STATEMENT OF THE CASE:

The employer, Theisens Inc., filed an appeal from the March 22, 2023, (reference 01) unemployment insurance decision that granted benefits based upon the conclusion she was discharged, but disqualifying misconduct was not shown. The parties were properly notified of the hearing. A telephone hearing was held on April 13, 2023. The claimant participated and testified. The employer participated through Human Resources Generalist Kelly Boge.

ISSUES:

Was the claimant discharged for disqualifying job-related misconduct?
Whether the claimant has been overpaid benefits? Whether the claimant is excused from repayment of benefits due to the employer's non-participation?

FINDINGS OF FACT:

Having reviewed all of the evidence in the record, the administrative law judge finds:

The claimant worked first as a cashier and as an office administrator from May 31, 2022, until she was separated from employment on March 3, 2023, when she quit. The claimant's immediate supervisor was Store Manager Mike Longeley.

On November 7, 2022, the claimant accepted the office administrator job. The employer provided a copy of the office administrator position. (Exhibit 2) The office administrator job description lists assisting and performing the functions of a senior cashier as needed in the preamble to listing individual duties. In a bulleted list below the preamble, it states again that the claimant is required to "assist [sic] cashier in problem solving as needed." It also states the following, "Retail sales duties may include merchandise handling and providing excellent customer service."

On March 3, 2023, the claimant informed Mr. Longeley of her resignation effective immediately. The claimant said she would only work in the cash office and do price changes. She refused to perform cashier duties.

The following section of the findings of fact display the findings necessary to resolve the overpayment issue:

The claimant has not received benefits after her separation from this employer.

REASONING AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:

The administrative law judge concludes claimant's separation from the employment was without good cause attributable to the employer. The overpayment issue need not be analyzed because the claimant was not paid benefits after her separation.

Iowa Code section 96.5(1) provides:

An individual shall be disqualified for benefits:

1. Voluntary quitting. If the individual has left work voluntarily without good cause attributable to the individual's employer, if so found by the department.

Iowa Admin. Code r. 871-24.25 (27) provides:

Voluntary quit without good cause. In general, a voluntary quit means discontinuing the employment because the employee no longer desires to remain in the relationship of an employee with the employer from whom the employee has separated. The employer has the burden of proving that the claimant is disqualified for benefits pursuant to Iowa Code section 96.5. However, the claimant has the initial burden to produce evidence that the claimant is not disqualified for benefits in cases involving Iowa Code section 96.5, subsection (1), paragraphs "a" through "i," and subsection 10. The following reasons for a voluntary quit shall be presumed to be without good cause attributable to the employer:

- (27) The claimant left rather than perform the assigned work as instructed.


The claimant has the burden of proving that the voluntary leaving was for good cause attributable to the employer. Iowa Code § 96.6(2). "Good cause" for leaving employment must be that which is reasonable to the average person, not the overly sensitive individual or the claimant in particular. *Uniweld Products v. Indus. Relations Comm'n*, 277 So.2d 827 (Fla. Dist. Ct. App. 1973). A voluntary leaving of employment requires an intention to terminate the employment relationship accompanied by an overt act of carrying out that intention. *Local Lodge #1426 v. Wilson Trailer*, 289 N.W.2d 608, 612 (Iowa 1980).

The claimant quit rather than perform the work assigned to her. This is a reason not attributable to the employer. See Iowa Admin. Code r. 871-24.25(27).

While claimant's leaving may have been based upon good personal reasons, it was not for a good-cause reason attributable to the employer according to Iowa law. Benefits are denied.

DECISION:

The March 22, 2023, (reference 01) unemployment insurance decision is REVERSED. The claimant voluntarily left her employment without good cause attributable to the employer. Benefits are withheld until such time as she has worked in and been paid wages for insured work equal to ten times her weekly benefit amount, provided she is otherwise eligible.

APPEAL RIGHTS. If you disagree with the decision, you or any interested party may:

1. Appeal to the Employment Appeal Board within fifteen (15) days of the date under the judge's signature by submitting a written appeal via mail, fax, or online to:

The appeal period will be extended to the next business day if the last day to appeal falls on a weekend or a legal holiday.

AN APPEAL TO THE BOARD SHALL STATE CLEARLY:

- 1) The name, address, and social security number of the claimant.
- 2) A reference to the decision from which the appeal is taken.
- 3) That an appeal from such decision is being made and such appeal is signed.
- 4) The grounds upon which such appeal is based.

An Employment Appeal Board decision is final agency action. If a party disagrees with the Employment Appeal Board decision, they may then file a petition for judicial review in district court.

2. If no one files an appeal of the judge's decision with the Employment Appeal Board within fifteen (15) days, the decision becomes final agency action, and you have the option to file a petition for judicial review in District Court within thirty (30) days after the decision becomes final. Note to Parties: YOU MAY REPRESENT yourself in the appeal or obtain a lawyer or other interested party to do so provided there is no expense to Workforce Development. If you wish to be represented by a lawyer, you may obtain the services of either a private attorney or one whose services are paid for with public funds.

Note to Claimant: It is important that you file your weekly claim as directed, while this appeal is pending, to protect your continuing right to benefits.
