STATEMENT OF THE CASE:

Claimant filed an appeal from the June 24, 2021 (reference 01) unemployment insurance decision that denied benefits effective April 4, 2021. The parties were properly notified of the hearing. A telephone hearing was held on August 23, 2021, at 1:00 p.m. Claimant participated. Employer did not participate. No exhibits were admitted. Official notice was taken of the administrative record.

ISSUES:

Whether claimant is totally, partially or temporarily unemployed.
Whether claimant is able to and available for work.
Whether claimant is still employed at the same hours and wages.
Whether employer's account is subject to charge.

FINDINGS OF FACT:

As claimant was the only witness, the administrative law judge makes the following findings of fact based solely upon claimant's testimony: Claimant began employment with Wells Fargo Bank on February 18, 2020. Claimant is a full-time Mortgage Analyst. Claimant earns an annual salary of \$37,500.00. Claimant's employment with Wells Fargo Bank has not been affected by Covid-19 in that he has continued to work his regular hours and earn his regular wages.

Claimant also works as a part-time Server at a restaurant. The restaurant closed due to Covid-19 in March 2020. Claimant has performed no work and earned no wages from the restaurant since March 2020. Claimant filed an initial claim for benefits effective April 5, 2020 and a claim for a second benefit year effective April 4, 2021. Claimant's weekly benefit amount during his second benefit year is \$493.00. Claimant has filed weekly claims reporting zero wages.

REASONING AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:

For the reasons that follow, the administrative law judge concludes claimant was not totally or partially unemployed. Benefits are denied.

Iowa Code section 96.1A(37) provides:

"Total and partial unemployment".

a. An individual shall be deemed "totally unemployed" in any week with respect to which no wages are payable to the individual and during which the individual performs no services.

b. An individual shall be deemed partially unemployed in any week in which either of the following apply:

(1) While employed at the individual's then regular job, the individual works less than the regular full-time week and in which the individual earns less than the individual's weekly benefit amount plus fifteen dollars.

(2) The individual, having been separated from the individual's regular job, earns at odd jobs less than the individual's weekly benefit amount plus fifteen dollars.

c. An individual shall be deemed temporarily unemployed if for a period, verified by the department, not to exceed four consecutive weeks, the individual is unemployed due to a plant shutdown, vacation, inventory, lack of work or emergency from the individual's regular job or trade in which the individual worked full-time and will again work full-time, if the individual's employment, although temporarily suspended, has not been terminated.

Iowa Code section 96.4(3) provides:

An unemployed individual shall be eligible to receive benefits with respect to any week only if the department finds that:

3. The individual is able to work, is available for work, and is earnestly and actively seeking work. This subsection is waived if the individual is deemed partially unemployed, while employed at the individual's regular job, as defined in section 96.1A, subsection 37, paragraph "b", unnumbered paragraph (1), or temporarily unemployed as defined in section 96.1A, subsection 37, paragraph "c". The work search requirements of this subsection and the disqualification requirement for failure to apply for, or to accept suitable work of section 96.5, subsection 3 are waived if the individual is not disqualified for benefits under section 96.5, subsection 1, paragraph "h".

Iowa Admin. R. 871-24.23(26) provides:

Availability disqualifications. The following are reasons for a claimant being disqualified for being unavailable for work.

(26) Where a claimant is still employed in a part-time job at the same hours and wages as contemplated in the original contract for hire and is not working on a reduced

workweek basis different from the contract for hire, such claimant cannot be considered partially unemployed.

Iowa Code section 96.7(2)a(2) provides:

2. Contribution rates based on benefit experience.

a. (2) The amount of regular benefits plus fifty percent of the amount of extended benefits paid to an eligible individual shall be charged against the account of the employers in the base period in the inverse chronological order in which the employment of the individual occurred.

(a) However, if the individual to whom the benefits are paid is in the employ of a base period employer at the time the individual is receiving the benefits, and the individual is receiving the same employment from the employer that the individual received during the individual's base period, benefits paid to the individual shall not be charged against the account of the employer. This provision applies to both contributory and reimbursable employers, notwithstanding subparagraph (3) and section 96.8, subsection 5.

(b) An employer's account shall not be charged with benefits paid to an individual who left the work of the employer voluntarily without good cause attributable to the employer or to an individual who was discharged for misconduct in connection with the individual's employment, or to an individual who failed without good cause, either to apply for available, suitable work or to accept suitable work with that employer, but shall be charged to the unemployment compensation fund. This paragraph applies to both contributory and reimbursable employers, notwithstanding section 96.8, subsection 5.

(c) The amount of benefits paid to an individual, which is solely due to wage credits considered to be in an individual's base period due to the exclusion and substitution of calendar quarters from the individual's base period under section 96.23, shall be charged against the account of the employer responsible for paying the workers' compensation benefits for temporary total disability or during a healing period under section 85.33, section 85.34, subsection 1, or section 85A.17, or responsible for paying indemnity insurance benefits.

Since April 4, 2021, claimant has worked his regular full-time hours and earned his regular full-time wages from employer. Claimant's regular weekly wage is \$721.00 (\$37,500.00 / 52 weeks). Claimant has earned more than his weekly benefit amount plus \$15.00 each week and thus, cannot be considered partially unemployed based on his lack of work with the restaurant. Benefits are denied.

Inasmuch as employer is offering the same wages and hours as contemplated at hire, no benefit charges shall be made to its account.

The issue of whether claimant was totally, partially or temporarily unemployed effective April 5, 2020 should be remanded to the Benefits Bureau of Iowa Workforce Development for an initial investigation and decision.

DECISION:

The June 24, 2021 (reference 01) unemployment insurance decision is affirmed. Claimant is not totally or partially unemployed. Benefits are denied. Employer's account (# 295860-000) shall not be charged.

REMAND:

The issue of whether claimant was totally, partially or temporarily unemployed effective April 5, 2020 is remanded to the Benefits Bureau of Iowa Workforce Development for an initial investigation and decision.
