## STATEMENT OF THE CASE:

Kaci L Delfrano, the claimant/appellant,<sup>1</sup> appealed the Iowa Workforce Development (IWD) February 16, 2024 (reference 02) unemployment insurance (UI) decision. IWD denied Ms. Delfrano REGULAR (state) UI benefits because IWD concluded the employer discharged her from employment on January 4, 2024 for excessive unexcused absenteeism after the employer warned her. On February 29, 2024, the Iowa Department of Inspections, Appeals, and Licensing (DIAL), UI Appeals Bureau mailed a notice of hearing to Ms. Delfrano and the employer for a telephone hearing scheduled for March 19, 2024.

The administrative law judge held a telephone hearing on March 19, 2024. Ms. Delfrano participated in the hearing personally. The employer participated in the hearing through Ed Nixon, contact center marketing manager.

#### ISSUES:

Did the employer discharge Ms. Delfrano from employment for disqualifying, job-related misconduct?

Is Ms. Delfrano able to and available for work?

## FINDINGS OF FACT:

Having reviewed the evidence in the record, the administrative law judge finds: Ms. Delfrano began working for the employer on July 25, 2023. She worked as a full-time telemarketer. Her employment ended on January 4, 2024.

On Tuesday, January 2, Ms. Delfrano texted Mr. Nixon that she was sick with COVID-19 symptoms, even though she tested negative for COVID-10, and her boyfriend tested positive for COVID-19. Mr. Nixon responded to Ms. Delfrano that we hoped she felt better, and that he and Ms. Delfrano could make a plan on Thursday, January 4 for her return to work. Ms. Delfrano did not call in on Wednesday, January 3 because Mr. Nixon mentioned making a plan on Thursday.

On Thursday, Ms. Delfrano called the employer's officer and Mr. Nixon's cell phone. No one at the office answered or responded, and Mr. Nixon did not answer or respond. Just before 3:00 p.m., Ms. Delfrano texted Mr. Nixon that she still had COVID-19 symptoms and she is waiting for the results of another COVID-19 test. Just after 5:00 p.m., Mr. Nixon sent Ms. Delfrano an email to her personal email address. The email told Ms. Delfrano that the employer no longer needed her services. Ms. Delfrano did not see the email at this time. At about 10:00 pm., Mr. Nixon texted Ms. Delfrano that she should check her email. Ms. Delfrano did so and saw Mr. Nixon's email terminating her employment.

Ms. Delfrano continued to be sick for another week. She felt better on, or about January 14.

## **REASONING AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:**

For the reasons that follow, the administrative law judge concludes 1) the employer discharged Ms. Delfrano from employment on January 4, 2024 for a reason that does not disqualify her from receiving UI benefits, 2) Ms. Delfrano is not able to and available for work from January 7, 2024, the effective date of her UI claim, through January 13, 2024, and 3) she is able to and available for work as of January 14, 2024.

# The Employer Has Not Established Disqualifying, Job-Related Misconduct on the Part of Ms. Delfrano

lowa Code section 96.5(2)(a) and (d) provide, in relevant part:

An individual shall be disqualified for benefits:

- 2. Discharge for misconduct. If the department finds that the individual has been discharged for misconduct in connection with the individual's employment:
- a. The individual shall be disqualified for benefits until the individual has worked in and has been paid wages for insured work equal to ten times the individual's weekly benefit amount, provided the individual is otherwise eligible.
- d. For the purposes of this subsection, "misconduct" means a deliberate act or omission by an employee that constitutes a material breach of the duties and obligations arising out of the employee's contract of employment. Misconduct is limited to conduct evincing such willful or wanton disregard of an employer's interest as is found in deliberate violation or disregard of standards of behavior which the employer has the right to expect of employees, or in carelessness or negligence of such degree of recurrence as to manifest equal culpability, wrongful intent or evil design, or to show an intentional and substantial disregard of the employer's interests or of the employee's duties and obligations to the employer. Misconduct by an individual includes but is not limited to all of the following:

...

(9) Excessive unexcused tardiness or absenteeism.

Iowa Admin. Code r. 871-24.32(7) and (8) provide:

- (7) Excessive unexcused absenteeism. Excessive unexcused absenteeism is an intentional disregard of the duty owed by the claimant to the employer and shall be considered misconduct except for illness or other reasonable grounds for which the employee was absent and that were properly reported to the employer. [Emphasis added.]
- (8) Past acts of misconduct. While past acts and warnings can be used to determine the magnitude of a current act of misconduct, a discharge for misconduct cannot be based on such past act or acts. The termination of employment must be based on a current act.

The purpose of subrule eight is to assure that an employer does not save up acts of misconduct and spring them on an employee when an independent desire to terminate arises.

Excessive absenteeism is not considered misconduct unless the absences are also unexcused. The term "absenteeism" also encompasses conduct that is more accurately referred to as "tardiness." An absence is an extended tardiness; and an incident of tardiness is a limited absence. The requirements for a finding of misconduct based on absences are twofold. First, the absences must be excessive. The determination of whether absenteeism is excessive necessarily requires consideration of past acts and warnings. Second, the absences must be unexcused. The requirement of "unexcused" can be satisfied in two ways. An absence can be unexcused either because it was not for "reasonable grounds," or because it was not "properly reported."

An employer's no-fault absenteeism policy or point system does not, on its own, decide the issue of qualification for UI benefits. Absences due to properly reported illness cannot constitute work-connected misconduct since they are not voluntary. This is true even if the employer was fully within its rights to assess points or impose discipline up to or including discharge for the absence under its attendance policy.<sup>6</sup> Medical documentation is not essential to a determination that an absence due to illness should be treated as excused.<sup>7</sup> Absences related to other issues such as transportation, lack of childcare, and oversleeping are not considered excused.<sup>8</sup> When a claimant does not provide an excuse for an absence the absence is deemed unexcused.<sup>9</sup>

The employer has the burden of proof in establishing disqualifying job misconduct.<sup>10</sup> The issue is not whether the employer made a correct decision in separating the claimant from employment, but whether the claimant is entitled to unemployment insurance benefits.<sup>11</sup> Misconduct must be "substantial" to warrant a denial of job insurance benefits.<sup>12</sup>

In an at-will employment environment an employer may discharge an employee for any number of reasons or no reason at all if it is not contrary to public policy, but if it fails to meet its burden of proof to establish job related misconduct as the reason for the separation, it incurs potential

liability for unemployment insurance benefits related to that separation. A determination as to whether an employee's act is misconduct does not rest solely on the interpretation or application of the employer's policy or rule. A violation of the employer's policy or rule is not necessarily disqualifying misconduct even if the employer was fully within its rights to impose discipline up to or including discharge for the incident under its policy.

The most recent incident leading the employer to discharge Ms. Delfrano must be a current act of misconduct to disqualify her from receiving UI benefits. The most recent act for which the employer terminated Ms. Delfrano's employment was because she was absent January 2-4. Ms. Delfrano properly reported these absences to the employer, and her absences were for a good cause reason – illness. These absences are excused and are not misconduct. The employer has not established a current act of misconduct on the part of Ms. Delfrano,

Ms. Delfrano is Not Able to and Available for Work the Week of January 7-13, 2024, But She Is Able to and Available for Work as of January 14, 2024

Iowa Code section 96.4(3) provides:

An unemployed individual shall be eligible to receive benefits with respect to any week only if the department finds that:

3. The individual is able to work, is available for work, and is earnestly and actively seeking work. This subsection is waived if the individual is deemed partially unemployed, while employed at the individual's regular job, as defined in section 96.1A, subsection 37, paragraph "b", subparagraph (1), or temporarily unemployed as defined in section 96.1A, subsection 37, paragraph "c". The work search requirements of this subsection and the disqualification requirement for failure to apply for, or to accept suitable work of section 96.5, subsection 3 are waived if the individual is not disqualified for benefits under section 96.5, subsection 1, paragraph "h".

Iowa Admin. Code r. 871-24.22(1)a provides:

Benefit eligibility conditions. For an individual to be eligible to receive benefits the department must find that the individual is able to work, available for work, and earnestly and actively seeking work. The individual bears the burden of establishing that the individual is able to work, available for work, and earnestly and actively seeking work.

- (1) Able to work. An individual must be physically and mentally able to work in some gainful employment, not necessarily in the individual's customary occupation, but which is engaged in by others as a means of livelihood.
- a. Illness, injury or pregnancy. Each case is decided upon an individual basis, recognizing that various work opportunities present different physical requirements. A statement from a medical practitioner is considered prima facie evidence of the physical ability of the individual to perform the work required. A pregnant individual must meet the same criteria for determining ableness as do all other individuals.

Iowa Admin. Code r. 871-24.23(1) provide:

Availability disqualifications. The following are reasons for a claimant being disqualified for being unavailable for work.

(1) An individual who is ill and presently not able to perform work due to illness.

To be able to work, "[a]n individual must be physically and mentally able to work in some gainful employment, not necessarily in the individual's customary occupation, but which is engaged in by others as a means of livelihood." "An evaluation of an individual's ability to work for the purposes of determining that individual's eligibility for unemployment benefits must necessarily take into consideration the economic and legal forces at work in the general labor market in which the individual resides." A person claiming benefits has the burden of proof that she is be able to work, available for work, and earnestly and actively seeking work. <sup>15</sup>

In this case, Ms. Delfrano was ill and not able to work the week of January 7-13, 2024. Ms. Delfrano is not able to and available for work this week. So, she is not eligible for UI benefits for this week.

Ms. Delfrano was no longer ill as of January 14, 2024. Ms. Delfrano is able to and available for work as of January 14, 2024. So, she is eligible for UI benefits as of January 14, 2024.

Since the employer has not established disqualifying, job-related misconduct on the part of Ms. Delfrano and she is able to and available for work as of January 14, 2024, Ms. Delfrano is eligible for UI benefits as of January 14, 2024, as long as no other decision denies her UI benefits.

## **DECISION:**

The February 16, 2024 (reference 02) UI decision is REVERSED. The employer discharged Ms. Delfrano from employment on January 4, 2024 for a reason that does not disqualify her from receiving UI benefits. Ms. Delfrano is not able to and available for work the week of January 7-13, 2024, but she is able to and available for work as of January 14, 2024. So, Ms. Delfrano is eligible for UI benefits as of January 14, 2024, as long as no other decision denies her UI benefits.

**APPEAL RIGHTS.** If you disagree with the decision, you or any interested party may:

The appeal period will be extended to the next business day if the last day to appeal falls on a weekend or a legal holiday.

## AN APPEAL TO THE BOARD SHALL STATE CLEARLY:

- 1) The name, address, and social security number of the claimant.
- 2) A reference to the decision from which the appeal is taken.
- 3) That an appeal from such decision is being made and such appeal is signed.
- 4) The grounds upon which such appeal is based.

An Employment Appeal Board decision is final agency action. If a party disagrees with the Employment Appeal Board decision, they may then file a petition for judicial review in district court.

2. If no one files an appeal of the judge's decision with the Employment Appeal Board within fifteen (15) days, the decision becomes final agency action, and you have the option to file a petition for judicial review in District Court within thirty (30) days after the decision becomes final. **Note to Parties:** YOU MAY REPRESENT yourself in the appeal or obtain a lawyer or other interested party to do so provided there is no expense to Workforce Development. If you wish to be represented by a lawyer, you may obtain the services of either a private attorney or one whose services are paid for with public funds.

**Note to Claimant:** It is important that you file your weekly claim as directed, while this appeal is pending, to protect your continuing right to benefits.
