STATEMENT OF THE CASE:

The claimant filed an appeal from the November 8, 2022, (reference 01) unemployment insurance decision that denied benefits based upon claimant's discharge for dishonesty in connection with his work. The parties were properly notified of the hearing. A telephone hearing was held on December 2, 2022. Claimant Rick D. Waymaster participated. Employer Railcrew Xpress, LLC participated through human resources generalist Jessica Partlow. Employer's Exhibits 1 – 5 were received.

ISSUE:

Was the claimant discharged for disqualifying job-related misconduct?

FINDINGS OF FACT:

Having reviewed all of the evidence in the record, the administrative law judge finds: Claimant was employed full time as a driver from January 21, 2022, until October 21, 2022, when he was discharged.

Employer maintains a policy which provides that any two accidents in a three-year period will result in immediate termination of employment. The policy also requires employees to report accidents immediately. The policy provides that failure to do so may result in immediate termination of employment. (Exhibit 5). Claimant signed an acknowledgment that he understood the policies.

On October 15, 2022, at approximately 1:15 a.m. claimant rear ended a vehicle when his foot slipped off the brake pedal and he hit the car in front of him. Claimant and the other driver exited their vehicles and after evaluation, determined there was no damage to either vehicle so they did not exchange information. At the time the accident occurred, claimant had worked almost ten hours and was tired. He believed he could report the incident to employer during normal business hours and planned to call when he woke up that morning. However, claimant received a call that his mother had been rushed to the hospital and he forgot to contact employer to report the accident.

The dash camera technology in employer's vehicles automatically notify its safety department if it detects a collision. Claimant's supervisor contacted claimant on the evening of October 15, 2022, after employer's safety team was alerted to a collision via the dash cam footage. Claimant's supervisor explained to claimant that the video footage showed two accidents, both rear ending a vehicle and backing into a vehicle. She also noted claimant failed to report the accidents. Claimant explained to his supervisor that he was only involved in one accident. The He did not back into a vehicle but he did slam on the brakes hard while driving in reverse to avoid an accident. Claimant also explained to his supervisor that he forgot to report the incident due to his exhaustion and his mother's hospitalization. Employer suspended claimant pending an investigation.

On October 21, 2022, employer discharged claimant for having two preventable accidents occurring on October 15, 2022.

REASONING AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:

For the reasons that follow, the administrative law judge concludes the claimant was discharged for no disqualifying reason. Benefits are allowed.

Iowa Code § 96.5(2)a provides:

An individual shall be disqualified for benefits:

2. Discharge for misconduct. If the department finds that the individual has been discharged for misconduct in connection with the individual's employment:
 - a. The individual shall be disqualified for benefits until the individual has worked in and has been paid wages for insured work equal to ten times the individual's weekly benefit amount, provided the individual is otherwise eligible.

Iowa Code section 96.5(2)b, c and d provide:

An individual shall be disqualified for benefits, regardless of the source of the individual's wage credits:

2. Discharge for misconduct. If the department finds that the individual has been discharged for misconduct in connection with the individual's employment:
 - b. Provided further, if gross misconduct is established, the department shall cancel the individual's wage credits earned, prior to the date of discharge, from all employers.
 - c. Gross misconduct is deemed to have occurred after a claimant loses employment as a result of an act constituting an indictable offense in connection with the claimant's employment, provided the claimant is duly convicted thereof or has signed a statement admitting the commission of such an act. Determinations regarding a benefit claim may be redetermined within five years from the effective date of the claim. Any benefits paid to a claimant prior to a determination that the claimant has lost employment as a result of such act shall not be considered to have been accepted by the claimant in good faith.

d. For the purposes of this subsection, “*misconduct*” means a deliberate act or omission by an employee that constitutes a material breach of the duties and obligations arising out of the employee’s contract of employment. Misconduct is limited to conduct evincing such willful or wanton disregard of an employer’s interest as is found in deliberate violation or disregard of standards of behavior which the employer has the right to expect of employees, or in carelessness or negligence of such degree of recurrence as to manifest equal culpability, wrongful intent or even design, or to show an intentional and substantial disregard of the employer’s interests or of the employee’s duties and obligations to the employer. Misconduct by an individual includes but is not limited to all of the following:

- (1) Material falsification of the individual’s employment application.
- (2) Knowing violation of a reasonable and uniformly enforced rule of an employer.
- (3) Intentional damage of an employer’s property.
- (4) Consumption of alcohol, illegal or nonprescribed prescription drugs, or an impairing substance in a manner not directed by the manufacturer, or a combination of such substances, on the employer’s premises in violation of the employer’s employment policies.
- (5) Reporting to work under the influence of alcohol, illegal or nonprescribed prescription drugs, or an impairing substance in an off-label manner, or a combination of such substances, on the employer’s premises in violation of the employer’s employment policies, unless the individual is compelled to work by the employer outside of scheduled or on-call working hours.
- (6) Conduct that substantially and unjustifiably endangers the personal safety of coworkers or the general public.
- (7) Incarceration for an act for which one could reasonably expect to be incarcerated that result in missing work.
- (8) Incarceration as a result of a misdemeanor or felony conviction by a court of competent jurisdiction.
- (9) Excessive unexcused tardiness or absenteeism.
- (10) Falsification of any work-related report, task, or job that could expose the employer or coworkers to legal liability or sanction for violation of health or safety laws.
- (11) Failure to maintain any licenses, registration, or certification that is reasonably required by the employer or by law, or that is a functional requirement to perform the individual’s regular job duties, unless the failure is not within the control of the individual.
- (12) Conduct that is libelous or slanderous toward an employer or an employee of the employer if such conduct is not protected under state or federal law.

(13) Theft of an employer or coworker's funds or property.

(14) Intentional misrepresentation of time worked or work carried out that results in the individual receiving unearned wages or unearned benefits.

Further, the employer has the burden of proof in establishing disqualifying job misconduct. *Cosper v. Iowa Dep't of Job Serv.*, 321 N.W.2d 6 (Iowa 1982). The issue is not whether the employer made a correct decision in separating claimant, but whether the claimant is entitled to unemployment insurance benefits. *Infante v. Iowa Dep't of Job Serv.*, 364 N.W.2d 262 (Iowa Ct. App. 1984). What constitutes misconduct justifying termination of an employee and what misconduct warrants denial of unemployment insurance benefits are two separate decisions. *Pierce v. Iowa Dep't of Job Serv.*, 425 N.W.2d 679 (Iowa Ct. App. 1988).


The decision in this case rests, at least in part, on the credibility of the witnesses. It is the duty of the administrative law judge as the trier of fact in this case, to determine the credibility of witnesses, weigh the evidence and decide the facts in issue. *Arndt v. City of LeClaire*, 728 N.W.2d 389, 394-395 (Iowa 2007). The administrative law judge may believe all, part or none of any witness's testimony. *State v. Holtz*, 548 N.W.2d 162, 163 (Iowa App. 1996). In assessing the credibility of witnesses, the administrative law judge should consider the evidence using his or her own observations, common sense and experience. *Id.* In determining the facts, and deciding what testimony to believe, the fact finder may consider the following factors: whether the testimony is reasonable and consistent with other believable evidence; whether a witness has made inconsistent statements; the witness's appearance, conduct, age, intelligence, memory and knowledge of the facts; and the witness's interest in the trial, their motive, candor, bias and prejudice. *Id.*

The findings of fact show how the disputed factual issues were resolved. After assessing the credibility of the witnesses who testified during the hearing, reviewing the exhibits submitted by the parties, considering the applicable factors listed above, and using her own common sense and experience, the administrative law judge finds the claimant's version of events to be more credible. Employer did not present a witness with direct knowledge of the situation, such as a member of the safety team involved in the investigation or claimant's supervisor. As claimant presented direct, first-hand testimony while employer relied upon second-hand reports, the administrative law judge concludes that claimant's recollection of the events is more credible than that of employer. While employer witness testified that claimant had two accidents on October 15, claimant credibly testified that he bumped the car in front of him, but he did not back into the car behind him and instead the video showed him slamming on the brakes hard to avoid a collision with the car behind him. It is not clear from the video provided by employer as an exhibit that claimant collided with the car behind him. Claimant's recollection is further supported because he credibly testified neither he nor the driver behind him got out of their vehicles because there was no collision.

The conduct for which claimant was discharged was merely an isolated incident of poor judgment. Claimant was tired from working a ten-hour shift and rear ended a vehicle. He credibly testified that he planned to report the accident in the morning, but his mother was rushed to the hospital and he forgot to do so. There is no evidence that claimant intentionally failed to report a single accident. Employer has not established that claimant acted with knowing disregard for its interests, or that he acted with carelessness or neglect. As such, employer has failed to establish disqualifying misconduct. Benefits are allowed, provided claimant is otherwise eligible.

DECISION:

The November 8, 2022, (reference 01) unemployment insurance decision is reversed. Claimant was discharged from employment for no disqualifying reason. Benefits are allowed, provided he is otherwise eligible. Any benefits claimed and withheld on this basis shall be paid.

1. Appeal to the Employment Appeal Board within fifteen (15) days of the date under the judge's signature by submitting a written appeal via mail, fax, or online to:

AN APPEAL TO THE BOARD SHALL STATE CLEARLY:

- 1) The name, address, and social security number of the claimant.
- 2) A reference to the decision from which the appeal is taken.
- 3) That an appeal from such decision is being made and such appeal is signed.
- 4) The grounds upon which such appeal is based.

An Employment Appeal Board decision is final agency action. If a party disagrees with the Employment Appeal Board decision, they may then file a petition for judicial review in district court.

2. If no one files an appeal of the judge's decision with the Employment Appeal Board within fifteen (15) days, the decision becomes final agency action, and you have the option to file a petition for judicial review in District Court within thirty (30) days after the decision becomes final. If you wish to be represented by a lawyer, you may obtain the services of either a private attorney or one whose services are paid for with public funds.

Note to Claimant: It is important that you file your weekly claim as directed, while this appeal is pending, to protect your continuing right to benefits.

2.
