STATEMENT OF THE CASE:

On June 13, 2022, claimant Bethanie A. Wilson filed an appeal from the March 31, 2022 (reference 06) unemployment insurance decision that determined she was overpaid \$10,200.00 in Federal Pandemic Unemployment Compensation ("FPUC") benefits for the seventeen week period ending July 25, 2020. The parties were properly notified of the hearing. A telephonic hearing was held at 1:00 p.m. on Tuesday, July 26, 2022. Appeal numbers 22A-UI-13877-LJ-T, 22A-UI-13878-LJ-T, 22A-UI-13879-LJ-T, and 22A-UI-13880-LJ-T were heard together and created one record. The claimant, Bethanie A. Wilson, participated. Department's Exhibits D-1 through D-5 were admitted into the record. The administrative law judge took official notice of the administrative record.

ISSUE:

Is the appeal timely?

FINDINGS OF FACT:

Having reviewed all of the evidence in the record, the administrative law judge finds: Four overpayment decisions – assigned reference numbers 04, 05, 06, and 07 – were mailed to claimant's last known address of record on March 31, 2022. She did receive the decisions within ten days, in early April 2022. Each decision contained a warning that an appeal must be postmarked or received by the Appeals Bureau by April 10, 2022. Claimant did not file an appeal until June 13, 2022, which is after the date noticed on the disqualification decision. Claimant took several weeks before calling lowa Workforce Development ("IWD") to inquire about the decisions because she was confused.

The reference 04 decision incorrectly states claimant received \$56.41 for the twenty-two weeks between March 15, 2020 and October 3, 2020. Claimant in fact received \$5,641.00 during this twenty-two week period.

The reference 06 decision states claimant was overpaid for a total of seventeen weeks, beginning March 29, 2020 and ending July 25, 2020. The underlying administrative law judge found claimant was only ineligible for eleven of those weeks, between May 10, 2020 and July 25, 2020. See 22R-UI-03719-LJ-T.

REASONING AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:

For the reasons that follow, the administrative law judge concludes claimant failed to file a timely appeal.

lowa Code § 96.6(2) provides, in pertinent part: "[u]nless the claimant or other interested party, after notification or within ten calendar days after notification was mailed to the claimant's last known address, files an appeal from the decision, the decision is final and benefits shall be paid or denied in accordance with the decision."

lowa Admin. Code r. 871-24.35(1) provides:

1. Except as otherwise provided by statute or by division rule, any payment, appeal, application, request, notice, objection, petition, report or other information or document submitted to the division shall be considered received by and filed with the division:

(a) If transmitted via the United States Postal Service on the date it is mailed as shown by the postmark, or in the absence of a postmark the postage meter mark of the envelope in which it is received; or if not postmarked or postage meter marked or if the mark is illegible, on the date entered on the document as the date of completion.

(b) If transmitted via the State Identification Date Exchange System (SIDES), maintained by the United States Department of Labor, on the date it was submitted to SIDES.

(c) If transmitted by any means other than [United States Postal Service or the State Identification Data Exchange System (SIDES)], on the date it is received by the division.

Iowa Admin. Code r. 871-24.35(2) provides:

2. The submission of any payment, appeal, application, request, notice, objection, petition, report or other information or document not within the specified statutory or regulatory period shall be considered timely if it is established to the satisfaction of the division that the delay in submission was due to division error or misinformation or to delay or other action of the United States postal service.

The lowa Supreme Court has declared that there is a mandatory duty to file appeals from representatives' decisions within the time allotted by statute, and that the administrative law judge has no authority to change the decision of a representative if a timely appeal is not filed. *Franklin v. IDJS*, 277 N.W.2d 877, 881 (lowa 1979). Compliance with appeal notice provisions is jurisdictional unless the facts of a case show that the notice was invalid. *Beardslee v. IDJS*,

276 N.W.2d 373, 377 (lowa 1979); see also *In re Appeal of Elliott* 319 N.W.2d 244, 247 (lowa 1982).

Here, the claimant received the decision in the mail and, therefore, had an opportunity to file an appeal prior to the appeal deadline. Claimant's delay was not due to an error or misinformation from the Department or due to delay or other action of the United States Postal Service. No other good cause reason has been established for the delay. Claimant's decision to wait several weeks between receiving the overpayment decisions and contacting IWD with questions on how to proceed was not for any good-cause reason that allows the administrative law judge to find this appeal timely. Therefore, the administrative law judge has no jurisdiction (authority) to decide the other issue in this matter.

DECISION:

The March 31, 2022 (reference 06) unemployment insurance decision is affirmed. Claimant failed to file a timely appeal. The decision of the representative remains in effect.

REMAND:

This matter is remanded to the Benefits Bureau to review and determine whether a new decision regarding the amount of the FPUC benefit overpayment needs to be issued.

1. Appeal to the Employment Appeal Board within fifteen (15) days of the date under the judge's signature by submitting a written appeal via mail, fax, or online to:

The appeal period will be extended to the next business day if the last day to appeal falls on a weekend or a legal holiday.

AN APPEAL TO THE BOARD SHALL STATE CLEARLY:

- 1) The name, address, and social security number of the claimant.
- 2) A reference to the decision from which the appeal is taken.
- 3) That an appeal from such decision is being made and such appeal is signed.
- 4) The grounds upon which such appeal is based.

An Employment Appeal Board decision is final agency action. If a party disagrees with the Employment Appeal Board decision, they may then file a petition for judicial review in district court.

2. If no one files an appeal of the judge's decision with the Employment Appeal Board within fifteen (15) days, the decision becomes final agency action, and you have the option to file a petition for judicial review in District Court within thirty (30) days after the decision becomes final. Additional information on how to file a petition can be found at low a Code §17A.19, which is online at https://www.legis.iowa.gov/docs/code/17A.19.pdf Or by contacting the District Court Clerk of Court https://www.iowacourts.gov/iowa-courts/court-directory/.

Note to Parties: YOU MAY REPRESENT yourself in the appeal or obtain a law yer or other interested party to do so provided there is no expense to Workforce Development. If you wish to be represented by a law yer, you may obtain the services of either a private attorney or one whose services are paid for with public funds.

Note to Claimant: It is important that you file your weekly claim as directed, while this appeal is pending, to protect your continuing right to benefits.
