present different physical requirements. A statement from a medical practitioner is considered prima facie evidence of the physical ability of the individual to perform the work required. A pregnant individual must meet the same criteria for determining ableness as do all other individuals.

Iowa Admin. Code r. 871-24.23(35) provides:

Availability disqualifications. The following are reasons for a claimant being disqualified for being unavailable for work.

(35) Where the claimant is not able to work and is under the care of a medical practitioner and has not been released as being able to work.

To be able to work, "[a]n individual must be physically and mentally able to work in some gainful employment, not necessarily in the individual's customary occupation, but which is engaged in by others as a means of livelihood." *Sierra v. Employment Appeal Board*, 508 N.W.2d 719, 721 (Iowa 1993); *Geiken v. Lutheran Home for the Aged*, 468 N.W.2d 223 (Iowa 1991); Iowa Admin. Code r. 871-24.22(1). "An evaluation of an individual's ability to work for the purposes of determining that individual's eligibility for unemployment benefits must necessarily take into consideration the economic and legal forces at work in the general labor market in which the individual resides." *Sierra* at 723. The court in *Gilmore v. Empl. Appeal Bd.*, 695 N.W.2d 44 (Iowa Ct. App. 2004) noted that "[i]nsofar as the Employment Security Law is not designed to provide health and disability insurance, only those employees who experience illness-induced separations that can fairly be attributed to the employer are properly eligible for unemployment benefits." *White v. Emp't Appeal Bd.*, 487 N.W.2d 342, 345 (Iowa 1992) (citing *Butts v. Iowa Dep't of Job Serv.*, 328 N.W.2d 515, 517 (Iowa 1983)).

Claimant had a heart attack in September 2018, but was released to return to work without restriction effective December 20, 2018. Inasmuch as the treating physician has released the claimant to return to work, he has established his ability to work. Benefits are allowed, provided claimant is otherwise eligible.

**DECISION:**

The January 31, 2019, (reference 07) unemployment insurance decision is affirmed. The claimant is able to work and available for work effective December 23, 2018. Benefits are allowed, provided he is otherwise eligible.
