STATEMENT OF THE CASE:

Claimant filed an appeal from the December 3, 2021 unemployment insurance decision that found claimant was overpaid Federal Pandemic Unemployment Compensation (FPUC) benefits. Claimant was properly notified of the hearing. A telephone hearing was held on February 1, 2022. Claimant participated. No exhibits were admitted. Official notice was taken of the administrative record.

ISSUE:

Whether claimant is overpaid FPUC benefits.

FINDINGS OF FACT:

Having reviewed all of the evidence in the record, the administrative law judge finds:

Claimant received two payments of FPUC benefits in the gross amount of \$600.00 each for the benefit week ending July 11, 2020. Iowa Workforce development (IWD) authorized the payments on July 14, 2020 and July 16, 2020. The payments were deposited into claimant's account within three or four days of authorization. Claimant received two FPUC payments for the benefit week ending July 11, 2020.

REASONING AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:

For the reasons that follow, the administrative law judge concludes:

- PL 116-136, Sec. 2104 provides, in pertinent part:
 - (b) Provisions of Agreement

(1) Federal pandemic unemployment compensation.--Any agreement under this section shall provide that the State agency of the State will make payments of regular compensation to individuals in amounts and to the extent that they would be determined if the State law of the State were applied, with respect to any week for which the individual is (disregarding this section) otherwise entitled under the State law to receive

regular compensation, as if such State law had been modified in a manner such that the amount of regular compensation (including dependents' allowances) payable for any week shall be equal to

(A) the amount determined under the State law (before the application of this paragraph), plus

(B) an additional amount of \$600 (in this section referred to as "Federal Pandemic Unemployment Compensation").

. . . .

(f) Fraud and Overpayments

(2) Repayment.--In the case of individuals who have received amounts of Federal Pandemic Unemployment Compensation to which they were not entitled, the State shall require such individuals to repay the amounts of such Federal Pandemic Unemployment Compensation to the State agency, except that the State agency may waive such repayment if it determines that—

(A) the payment of such Federal Pandemic Unemployment Compensation was without fault on the part of any such individual; and

(B) such repayment would be contrary to equity and good conscience.

In this case, claimant received double FPUC benefits. Accordingly, claimant has received FPUC benefits to which he/she was not entitled. The administrative law judge concludes that claimant has been overpaid FPUC benefits in the amount of \$600.00. Those benefits must be recovered in accordance with Iowa law.

DECISION:

The December 3, 2021 unemployment insurance decision is affirmed. Claimant has been overpaid FPUC benefits in the amount of \$600.00, which must be repaid.
