STATEMENT OF THE CASE:

Claimant filed an appeal from a decision of a representative dated June 30, 2023, (reference 01) which held claimant ineligible for unemployment insurance benefits. After due notice, a hearing was scheduled for and held on July 26, 2023. Claimant participated. Employer participated by Veronica Oakeley and Katie Brown.

ISSUES:

Whether claimant quit for good cause attributable to employer?

Whether claimant is able and available for work?

FINDINGS OF FACT:

The administrative law judge, having heard the testimony and considered all of the evidence in the record, finds: Claimant last worked for employer on June 2, 2023. Claimant put in her two weeks' notice on that date as she stated she was not comfortable with multiple issues surrounding her job.

Claimant worked as a full time administrative assistant for employer. Employer's business was expanding during the seven months claimant worked for employer. As a result of this claimant started taking up multiple additional roles over and above her administrative assistant role. Claimant believed that employer was trying somehow to move claimant out of her role. Employer denied this and explained that they were interviewing for a different job, of executive assistant. This would take off some of the excess work that claimant had been addressing.

Claimant felt she had no clear guidance as to her role. Although she felt that way for a couple of months, only the day before she submitted her resignation did she raise the issue to employer. On June 2, 2023 claimant stated that she was resigning due to working conditions. She did not elaborate in the note, but did state that a coworker belittling her the day before also fed into her resignation. The coworker was not a manager, or above claimant, but claimant stated that she does not take well to criticism.

When employer received the resignation, employer decided to end claimant's job immediately, but to still pay claimant for the weeks that she did not work. Claimant was paid her whole wages through June 16, 2023.

Claimant was also suffering through medical problems at the time of her quit as she was suffering through liver failure. Only after claimant quit and she had medical procedures did she begin to feel better weeks after her job separation.

REASONING AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:

Iowa Code section 96.5(1) provides:

An individual shall be disqualified for benefits, regardless of the source of the individual's wage credits:

1. Voluntary quitting. If the individual has left work voluntarily without good cause attributable to the individual's employer, if so found by the department.

Iowa Code section 96.4(3) provides:

An unemployed individual shall be eligible to receive benefits with respect to any week only if the department finds that:

3. The individual is able to work, is available for work, and is earnestly and actively seeking work. This subsection is waived if the individual is deemed partially unemployed, while employed at the individual's regular job, as defined in section 96.19, subsection 38, paragraph "b", unnumbered paragraph (1), or temporarily unemployed as defined in section 96.19, subsection 38, paragraph "c". The work search requirements of this subsection and the disqualification requirement for failure to apply for, or to accept suitable work of section 96.5, subsection 3 are waived if the individual is not disqualified for benefits under section 96.5, subsection 1, paragraph "h".

Iowa Admin. Code r. 871-24.22(1)a provides:

Benefits eligibility conditions. For an individual to be eligible to receive benefits the department must find that the individual is able to work, available for work, and earnestly and actively seeking work. The individual bears the burden of establishing that the individual is able to work, available for work, and earnestly and actively seeking work.

(1) Able to work. An individual must be physically and mentally able to work in some gainful employment, not necessarily in the individual's customary occupation, but which is engaged in by others as a means of livelihood.


a. Illness, injury or pregnancy. Each case is decided upon an individual basis, recognizing that various work opportunities present different physical requirements. A statement from a medical practitioner is considered prima facie evidence of the physical ability of the individual to perform the work required. A pregnant individual must meet the same criteria for determining ableness as do all other individuals.

The administrative law judge holds that the evidence has failed to establish that claimant voluntarily quit for good cause attributable to employer when claimant terminated the

employment relationship because she felt that she was not happy with her working conditions. Claimant did not address her concerns with employer prior to her resignation such that employer could find ways to solve the problems. Employer was in the process of assisting claimant at the time of her quit and employer should not be held responsible that claimant felt employer was attempting to eventually move claimant out of her job. Claimant offered no proof of this happening. Benefits are denied.

DECISION:

The decision of the representative dated June 30, 2023, reference 01, is affirmed. Unemployment insurance benefits shall be withheld until claimant has worked in and been paid wages for insured work equal to ten times claimant's weekly benefit amount, provided claimant is otherwise eligible.

APPEAL RIGHTS. If you disagree with the decision, you or any interested party may:

1. Appeal to the Employment Appeal Board within fifteen (15) days of the date under the judge's signature by submitting a written appeal via mail, fax, or online to:

The appeal period will be extended to the next business day if the last day to appeal falls on a weekend or a legal holiday. *There is no filing fee to file an appeal with the Employment Appeal Board.*

AN APPEAL TO THE BOARD SHALL STATE CLEARLY:

- 1) The name, address, and social security number of the claimant.
- 2) A reference to the decision from which the appeal is taken.
- 3) That an appeal from such decision is being made and such appeal is signed.
- 4) The grounds upon which such appeal is based.

An Employment Appeal Board decision is final agency action. If a party disagrees with the Employment Appeal Board decision, they may file a petition for judicial review in district court.

2. If you do not file an appeal of the judge's decision with the Employment Appeal Board within fifteen (15) days, the decision becomes final agency action, and you have the option to file a petition for judicial review in District Court within thirty (30) days after the decision becomes final. Additional information on how to file a petition can be found at www.iowacourts.gov/efile. *There may be a filing fee to file the petition in District Court.*

Note to Parties: YOU MAY REPRESENT yourself in the appeal or obtain a lawyer or other interested party to do so provided there is no expense to Workforce Development. If you wish to be represented by a lawyer, you may obtain the services of either a private attorney or one whose services are paid for with public funds.

Note to Claimant: It is important that you file your weekly claim as directed, while this appeal is pending, to protect your continuing right to benefits.

DERECHOS DE APELACIÓN. Si no está de acuerdo con la decisión, usted o cualquier parte interesada puede:

2.
