Iowa Code § 96.5(2)a – Discharge for Misconduct

STATEMENT OF THE CASE:

Claimant filed an appeal from the April 28, 2023 (reference 01) unemployment insurance decision that denied benefits finding claimant was discharged for excessive absenteeism after being warned. The parties were properly notified of the hearing. A telephone hearing was held on May 30, 2023. Claimant participated. Employer participated through Sara Fiedler, Human Resources. Employer's Exhibit 1 was admitted. The administrative law judge took official notice of the administrative record.

ISSUES:

Whether claimant's separation was a discharge for disqualifying job-related misconduct. Whether claimant was overpaid benefits.

Whether claimant should repay those benefits and/or whether employer should be charged based upon its participation in the fact-finding interview.

FINDINGS OF FACT:

Having reviewed all of the evidence in the record, the administrative law judge finds:

Claimant was employed full-time by Team Staffing Solutions, a temporary employment firm, from October 11, 2021 until April 5, 2023. Claimant was assigned to work as an Assembler at Winegard in Burlington, Iowa. Claimant worked ten-hour shifts Monday through Thursday. Claimant last worked at Winegard on April 4, 2023.

On April 5, 2023, Winegard ended claimant's assignment for violation of its attendance policy. Employer notified claimant that his assignment ended that same day.

On April 6, 2023, claimant went to employer's office to update his information. Employer offered claimant two first-shift assignments. Claimant declined them stating that he had personal and medical issues that would affect his attendance.

Claimant has not contacted employer since April 6, 2023.

REASONING AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:

For the reasons that follow, the administrative law judge concludes:

Iowa Code section 96.5(1)(j) provides:

An individual shall be disqualified for benefits

1. If the individual has left work voluntarily without good cause attributable to the individual's employer, if so found by the department. But the individual shall not be disqualified if the department finds that:

j. (1) The individual is a temporary employee of a temporary employment firm who notifies the temporary employment firm of completion of an employment assignment and who seeks reassignment. Failure of the individual to notify the temporary employment firm of completion of an employment assignment within three working days of the completion of each employment assignment under a contract of hire shall be deemed a voluntary quit unless the individual was not advised in writing of the duty to notify the temporary employment firm upon completion of an employment assignment or the individual had good cause for not contacting the temporary employment firm within three working days and notified the firm at the first reasonable opportunity thereafter.

(2) To show that the employee was advised in writing of the notification requirement of this paragraph, the temporary employment firm shall advise the temporary employee by requiring the temporary employee, at the time of employment with the temporary employment firm, to read and sign a document that provides a clear and concise explanation of the notification requirement and the consequences of a failure to notify. The document shall be separate from any contract of employment and a copy of the signed document shall be provided to the temporary employee.

In this case, claimant was employed by a temporary employment firm, Team Staffing Solutions, and was assigned by employer to work at Winegard. Claimant did not complete his assignment at Winegard – he was discharged for absenteeism. Because the assignment was not completed, Iowa Code section 96.5(1)(j) does not apply. Therefore, other reasons for claimant's separation must be evaluated.

While claimant was discharged from his assignment, he was not discharged by his employer, Team Staffing Solutions. Claimant's separation will be analyzed as a voluntary quit.

Iowa Admin. Code r. 871-24.25(20), (35) provide:

Voluntary quit without good cause. In general, a voluntary quit means discontinuing the employment because the employee no longer desires to remain in the relationship of an employee with the employer from whom the employee has separated. The employer has the burden of proving that the claimant is disqualified for benefits pursuant to Iowa Code section 96.5. However, the claimant has the initial burden to produce evidence that the claimant is not disqualified for benefits in cases involving Iowa Code section 96.5, subsection (1), paragraphs "a" through "i," and subsection 10. The following reasons for a voluntary quit shall be presumed to be without good cause attributable to the employer:

(20) The claimant left for compelling personal reasons; however, the period of absence exceeded ten working days.

(35) The claimant left because of illness or injury which was not caused or aggravated by the employment or pregnancy and failed to:

(a) Obtain the advice of a licensed and practicing physician;

(b) Obtain certification of release for work from a licensed and practicing physician;

(c) Return to the employer and offer services upon recovery and certification for work by a licensed and practicing physician; or

(d) Fully recover so that the claimant could perform all of the duties of the job.

A voluntary quitting means discontinuing the employment because the employee no longer desires to remain in the relationship of an employee with the employer and requires an intention to terminate the employment. *Wills v. Emp't Appeal Bd.*, 447 N.W. 2d 137, 138 (Iowa 1989). A voluntary leaving of employment requires an intention to terminate the employment relationship accompanied by an overt act of carrying out that intention. *Local Lodge #1426 v. Wilson Trailer*, 289 N.W.2d 608, 612 (Iowa 1980); *Peck v. Emp't Appeal Bd.*, 492 N.W.2d 438 (Iowa Ct. App. 1992).

Claimant has the burden of proving that the voluntary leaving was for good cause attributable to the employer. Iowa Code § 96.6(2). "Good cause" for leaving employment must be that which is reasonable to the average person, not the overly sensitive individual or the claimant in particular. *Uniweld Products v. Indus. Relations Comm'n*, 277 So.2d 827 (Fla. Dist. Ct. App. 1973). The standard of what a reasonable person would have believed under the circumstances is applied in determining whether a claimant left work voluntarily with good cause attributable to the employer. *O'Brien v. Employment Appeal Bd.*, 494 N.W.2d 660 (Iowa 1993).

Claimant ended his employment relationship with Team Staffing Solutions when he did not accept the two positions that were offered to him on April 6, 2023; claimant voluntarily quit. The reason claimant quit – personal and medical issues – was not attributable to employer. Claimant had not met his burden of proving that he voluntarily quit with good cause attributable to employer. Benefits are denied.

DECISION:

The April 28, 2023 (reference 01) unemployment insurance decision is MODIFIED WITH NO CHANGE IN EFFECT. Claimant voluntarily quit without good cause attributable to employer. Benefits are denied until claimant has worked in and been paid wages for insured work equal to ten times claimant's weekly benefit amount, provided claimant is otherwise eligible.

4) The grounds upon which such appeal is based.

An Employment Appeal Board decision is final agency action. If a party disagrees with the Employment Appeal Board decision, they may then file a petition for judicial review in district court.

2. If no one files an appeal of the judge's decision with the Employment Appeal Board within fifteen (15) days, the decision becomes final agency action, and you have the option to file a petition for judicial review in District Court within thirty (30) days after the decision becomes final.
