STATEMENT OF THE CASE:

On July 7, 2023, the employer filed an appeal from the June 27, 2023, (reference 06) unemployment insurance decision that allowed benefits based upon the determination that claimant quit employment with good cause attributable to the employer. The parties were properly notified of the hearing. A telephone hearing was held on July 27, 2023. The claimant, Joseph A. Huffman, did not participate. The employer, C 2 C Express Inc., participated through Fleet Manager Layn Muller. Employer's Exhibit 1 was admitted. The administrative law judge took official notice of the administrative record.

ISSUES:

Did the claimant voluntarily quit employment without good cause attributable to the employer?
Has the claimant been overpaid unemployment insurance benefits, and if so, can the repayment of those benefits to the agency be waived?
Can charges to the employer's account be waived?

FINDINGS OF FACT:

Having reviewed all of the evidence in the record, the administrative law judge finds: Claimant was employed full time as a driver from January 30, 2023, until this employment ended on April 13, 2023, when he resigned.

The employer was in the midst of growing and had hired some new drivers who were being trained at the time that claimant resigned. Claimant suspected that the employer was "squeez[ing] him out" and these new drivers would affect his employment negatively. The employer denies that the new drivers would have impacted claimant's employment. Claimant's schedule, a route he drove Monday through Friday, would have continued without interruption.

On April 13, 2023, claimant sent a text message to Muller stating that he was leaving employment because he believed the new drivers threatened his employment. The resignation was effective immediately. The employer would have continued to offer claimant work if he had not resigned.

The administrative record indicates that claimant filed an additional claim for unemployment insurance benefits with an effective date of May 28, 2023, and a reopen claim for unemployment insurance benefits with an effective date of June 25, 2023. Since that time, he has not received any unemployment benefits. The employer substantially participated in the fact-finding interview.

REASONING AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:

For the reasons that follow, the administrative law judge concludes claimant's separation from the employment was without good cause attributable to the employer.

Iowa Code section 96.5(1) provides:

An individual shall be disqualified for benefits:

1. Voluntary quitting. If the individual has left work voluntarily without good cause attributable to the individual's employer, if so found by the department.

Iowa Admin. Code r. 871—24.25(29) provides:

Voluntary quit without good cause. In general, a voluntary quit means discontinuing the employment because the employee no longer desires to remain in the relationship of an employee with the employer from whom the employee has separated. The employer has the burden of proving that the claimant is disqualified for benefits pursuant to Iowa Code section 96.5. However, the claimant has the initial burden to produce evidence that the claimant is not disqualified for benefits in cases involving Iowa Code section 96.5, subsection (1), paragraphs "a" through "i," and subsection 10. The following reasons for a voluntary quit shall be presumed to be without good cause attributable to the employer:

- (29) The claimant left in anticipation of a layoff in the near future; however, work was still available at the time claimant left the employment.

A voluntary quitting means discontinuing the employment because the employee no longer desires to remain in the relationship of an employee with the employer and requires an intention to terminate the employment. *Wills v. Emp't Appeal Bd.*, 447 N.W. 2d 137, 138 (Iowa 1989). A voluntary leaving of employment requires an intention to terminate the employment relationship accompanied by an overt act of carrying out that intention. *Local Lodge #1426 v. Wilson Trailer*, 289 N.W.2d 608, 612 (Iowa 1980); *Peck v. Emp't Appeal Bd.*, 492 N.W.2d 438 (Iowa Ct. App. 1992).

Claimant has the burden of proving that the voluntary leaving was for good cause attributable to the employer. Iowa Code § 96.6(2). "Good cause" for leaving employment must be that which is reasonable to the average person, not the overly sensitive individual or the claimant in particular. *Uniweld Products v. Indus. Relations Comm'n*, 277 So.2d 827 (Fla. Dist. Ct. App. 1973). The standard of what a reasonable person would have believed under the circumstances is applied in determining whether a claimant left work voluntarily with good cause attributable to the employer. *O'Brien v. Emp't Appeal Bd.*, 494 N.W.2d 660 (Iowa 1993).

Claimant left because he believed he was being squeezed out and his employment was threatened by new hires. However, he was mistaken. He did not seek clarification from the employer prior to resigning the employment. Accordingly, claimant resigned the employment without good cause attributable to the employer. Benefits are denied.

Because the claimant has received no unemployment insurance benefits since this separation, the issues of overpayment, repayment, and participation are moot.

DECISION:

The June 27, 2023, (reference 06) unemployment insurance decision is REVERSED. Claimant voluntarily left the employment without good cause attributable to the employer. Benefits are withheld until such time as he has worked in and been paid wages for insured work equal to ten times his weekly benefit amount, provided he is otherwise eligible. Claimant has not received unemployment insurance benefits since this separation, so the issues of overpayment, repayment, and participation are moot.

APPEAL RIGHTS. If you disagree with the decision, you or any interested party may:

1. Appeal to the Employment Appeal Board within fifteen (15) days of the date under the judge's signature by submitting a written appeal via mail, fax, or online to:

The appeal period will be extended to the next business day if the last day to appeal falls on a weekend or a legal holiday.

AN APPEAL TO THE BOARD SHALL STATE CLEARLY:

- 1) The name, address, and social security number of the claimant.
- 2) A reference to the decision from which the appeal is taken.
- 3) That an appeal from such decision is being made and such appeal is signed.
- 4) The grounds upon which such appeal is based.

An Employment Appeal Board decision is final agency action. If a party disagrees with the Employment Appeal Board decision, they may then file a petition for judicial review in district court.

2. If no one files an appeal of the judge's decision with the Employment Appeal Board within fifteen (15) days, the decision becomes final agency action, and you have the option to file a petition for judicial review in District Court within thirty (30) days after the decision becomes final. Note to Parties: YOU MAY REPRESENT yourself in the appeal or obtain a lawyer or other interested party to do so provided there is no expense to Workforce Development. If you wish to be represented by a lawyer, you may obtain the services of either a private attorney or one whose services are paid for with public funds.

Note to Claimant: It is important that you file your weekly claim as directed, while this appeal is pending, to protect your continuing right to benefits.
