**STATEMENT OF THE CASE:**

The claimant, Sarah Johnson, filed an appeal from the January 22, 2024, (reference 07) unemployment insurance decision that denied benefits effective December 24, 2023, based on the deputy's conclusion that the claimant was not able to and available for work. After due notice, a telephone hearing was held on February 12, 2024. The claimant participated personally. The administrative law judge took official notice of the administrative record.

**ISSUE:**

Whether the claimant is able to and available for work.

**FINDINGS OF FACT:**

Having reviewed all of the evidence in the record, the administrative law judge finds: The claimant established an original claim for unemployment insurance benefits with an effective date of October 29, 2023, after a separation from employment.

On December 26, 2023, the claimant underwent a significant surgical procedure. After being released from the hospital, claimant's medical provider restricted claimant from returning to work. On January 11, 2024, the claimant had a follow-up medical appointment and her medical provider released claimant to return to light work beginning January 12, 2024. On February 1, 2024, claimant's medical provider fully released claimant to return to work without any restrictions.

**REASONING AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:**

For the reasons that follow, the administrative law judge concludes that the claimant was not able to work and available for work beginning December 24, 2023 through January 13, 2024. Claimant is able to and available for work effective January 14, 2024.

Iowa Code section 96.4(3) provides:

An unemployed individual shall be eligible to receive benefits with respect to any week only if the department finds that:

3. The individual is able to work, is available for work, and is earnestly and actively seeking work. This subsection is waived if the individual is deemed partially unemployed, while employed at the individual's regular job, as defined in section 96.1A, subsection 37, paragraph "b", subparagraph (1), or temporarily unemployed as defined in section 96.1A, subsection 37, paragraph "c". The work search requirements of this subsection and the disqualification requirement for failure to apply for, or to accept suitable work of section 96.5, subsection 3 are waived if the individual is not disqualified for benefits under section 96.5, subsection 1, paragraph "h".

Iowa Admin. Code r. 871-24.22(1)(a) provides:

Benefits eligibility conditions. For an individual to be eligible to receive benefits the department must find that the individual is able to work, available for work, and earnestly and actively seeking work. The individual bears the burden of establishing that the individual is able to work, available for work, and earnestly and actively seeking work.

(1) Able to work. An individual must be physically and mentally able to work in some gainful employment, not necessarily in the individual's customary occupation, but which is engaged in by others as a means of livelihood.

a. Illness, injury or pregnancy. Each case is decided upon an individual basis, recognizing that various work opportunities present different physical requirements. A statement from a medical practitioner is considered prima facie evidence of the physical ability of the individual to perform the work required. A pregnant individual must meet the same criteria for determining ableness as do all other individuals.

Iowa Admin. Code r. 871-24.23(1),(20) and (35) provides:

Availability disqualifications. The following are reasons for a claimant being disqualified for being unavailable for work.

(1) An individual who is ill and presently not able to perform work due to illness.

...

(35) Where the claimant is not able to work and is under the care of a medical practitioner and has not been released as being able to work.

To be able to work, "[a]n individual must be physically and mentally able to work in some gainful employment, not necessarily in the individual's customary occupation, but which is engaged in by others as a means of livelihood." *Sierra v. Employment Appeal Board*, 508 N.W.2d 719, 721 (Iowa 1993); *Geiken v. Lutheran Home for the Aged*, 468 N.W.2d 223 (Iowa 1991); Iowa Admin. Code r. 871-24.22(1). "An evaluation of an individual's ability to work for the purposes of determining that individual's eligibility for unemployment benefits must necessarily take into consideration the economic and legal forces at work in the general labor market in which the individual resides." *Sierra* at 723. The court in *Gilmore v. Empl. Appeal Bd.*, 695 N.W.2d 44 (Iowa Ct. App. 2004) noted that "[i]nsofar as the Employment Security Law is not designed to provide health and disability insurance, only those employees who experience illness-induced

separations that can fairly be attributed to the employer are properly eligible for unemployment benefits." *White v. Emp't Appeal Bd.*, 487 N.W.2d 342, 345 (Iowa 1992) (citing *Butts v. Iowa Dep't of Job Serv.*, 328 N.W.2d 515, 517 (Iowa 1983)).

The weight of the evidence indicates that from December 24, 2023 through January 13, 2024, the claimant was not able to and available for work within the meaning of the law. During that period, claimant was recovering from a significant surgical procedure and was restricted from returning to work by her medical provider. However, claimant's medical provider released claimant to return to light work on January 12, 2023. Therefore, the claimant is considered to be able to work and available for work as of January 14, 2024, after she was released to return to light work by her medical provider. Benefits are allowed effective January 14, 2024, provided the claimant is otherwise eligible.

**DECISION:**

The January 22, 2024, (reference 07) unemployment insurance decision is modified in favor of the appellant. The claimant was not able to and available for work from December 24, 2023 through January 13, 2024, and benefits are denied on that basis for that period of time. The claimant established that she was able to and available for work effective the week beginning January 14, 2024, and benefits are allowed, provided she is otherwise eligible.

**AN APPEAL TO THE BOARD SHALL STATE CLEARLY:**

- 1) The name, address, and social security number of the claimant.
- 2) A reference to the decision from which the appeal is taken.
- 3) That an appeal from such decision is being made and such appeal is signed.
- 4) The grounds upon which such appeal is based.

An Employment Appeal Board decision is final agency action. If a party disagrees with the Employment Appeal Board decision, they may then file a petition for judicial review in district court.

2. If no one files an appeal of the judge's decision with the Employment Appeal Board within fifteen (15) days, the decision becomes final agency action, and you have the option to file a petition for judicial review in District Court within thirty (30) days after the decision becomes final. **Note to Parties:** YOU MAY REPRESENT yourself in the appeal or obtain a lawyer or other interested party to do so provided there is no expense to Workforce Development. If you wish to be represented by a lawyer, you may obtain the services of either a private attorney or one whose services are paid for with public funds.

**Note to Claimant:** It is important that you file your weekly claim as directed, while this appeal is pending, to protect your continuing right to benefits.
