STATEMENT OF THE CASE:

The employer, Vermeer Manufacturing Company Inc., filed an appeal from the February 15, 2024, (reference 05) unemployment insurance decision granted benefits effective January 26, 2024, based upon the determination the claimant was discharged, but misconduct was not shown. The parties were properly notified of the hearing. A telephone hearing was held on March 21, 2024, at 10:00 a.m. The claimant did not participate. The employer participated through Human Resources Business Partner Amanda Dunnick. Official notice was taken of the agency records.

ISSUES:

Was the claimant discharged for disqualifying job-related misconduct?

Whether the claimant has been overpaid benefits? Whether the claimant is excused from repayment of benefits due to the employer's non-participation?

FINDINGS OF FACT:

Having reviewed all of the evidence in the record, the administrative law judge finds:

The claimant worked as a full-time material handler from June 26, 2023, until she separated from employment on January 26, 2024, when she quit.

The claimant worked from 2:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. The claimant worked in a manufacturing environment. There are no known environmental hazards in the claimant's work environment.

The claimant had a string of absences from December 7, 2023, through December 12, 2023.

On December 15, 2023, the claimant spoke with a human resources business partner. The claimant said she was experiencing symptoms of a medical condition. She requested a personal leave of absence, so that she could determine the cause of the symptoms. The employer granted this request.

On January 26, 2024, the claimant quit because she said the working conditions were detrimental to her. She did not provide any greater detail in her resignation.

The following section of the findings of fact display the findings necessary to resolve the overpayment issue:

The claimant has not received benefits after separating from this employer.

REASONING AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW:

The administrative law judge finds the claimant quit without good cause attributable to the employer. Benefits are denied. The overpayment issue need not be analyzed because the claimant was not paid benefits after this separation.

Iowa Code section 96.5(1) provides:

An individual shall be disqualified for benefits, regardless of the source of the individual's wage credits:

1. Voluntary quitting. If the individual has left work voluntarily without good cause attributable to the individual's employer, if so found by the department.

Iowa Admin. Code r. 871-24.26(6)b provides:

Voluntary quit with good cause attributable to the employer and separations not considered to be voluntary quits. The following are reasons for a claimant leaving employment with good cause attributable to the employer:

- (6) Separation because of illness, injury, or pregnancy.
- b. Employment related separation. The claimant was compelled to leave employment because of an illness, injury, or allergy condition that was attributable to the employment. Factors and circumstances directly connected with the employment which caused or aggravated the illness, injury, allergy, or disease to the employee which made it impossible for the employee to continue in employment because of serious danger to the employee's health may be held to be an involuntary termination of employment and constitute good cause attributable to the employer. The claimant will be eligible for benefits if compelled to leave employment as a result of an injury suffered on the job.

In order to be eligible under this paragraph "b" an individual must present competent evidence showing adequate health reasons to justify termination; before quitting have informed the employer of the work-related health problem and inform the employer that the individual intends to quit unless the problem is corrected or the individual is reasonably accommodated. Reasonable accommodation includes other comparable work which is not injurious to the claimant's health and for which the claimant must remain available.

An individual who voluntarily leaves their employment due to an alleged work-related illness or injury must first give notice to the employer of the anticipated reasons for quitting to give the employer an opportunity to remedy the situation or offer an accommodation. *Suluki v. Employment Appeal Board*, 503 N.W.2d 402 (Iowa 1993). An employee who receives a reasonable expectation of assistance from the employer after complaining about working conditions must complain further if conditions persist in order to preserve eligibility for benefits. *Polley v. Gopher Bearing Company*, 478 N.W.2d 775 (Minn. App. 1991).

The claimant reported that she had symptoms of a medical condition when she requested her medical leave of absence. The record does not establish that the claimant's symptoms were work-related. The claimant was not reasonable in making this connection and quitting after the employer had given her leave. Benefits are denied. The overpayment issue need not be analyzed because the claimant did not receive unemployment benefits after separating from the employer.

DECISION:

The February 15, 2024, (reference 05) unemployment insurance decision is REVERSED. The claimant quit on January 26, 2024, without good cause attributable to the employer. Benefits are withheld until such time as she has worked in and been paid wages for insured work equal to ten times her weekly benefit amount, provided she is otherwise eligible.

- 2) A reference to the decision from which the appeal is taken.
- 3) That an appeal from such decision is being made and such appeal is signed.
- 4) The grounds upon which such appeal is based.

An Employment Appeal Board decision is final agency action. If a party disagrees with the Employment Appeal Board decision, they may then file a petition for judicial review in district court.

2. If no one files an appeal of the judge's decision with the Employment Appeal Board within fifteen (15) days, the decision becomes final agency action, and you have the option to file a petition for judicial review in District Court within thirty (30) days after the decision becomes final. Additional information on how to file a petition can be found at lowa Code §17A.19, which is online at https://www.legis.iowa.gov/docs/code/17A.19.pdf or by contacting the District Court Clerk of Court https://www.iowacourts.gov/iowa-courts/court-directory/.

Note to Parties: YOU MAY REPRESENT yourself in the appeal or obtain a lawyer or other interested party to do so provided there is no expense to Workforce Development. If you wish to be represented by a lawyer, you may obtain the services of either a private attorney or one whose services are paid for with public funds.

Note to Claimant: It is important that you file your weekly claim as directed, while this appeal is pending, to protect your continuing right to benefits.
