STATEMENT OF THE CASE:

The claimant appealed a representative's decision dated November 6, 2020, reference 03 that concluded the claimant was overpaid Federal Pandemic Unemployment Compensation (FPUC) benefits as a result of a disqualification decision. After a hearing notice was mailed to the claimant's last-known address of record, a telephone hearing was held on January 12, 2021. The claimant participated personally.

ISSUE:

The issue is whether the claimant is overpaid Federal Pandemic Unemployment Compensation (FPUC) benefits.

FINDINGS OF FACT:

The administrative law judge, having heard the testimony of the witness and having considered all of the evidence in the record, finds that: The overpayment issue in this case was created by a disqualification decision that has now been affirmed. Claimant is overpaid \$4,200.00 in Federal Pandemic Unemployment Compensation (FPUC) benefits for the seven weeks ending May 23, 2020.

REASONING AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:

For the following reasons the administrative law judge concludes the claimant was overpaid Federal Pandemic Unemployment Compensation (FPUC) benefits.

PL116-136, Sec. 2104 provides, in pertinent part:

- (b) Provisions of Agreement
- (1) Federal pandemic unemployment compensation.--Any agreement under this section shall provide that the State agency of the State will make payments of regular compensation to individuals in amounts and to the extent that they would be determined if the State law of the State were applied, with respect to any

week for which the individual is (disregarding this section) otherwise entitled under the State law to receive regular compensation, as if such State law had been modified in a manner such that the amount of regular compensation (including dependents' allowances) payable for any week shall be equal to

- (A) the amount determined under the State law (before the application of this paragraph), plus
- (B) an additional amount of \$600 (in this section referred to as "Federal Pandemic Unemployment Compensation").

. . . .

- (f) Fraud and Overpayments
- (2) Repayment.--In the case of individuals who have received amounts of Federal Pandemic Unemployment Compensation to which they were not entitled, the State shall require such individuals to repay the amounts of such Federal Pandemic Unemployment Compensation to the State agency...

Here, the claimant is disqualified from receiving regular unemployment insurance (UI) benefits. Accordingly, this also disqualifies claimant from receiving Federal Pandemic Unemployment Compensation (FPUC). In addition to the regular UI benefits claimant received, she also received an additional \$4,200.00 in FPUC benefits for the seven-week period ending May 23, 2020. Claimant is required to repay those benefits.

DECISION:

The decision of the representative dated November 6, 2020, reference 03, is affirmed. The claimant was overpaid Federal Pandemic Unemployment Compensation (FPUC) benefits in the amount of \$4,200.00.
