Iowa Code Section 96.6-2 - Timeliness of Appeal

STATEMENT OF THE CASE:

The claimant appealed an Iowa Workforce Development decision dated October 30, 2008, reference 04, which held that he was overpaid unemployment benefits \$1,119 for a 3-week period ending April 19, 2008, because of a department decision he was not authorized to work in the United States.

A telephone hearing was scheduled and held on December 8, 2008, pursuant to due notice. The claimant did not participate. John Doidge, Investigator, participated on behalf of the department. Departmental Exhibit One consisting of the claimant appeal form was received into evidence for the record.

After the December 8 hearing, the US Postal Service returned the claimant's notice that contained an address err. A corrected notice for hearing was mailed to the claimant's address of record scheduling this matter for December 22, 2008. The claimant failed to respond to the notice. Investigator Doidge was available for the hearing, and he stipulated that the evidentiary record of the December 8 hearing should be considered in this matter.

FINDINGS OF FACT:

The administrative law judge, having heard the testimony of the witness, and having considered all of the evidence in the record, finds that: A decision was mailed to the claimant's last known address of record on October 30, 2008. The claimant received the decision on November 3rd. The decision contained a warning that an appeal must be postmarked or received by the Iowa Workforce Development Appeals Section by November 6, 2008. The claimant submitted his appeal to the department on November 12.

The claimant failed to take notice of the warning date to submit his appeal. The claimant submitted his appeal to the department on November 12, 2008. The claimant failed to offer any reason for his late appeal.

REASONING AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:

The issue is whether the appeal has been filed in a timely manner.

Iowa Code Section 96.6-2 provides:

2. Initial determination. A representative designated by the director shall promptly notify all interested parties to the claim of its filing, and the parties have ten days from the date of mailing the notice of the filing of the claim by ordinary mail to the last known address to protest payment of benefits to the claimant.

Unless the claimant or other interested party, after notification or within ten calendar days after notification was mailed to the claimant's last known address, files an appeal from the decision, the decision is final and benefits shall be paid or denied in accordance with the decision.

Case law commentary on timeliness:

The ten calendar days for appeal begin running on the mailing date. The "decision date" found in the upper right-hand portion of the representative's decision, unless otherwise corrected immediately below that entry, is presumptive evidence of the date of mailing. <u>Gaskins v. Unempl. Comp. Bd. of Rev.</u>, 429 A.2d 138 (Pa. Comm. 1981); <u>Johnson v. Board of Adjustment</u>, 239 N.W.2d 873, 92 A.L.R.3d 304 (Iowa 1976).

Pursuant to rules 871 IAC 26.2(96)(1) and 871 IAC 24.35(96)(1), appeals are considered filed when postmarked, if mailed. <u>Messina v. IDJS</u>, 341 N.W.2d 52 (Iowa 1983).

The record in this case shows that more than ten calendar days elapsed between the mailing date and the date this appeal was filed. The Iowa Supreme Court has declared that there is a mandatory duty to file appeals from representatives' decisions within the time allotted by statute, and that the administrative law judge has no authority to change the decision of a representative if a timely appeal is not filed. <u>Franklin v. IDJS</u>, 277 N.W.2d 877, 881 (Iowa 1979). Compliance with appeal notice provisions is jurisdictional unless the facts of a case show that the notice was invalid. Beardslee v. IDJS, 276 N.W.2d 373, 377 (Iowa 1979); see also In re Appeal of Elliott 319 N.W.2d

244, 247 (Iowa 1982). The question in this case thus becomes whether the appellant was deprived of a reasonable opportunity to assert an appeal in a timely fashion. <u>Hendren v. IESC</u>, 217 N.W.2d 255 (Iowa 1974); <u>Smith v. IESC</u>, 212 N.W.2d 471, 472 (Iowa 1973).

In this case, the appealing party had a reasonable opportunity to file a timely appeal, and no good cause has been established for the filing of any late appeal. The claimant failed to offer a good cause for filing his appeal after the expiration date.

The administrative law judge concludes that failure to file a timely appeal within the time prescribed by the Iowa Employment Security Law was not due to any Agency error or misinformation or delay or other action of the United States Postal Service pursuant to 871 IAC 24.35(2). The administrative law judge further concludes that the appeal was not timely filed pursuant to Iowa Code Section 96.6-2, and the administrative law judge lacks jurisdiction to make a determination with respect to the nature of the appeal. See <u>Beardslee v. IDJS</u>, 276 N.W.2d 373 (Iowa 1979) and <u>Franklin v. IDJS</u>, 277 N.W.2d 877 (Iowa 1979).

DECISION:

The decision of Iowa Workforce Development dated October 30, 2008, reference 04, is AFFIRMED. The appeal in this case was not timely, and the decision remains in force and effect. The claimant is overpaid benefits \$1,119 due to misrepresentation.

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
