STATEMENT OF THE CASE:

The claimant, Perry A Lenz, filed an appeal from the August 29, 2022 (reference 01) unemployment insurance decision that denied benefits on July 24, 2022. The parties were properly notified of the hearing. A telephone hearing was held on September 29, 2022, at 11:00 a.m. The claimant's request to postpone the hearing was not granted because he said he was merely busy. This is not a good cause reason to postpone under lowa Admin. Code r. 871-26.8(3) (stating good cause is akin to an emergency situation that could not have been foreseen that prevents the party's ability to participated.) The claimant participated. The employer did not participate. The claimant's proposed exhibits were not admitted because they had not been sent to the employer per lowa Admin. Code r. 871-26.15. Official notice was taken of the administrative record.

ISSUES:

Whether claimant is totally, partially or temporarily unemployed? Whether claimant is able to and available for work? Whether claimant is still employed at the same hours and wages? Whether employer's account is subject to charge?

FINDINGS OF FACT:

Having reviewed all of the evidence in the record, the administrative law judge finds:

The claimant began employment with the employer as a part-time scorer on August 15, 2015. The employer sends scorers an email with prospective assignments per customer demand. Scorers can accept or reject the assignment without any consequence to their employment relationship. This arrangement has been the same during the entirety of the claimant's employment.

The claimant filed for benefits beginning on May 8, 2022 through June 18, 2022, the claimant reported earning zero for each of these weekly claims. This period is not impacted by the result of this decision. Claimant's weekly benefit amount is \$253.00. The claimant's hourly wage is \$16.80.

The claimant filed an additional claim for unemployment insurance benefits effective July 24, 2022. This period is subject to this decision. The claimant filed continuing claims for the weeks ending July 30, 2022, August 6, 2022, August 13, 2022 and August 20, 2022. The claimant reported earning \$521.00, \$630.00 and \$336.00 and \$0.00 for the week ending July 30, 2022, August 6, 2022, August 13, 2022, and August 20, 2022.

REASONING AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:

For the reasons that follow, the administrative law judge concludes claimant is not partially unemployed. Benefits are denied.

Iowa Code section 96.4(3)a provides:

An unemployed individual shall be eligible to receive benefits with respect to any week only if the department finds that:

3. a. The individual is able to work, is available for work, and is earnestly and actively seeking work. This subsection is waived if the individual is deemed partially unemployed, while employed at the individual's regular job, as defined in section 96.1A, subsection 37, paragraph "b", subparagraph (1), or temporarily unemployed as defined in section 96.1A, subsection 37, paragraph "c". The work search requirements of this subsection and the disqualification requirement for failure to apply for, or to accept suitable work of section 96.5, subsection 3 are waived if the individual is not disqualified for benefits under section 96.5, subsection 1, paragraph "h".

For the reasons that follow, the administrative law judge concludes claimant is not partially unemployed. Benefits are denied.

Iowa Code section 96.4(3)a provides:

An unemployed individual shall be eligible to receive benefits with respect to any week only if the department finds that:

3. a. The individual is able to work, is available for work, and is earnestly and actively seeking work. This subsection is waived if the individual is deemed partially unemployed, while employed at the individual's regular job, as defined in section 96.1A, subsection 37, paragraph "b", subparagraph (1), or temporarily unemployed as defined in section 96.1A, subsection 37, paragraph "c". The work search requirements of this subsection and the disqualification requirement for failure to apply for, or to accept suitable work of section 96.5, subsection 3 are waived if the individual is not disqualified for benefits under section 96.5, subsection 1, paragraph "h".

Iowa Code section 96.1A(37) provides:

Totally unemployed", "partially unemployed", and "temporarily unemployed.

- a. An individual shall be deemed "totally unemployed" in any week with respect to which no wages are payable to the individual and during which the individual performs no services.
- b. An individual shall be deemed "partially unemployed" in any week in which either of the following apply:
- (1) While employed at the individual's then regular job, the individual works less than the regular full-time week and in which the individual earns less than the individual's weekly benefit amount plus fifteen dollars.
- (2) The individual, having been separated from the individual's regular job, earns at odd jobs less than the individual's weekly benefit amount plus fifteen dollars.
- c. An individual shall be deemed "temporarily unemployed" if for a period, verified by the department, not to exceed four consecutive weeks, the individual is unemployed due to a plant shutdown, vacation, inventory, lack of work or emergency from the individual's regular job or trade in which the individual worked full-time and will again work full-time, if the individual's employment, although temporarily suspended, has not been terminated.

Iowa Admin. R. 871-24.23(26) provides:

Availability disqualifications. The following are reasons for a claimant being disqualified for being unavailable for work.

(26) Where a claimant is still employed in a part-time job at the same hours and wages as contemplated in the original contract for hire and is not working on a reduced workweek basis difference from the contract for hire, such claimant cannot be considered partially unemployed.

Iowa Code section 96.7(2)a(2) provides:

- 2. Contribution rates based on benefit experience.
- a. (2) The amount of regular benefits plus fifty percent of the amount of extended benefits paid to an eligible individual shall be charged against the account of the employers in the base period in the inverse chronological order in which the employment of the individual occurred.
- (a) However, if the individual to whom the benefits are paid is in the employ of a base period employer at the time the individual is receiving the benefits, and the individual is receiving the same employment from the employer that the individual received during the individual's base period, benefits paid to the individual shall not be charged against the account of the employer. This provision applies to both contributory and reimbursable employers, notwithstanding subparagraph (3) and section 96.8, subsection 5.
- (b) An employer's account shall not be charged with benefits paid to an individual who left the work of the employer voluntarily without good cause attributable to the employer or to an individual who was discharged for misconduct in connection with the individual's employment, or to an individual who failed without good cause, either to apply for

available, suitable work or to accept suitable work with that employer, but shall be charged to the unemployment compensation fund. This paragraph applies to both contributory and reimbursable employers, notwithstanding section 96.8, subsection 5.

(c) The amount of benefits paid to an individual, which is solely due to wage credits considered to be in an individual's base period due to the exclusion and substitution of calendar quarters from the individual's base period under section 96.23, shall be charged against the account of the employer responsible for paying the workers' compensation benefits for temporary total disability or during a healing period under section 85.33, section 85.34, subsection 1, or section 85A.17, or responsible for paying indemnity insurance benefits.


When claimant elected to become a PRN employee, the parties agreed that claimant would be offered hours to work when employer had hours available. The claimant is still working under that agreement; there are just no hours available right now. The current situation is not beyond what the parties contemplated when they agreed claimant would become a PRN employee. Because the claimant is working the same hours and wages as contemplated when he became a PRN employee, claimant is not considered partially unemployed. Therefore, claimant is not eligible for unemployment benefits. Furthermore, the claimant clearly exceeded his weekly benefit amount plus \$15.00 for the weeks ending July 30, 2022, August 6, 2022, and August 13, 2022. Given those circumstances, the claimant is not partially or otherwise for those weeks under an additional law, lowa Code section 96.1A(37) (stating that in order to be unemployed in some capacity that earnings for that week must total less than the weekly benefit amount plus \$15.00 from one or multiple employers). Benefits are denied.

DECISION:

The April 20, 2020 (reference 01) unemployment insurance decision is AFFIRMED. The claimant is still employed at the same hours and wages and is not partially unemployed. Benefits are denied.

REMAND:

The administrative law judge is remanding to the Benefits Bureau whether the claimant was able and available and partially unemployed for the weeks ending May 14, 2022 through June 18, 2022.

APPEAL RIGHTS. If you disagree with the decision, you or any interested party may:

1. Appeal to the Employment Appeal Board within fifteen (15) days of the date under the judge's signature by submitting a written appeal via mail, fax, or online to:

The appeal period will be extended to the next business day if the last day to appeal falls on a weekend or a legal holiday.

AN APPEAL TO THE BOARD SHALL STATE CLEARLY:

- 1) The name, address, and social security number of the claimant.
- 2) A reference to the decision from which the appeal is taken.
- 3) That an appeal from such decision is being made and such appeal is signed.
- 4) The grounds upon which such appeal is based.

An Employment Appeal Board decision is final agency action. If a party disagrees with the Employment Appeal Board decision, they may then file a petition for judicial review in district court.

2. If no one files an appeal of the judge's decision with the Employment Appeal Board within fifteen (15) days, the decision becomes final agency action, and you have the option to file a petition for judicial review in District Court within thirty (30) days after the decision becomes final.
