STATEMENT OF THE CASE:

On September 26, 2023, claimant filed an appeal from a decision of a representative dated March 1, 2023, (reference 02) that denied claimant unemployment insurance benefits for the one week ending January 14, 2023, because Iowa Workforce Development's (IWD) records indicated the claimant was attending school during his normal work hours, which unduly limited his availability for work. Claimant was notified of the hearing. A hearing was held in Cedar Rapids, Iowa on October 25, 2023. The claimant participated personally. The administrative law judge took official notice of the administrative record.

ISSUES:

Is the claimant's appeal is timely?
Was the claimant able to and available for work during the week ending January 14, 2023?

FINDINGS OF FACT:

Having reviewed the evidence in the record, the administrative law judge finds: Iowa Workforce Development (IWD) mailed the reference 02 unemployment insurance decision to claimant's address of record on March 1, 2023. Claimant believes he received the decision in the mail, but could not recall when he received the decision.

The decision contained a warning that an appeal must be postmarked or received by the Appeals Bureau by March 11, 2023. However, if the due date falls on a Saturday, Sunday, or legal holiday, the appeal period is extended to the next working day. As March 11, 2023, was a Saturday, the deadline for claimant to submit his appeal was Monday, March 13, 2023. Claimant electronically submitted his appeal on September 26, 2023, which is after the extended appeal deadline noticed on the decision. Claimant explained that his appeal was untimely because he had mistakenly believed the issue had been resolved by a phone interview with an IWD representative. By the time claimant learned that he needed to file an appeal, the appeal deadline had passed.

REASONING AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:

For the reasons that follow, the administrative law judge concludes claimant's appeal was untimely.

Iowa Code § 96.6(2) provides, in pertinent part: "[u]nless the claimant or other interested party, after notification or within ten calendar days after notification was mailed to the claimant's last known address, files an appeal from the decision, the decision is final and benefits shall be paid or denied in accordance with the decision."

Iowa Admin. Code r. 871-24.35(1) provides:

1. Except as otherwise provided by statute or by division rule, any payment, appeal, application, request, notice, objection, petition, report or other information or document submitted to the division shall be considered received by and filed with the division:

(a) If transmitted via the United States Postal Service on the date it is mailed as shown by the postmark, or in the absence of a postmark the postage meter mark of the envelope in which it is received; or if not postmarked or postage meter marked or if the mark is illegible, on the date entered on the document as the date of completion.

(b) If transmitted via the State Identification Data Exchange System (SIDES), maintained by the United States Department of Labor, on the date it was submitted to SIDES.

(c) If transmitted by any means other than [United States Postal Service or the State Identification Data Exchange System (SIDES)], on the date it is received by the division.

Iowa Admin. Code r. 871-24.35(2) provides:

2. The submission of any payment, appeal, application, request, notice, objection, petition, report or other information or document not within the specified statutory or regulatory period shall be considered timely if it is established to the satisfaction of the division that the delay in submission was due to division error or misinformation or to delay or other action of the United States postal service.

The Iowa Supreme Court has declared that there is a mandatory duty to file appeals from representatives' decisions within the time allotted by statute, and that the administrative law judge has no authority to change the decision of a representative if a timely appeal is not filed. *Franklin v. IDJS*, 277 N.W.2d 877, 881 (Iowa 1979). Compliance with appeal notice provisions is jurisdictional unless the facts of a case show that the notice was invalid. *Beardslee v. IDJS*, 276 N.W.2d 373, 377 (Iowa 1979); see also *In re Appeal of Elliott* 319 N.W.2d 244, 247 (Iowa 1982). The question in this case thus becomes whether the appellant was deprived of a reasonable opportunity to assert an appeal in a timely fashion. *Hendren v. IESC*, 217 N.W.2d 255 (Iowa 1974); *Smith v. IESC*, 212 N.W.2d 471, 472 (Iowa 1973).

The weight of the evidence indicates that the March 1, 2023 (reference 02) unemployment insurance decision was delivered to the claimant's address of record in a timely manner, prior to the extended March 13, 2023, appeal deadline, but claimant did not submit his appeal until after the deadline. Claimant's delay was not due to agency error or misinformation or delay of the United States Postal Service. Claimant had a reasonable opportunity to assert an appeal in a timely fashion but waited until after the deadline to file the appeal. As claimant's appeal was not

timely filed pursuant to Iowa Code section 96.6(2), the administrative law judge lacks jurisdiction to make a determination with respect to the nature of the appeal. See, *Beardslee v. IDJS*, 276 N.W.2d 373 (Iowa 1979); see also, *Franklin v. IDJS*, 277 N.W.2d 877 (Iowa 1979).

DECISION:

The March 1, 2023, (reference 02) unemployment insurance decision is affirmed. The appeal in this case was not timely, and the decision of the representative denying benefits for the one week ending January 14, 2023, remains in effect.

APPEAL RIGHTS. If you disagree with the decision, you or any interested party may:

1. Appeal to the Employment Appeal Board within fifteen (15) days of the date under the judge's signature by submitting a written appeal via mail, fax, or online to:

The appeal period will be extended to the next business day if the last day to appeal falls on a weekend or a legal holiday.

AN APPEAL TO THE BOARD SHALL STATE CLEARLY:

- 1) The name, address, and social security number of the claimant.
- 2) A reference to the decision from which the appeal is taken.
- 3) That an appeal from such decision is being made and such appeal is signed.
- 4) The grounds upon which such appeal is based.

An Employment Appeal Board decision is final agency action. If a party disagrees with the Employment Appeal Board decision, they may then file a petition for judicial review in district court.

2. If no one files an appeal of the judge's decision with the Employment Appeal Board within fifteen (15) days, the decision becomes final agency action, and you have the option to file a petition for judicial review in District Court within thirty (30) days after the decision becomes final. Additional information on how to file a petition can be found at Iowa Code §17A.19, which is online at <https://www.legis.iowa.gov/docs/code/17A.19.pdf> or by contacting the District Court Clerk of Court <https://www.iowacourts.gov/iowa-courts/court-directory/>.

Note to Parties: YOU MAY REPRESENT yourself in the appeal or obtain a lawyer or other interested party to do so provided there is no expense to Workforce Development. If you wish to be represented by a lawyer, you may obtain the services of either a private attorney or one whose services are paid for with public funds.

Note to Claimant: It is important that you file your weekly claim as directed, while this appeal is pending, to protect your continuing right to benefits.

Una decisión de la Junta de Apelaciones de Empleo es una acción final de la agencia. Si una de las partes no está de acuerdo con la decisión de la Junta de Apelación de Empleo, puede presentar una petición de revisión judicial en el tribunal de distrito.

2. Si nadie presenta una apelación de la decisión del juez ante la Junta de Apelaciones Laborales dentro de los quince (15) días, la decisión se convierte en acción final de la agencia y usted tiene la opción de presentar una petición de revisión judicial en el Tribunal de Distrito dentro de los treinta (30) días después de que la decisión adquiriera firmeza.
